MINUTES OF THE OCTOBER 16, 2016 GCP GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING

WELCOME: President Betsy Griffith called to order the General Membership Meeting of the Garden Club of Princeton held at D&R Greenway at 10:35 a.m. Betsy opened by thanking the program chairs, Mary Funsch and Piper Burrows and the hostesses Barbie Bromley and Ruth Wilson. Betsy also introduced her mom who was visiting from South Carolina for her 95th birthday.

ATTENDANCE: Recording Secretary, Tracy Sipprelle, called the roll and a quorum was established.

MINUTES: of the September meeting were approved as corrected. Correction: Tomasina Schiro noted that the list of committee chairs or representatives required to attend the GCA Zone IV representatives' meeting at the Frelinghuysen Arboretum on October 20 was incomplete. It should have included: Awards, Bulletin, Communications, Civic Projects, Conservation, Flower Shows, Founders Fund, Garden History and Design, Horticulture, Judging, Membership, Photography, Program, Scholarship, Visiting Gardens and Treasurer.

INSPIRATION: Betsy read the last paragraph of the <u>Bee Cottage Story</u> by Frances Schultz.

MOMENT OF SILENCE: After highlighting some of Betsy Ford's many contributions to our Garden Club, President Betsy Griffith asked for a moment of silence in honor and memory of Betsy Ford, a devoted member of the Garden Club of Princeton since 1993, who passed away this month.

OPENING FUND REPORT: Betsy Griffith reported that the evening at the Jordan's cocktail event was a huge success with several staying well after the event was over. We raised \$2,200 from the cocktail event. The appetizers and beverages were donated by the executive committee.

MORVEN FESTIVAL OF TREES: Betsy reminded everyone that the Morven Festival of Trees installation takes place on November 21 and 22. There is still time to sign up to work on the tree committee. Betsy asked for a volunteer to chair the committee. This year, the committee will be decorating the stairway and arches inside. All material must be artificial.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

CIVIC PROJECTS: Tracy Sipprelle thanked all the civic project committee members for helping with the planting of native plants at Veteran's Memorial Park on September 26 and reminded everyone of the upcoming fall clean up at Veteran's Memorial Park on Monday, October 24 at 10:00 a.m. not 9:00 a.m. as stated in the green book. She also reminded everyone of the meeting and luncheon following the clean up, at 12:45 p.m., at her home at 81 Chambers Street, Princeton. The new spring project will be discussed: refurbishing the garden along the front of the YMCA building along Paul Robeson Place, and the path leading to the joint trustees bench in the back of the property. Tracy stated that she believes vibrant trees and flowering plants with a newly redefined path will brighten up the property for everyone in the community to enjoy. The garden with proper signage can be used as a learning tool for the children in the afterschool program. She suggested that the project be done in phases, with the first part being done on the front of the YMCA.

Horticulture/Shirley Meneice: Louisa Clayton and Nora Decker shared stories and highlights from their visit to the Brooklyn Botanic Garden on September 20, the home of this year's Shirley Meneice Horticulture Conference of the Garden Club of America. More than several hundred of the organization's garden club members, and other plant enthusiasts attended the four day conference at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden, situated on more than 50 acres in the heart of Brooklyn, New York. The conference theme was " A Tree Grows in Brooklyn…and Much More." Louisa noted that the purpose of the conference is to stimulate knowledge and love of gardening by offering lectures, seminars, demonstrations and providing horticultural information to the GCA clubs who gathered at the botanical garden. The conference is named in honor of Shirley Meneice, a respected and renowned horticulturist and a member of GCA's Carmel-by-the-Sea Garden Club and chairmen of the GCA's Horticulture Committee1995 -1997. One of the projects highlighted at the conference was the Partners for Plants project. Louisa mentioned that one of her favorite seminars was the one led by Darrel Morrison, a renowned landscape architect who has designed native gardens at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden. Nora Decker talked about her favorite seminars, the focus of one being Japanese trees. She mentioned her visit to the Japanese Hill-and-Pond Garden, noting that it is one of the oldest Japanese inspired gardens outside Japan.

PROGRAM: Program Chair Mary Funsch discussed the Garden History and Design program that will be presented at the November 15, 2016 meeting. Caroline Seebohm, born in England, is a writer and novelist, journalist, and biographer. She will be talking about her new book: <u>Rescuing Eden</u>: <u>Preserving America's Historic Gardens</u>. She will have signed copies for sale at the meeting.

- Betsy Griffith reminded everyone of *the Lunch and Learn: Reel Quiet Mowing* at Barbara Gallups' home at 11:00 a.m. on November 1. This is a different time than what is listed in the green book.

- Betsy also announced that the Conservation Cocktails event at Terhune Orchards originally scheduled for November has been postponed until January. The actual day is to be determined.

Conservation Program - Speaker: Conservation Committee co-chair, Katherine Dresdner introduced our speaker, her co-chair, Kathleen Biggins. Kathleen is the chairperson of the C- Change Committee, a group created after past NAL presentations. She and her committee members designed an educational primer on climate change, which outlines the science behind our evolving environment and highlights new technologies that will help us mitigate climate change problems. Before beginning her talk, Kathleen acknowledged and thanked her committee members: Zone IV conservation rep. Katy Kinsolving, Stony Brook Garden Club member, Carrie Dykman, and GCP members, Sophie Glovier and Pam Mount.

Kathleen's passionate talk, accompanied by a slide presentation of scientific models and trends, revolved around the answers to six questions proposed by Kathleen.

-How do we know climate change is real?

-How do we know what causes it?

-What do the scientist say about climate change?

-Are the changes dangerous?

-Is there hope?

-What can we do to help?

She highlighted the many companies and corporations who are developing plans to cut back energy sources that increase our carbon footprint. She highlighted the positive meeting among nations' leaders agreeing that climate change is a real and significant problem at a conference in Paris this past summer. After the presentation, Kathleen took several questions from the audience. She ended on a positive note stating that she'd be happy to talk to any group that is interested in learning about climate change and that if we work collectively we can make a positive change to help control the current downward spiral.

ADJOURNMENT: Betsy thanked Kathleen and welcomed members to the adjoining room to enjoy lunch. The meeting was adjourned at 12:35 p.m.

IN MEMORIUM – BETSY FORD

We sadly report that our long time member, Betsy Ford, passed away on Saturday, September 24, 2016.

Born Elizabeth Masland Dana in Philadelphia on December 13, 1935, and known as Betsy, she was raised in Villanova, Pennsylvania. We know Betsy though her love of gardening and horticulture, but she had other passions. As a young woman she was a junior golf champion. She graduated from Mt. Holyoke in 1958 and worked as a librarian. She enjoyed a successful career in real estate. Among her many interests, Betsy loved traveling with her family, summering in Nantucket, playing bridge and holding leadership roles in our Garden Club of Princeton, the Marquand Park Association and the Mt. Holyoke Alumni Association. She valued her involvement at the Foundation Fighting Blindness, the Morris Arboretum in Philadelphia and The Present Day Club in Princeton. Betsy joined the Garden Club of Princeton 23 years ago, in 1993. Her loves were horticulture, where she became chair, conservation and civic projects. Many of us have reminders of Betsy in our gardens through plants she freely shared with us.

We repeat, here, one line from her obituary that tells so much about how she celebrated her life.

"Truly adored by her family she was known as "Granny B" and they will always remember how she shared the great joy in the beauty of the natural world around her - watching clouds, digging for clams, gardening and tracing the advance of the butterfly from cocoon and caterpillar."

Our thoughts and prayers are with Jerry and her family at this time.

A memorial service is planned at The Princeton University Chapel for Monday, November 21, at 10:00 a.m.

HISTORIAN: Sandi Tatnall

From our Archives I retrieved a 1969-1970 report from Mary Radclyffe Savage, our Archivist at that time. I would like to share much of it with you:

Madame President, members of the Garden Club of Princeton, the archives continue to be consulted. It is in the hope of reassuring you in these disturbing times that repetition of the facts gleaned from history are in order. Our club is 50 years old. The grading of the driveway into the hospital was our first gift to that institution which now sits on the first driveway and an ornamental planting we made beside the "new" wing twenty years later is under a cement pathway. What matter? The hospital survives and serves. The books on gardening we gave and still give to the Public Library are used and read more by more people then when we began our donations. The wildflower path we created from "College Road" to the boathouse is trampled, cut in parts by new avenues but the present plans for the University create a park in the vicinity of our labours. Our violent effort to clean the town and its backyards was blunted by resentment way back in the thirties. Now the anti-litter bugs are "in" and high fashion, but the greatest lesson to be learned from our archives is of the power of the pen... Clyffie, as she was called by one and all, goes on to cite a battle to keep an industry from locating in Lawrence Township... She closes by writing, "It is a true story...worth telling on another day".

I hope I can find more of her wonderful reports to share with you. She was a tiny person who brought humor, knowledge and insight into our lives.

HORTICULTURE: Louisa Clayton, Kathy Enquist, Jane Murphy

The Horticulture Committee hosted a fabulous Bulb Forcing Workshop on Friday 10/21, at Jane Murphy's house. A big THANK YOU to Jane for accommodating our last moment switch of workshop location to her garage due to the threat of rain.

A record number of members attended (20) and a record number pots were planted (40). This is the most in recent years. The pots are almost evenly split between tulips (21) and crocuses (19). We hope to see many of those pots at the Philadelphia Flower Show in the spring. We will host a workshop in February to check on your progress and help you get to the finish line.

On Friday, November 4, 2016 members are traveling to PHS Meadowbrook Farm to participate in <u>a 10:00</u> <u>a.m.</u> workshop to create our own terrariums. Now that fall is here and we can't grow outdoors, we can take joy in creating a small indoor garden that is low maintenance. Terrariums are classically a closed, glass environment, which increases the humidity and allows you to grow plants that prefer a moist habitat. However, if you prefer, you can stretch the definition of 'terrarium' to include desert plantings. At this workshop, you get to decide what type of terrarium you want to make by choosing plants that have similar growing conditions: low light, high humidity, drought-resistant, etc. Our instructor at PHS Meadowbrook Farms will guide us in selecting plants that will do well in the type of terrarium you choose to create.

In addition to creating a terrarium garden for your enjoyment at home, you will have the opportunity to exhibit your terrarium at the Philadelphia Flower Show in March, 2017, or at the May, 2017 in-club Hort. Show.

The cost for the workshop is approximately \$35-\$45 per person depending on your choice of plants and container. You may provide your own glass container instead of purchasing one on site. Container size should not to exceed 10 inches in diameter/diagonal inside measurement (as per the Hort. Show schedules). Box lunches orders will be delivered to Meadowbrook Farm at an additional cost TBD. Car pool travel to be arranged for participants.
