MINUTES OF THE NOV. 15, 2016 GCP GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING:

WELCOME: President Betsy Griffith called to order the General Meeting of the Garden Club of Princeton held at D & R Greenway. She thanked hostesses Betsy Hoover and Mary Hulme as well as Program Chairmen Mary Funsch and Piper Burrows. Betsy applauded Penny Thomas for volunteering to serve as chairman of the Morven Festival of Trees. She noted that since Penny has enlisted the assistance of two friends, the club has the "best design team ever."

ATTENDANCE was taken and a quorum established.

MINUTES of the October meeting were approved.

PRESIDENT'S ANNOUNCEMENTS: Betsy opened the meeting with excerpts from George Washington's "Rules of Civility & Behavior in Company and Conversation." The 110 rules proclaim our respect for others and ultimately for ourselves. They embody the courtesy we should strive to show one another.

Betsy announced that there would be a meeting at her house at 10:00 a.m. on November 16 to assemble the garlands and trees for the Morven Festival of Trees and that the installation of these items would take place on November 21. She complimented the design team on a simple, elegant concept based on the theme of starry, starry night.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Archives: Martha Sword requested members to provide her committee with any spare long, hanging Oxford Pendaflex files in their possession.

Conservation: Betsy informed members that the week after Kathleen Biggins' presentation of the "C Change" team's climate report to our club, the group was invited to GCA headquarters to repeat the presentation. Kathleen reported that the GCA was impressed by the "non-partisan, non-political, basic facts" approach of the talk. The GCA then asked Kathleen and her team to open the NAL conference. The GCA believes that the presentation sets the neutral tone that the organization hopes will explain its focus on climate change to delegates from across the country and the political spectrum.

Communication: Barbara Morrison advised members to read the instructions in the October Newsletter on how to access the GCA website. She asked members who had not yet had their photographs taken to find her after the meeting. Barb has uploaded the photographs already taken to members' personal profiles online. Barb urged members to update their profiles.

Horticulture: Kathy Enquist offered a creative way to begin our club's new focus on trees. She explained that the oak is the national tree, and the red oak is the New Jersey State tree. Kathy has collected acorns and prepared materials for us to grow oak trees. At the back of the room, there are plastic bags, sphagnum moss, assorted acorns and instructions. All the acorns are native except those from the saw tooth oak, which has often been planted in this area. Kathy did not include pin oaks, because those oaks are especially susceptible to bacterial leaf scorch. The basic instructions are as follows: Dampen the moss, put it and an acorn in a plastic bag, label the bag with the name of the oak, and place the bag in the refrigerator for several months until the acorn begins to sprout. Remove the bag from the refrigerator, plant the acorn in a pot filled with soil, water regularly, and wait until spring to replant the oak tree outside. Kathy reminded members that gardeners use soil, not dirt. For those who would like further information on oak trees, she recommended "The Sibley Guide to Trees."

MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER 15, 2016 MEETING, continued

Membership: Betsy and Barb Morrison encouraged members to introduce themselves to the guests attending our meetings; and to bring prospective new members to the December meeting at Terhune Orchard. Barb has membership forms.

Fall French Market: Christina Calloway and Betsy Hoover showed members the holiday packaging for the Amaryllis bulbs on sale this fall. The festive boxes include bulb, pot, soil, and instructions. Members should contact Christina or Betsy to pick up their bulbs if they did not attend the meeting. Betsy noted that there are fifteen extra bulb kits available for purchase. She thanked Emily Firmenich for providing the opportunity to sell 75 of the bulbs at a Christmas luncheon at Stuart Country Day School. Betsy anticipates sales of 300 bulbs. The profits from the sales will benefit the club's civic projects. Betsy alerted members that she will be taking orders for Beds and Borders plants at the January meeting. She will try to forward pictures of the available offerings to members, but also encouraged members to examine the Beds and Borders catalogue online. To increase revenues, Stony Brook Garden Club has been invited to participate in the Beds and Borders sale. Friends are welcome to buy plants as well.

Floral Design: Stephanie complimented entrants in the Floral Design "Centerpieces Abound" show. She noted that all the provisionals had submitted arrangements. Members asked several questions regarding the show the answers to two of which Stephanie wanted to share with everyone. First, judges do not like to see invasive plants, like ivy, in arrangements. Ivy, although pretty, should therefore be avoided. Secondly, to date, members have been forbidden to use fruits, vegetables and accessories in arrangements unless otherwise specified. In the future, members will be allowed to use whole fruit and accessories. These guideline changes will be further explained in the next newsletter.

There will be a workshop at Terhune Orchard after the December meeting on the many uses of orange pomanders. The cost will be \$25 per person. Friends are welcome.

Newsletter: Submissions are due on November 22, instead of November 24, because of Thanksgiving.

Photography: Linda Sedgewick suggested members visit the Carmen Herrera exhibit at the Whitney Museum. Both the photographs and the installation are magnificent. Linda also recommended an exhibit at the Barnes foundation entitled "The Masterworks of French Photography, 1890-1950." She and Maureen will contact the membership if they can organize a trip to the Barnes. Linda encouraged members with iPhones to take advantage of the photography classes offered at the Apple stores in Bridgewater and Quakerbridge Malls. Go to education at apple.com to see the available classes. Maureen Stellato encouraged members to take photographs and to consider entering the Photography

Show to be held on February 21. Submissions are due by February 7. Maureen and Linda are delighted to answer questions. The protocols for photograph submissions set forth in the Green Book are incorrect. The Photography Committee will publish the updated guidelines in the next newsletter. In the meantime, members should note that photographs should be mounted on black foam board instead of being matted. The Committee will hold a workshop on the use of Adobe Lightroom at Linda's house on November 29.

Announcements: As there were no announcements, the meeting was temporarily adjourned until the program could begin.

We trust you are taking lots of photographs on your smartphone or digital camera, do remember to familiarize yourself with our upcoming February Photography Show.

Please review carefully the following rules before submitting your photograph(s) on Tuesday, February 7, 2017. To note, special emphasis to bullet points 2, 6 and 9.

GCP Photography Guidelines for 2017

- Photography classes designated "novice" are for competitors who have never won a blue ribbon.
- An exhibitor may make only one entry in a class but may enter more than one class up to a total of four entries per show.
- Photographs that have won a blue ribbon in a Garden Club of America Flower Show or a Major Flower Show may not be entered again.
- Any kind of camera and film may be used.
- The photographs must be the work of the exhibitor. Matting, mounting, and printing may be done professionally.
- Any manipulation at the time of exposure, in the darkroom, by computer, or in the printing process is allowed in all classes, and must be the work of the exhibitor. This includes cropping of image, enhancement for color or clarity, removal of a part of the image, combining images, or distorting the original subject.
- All photography entries are limited to the subjects outlined in the purpose of The Garden Club of America such as horticulture, flower arrangement, gardens/landscapes, conservation/the environment, historic preservation and civic improvement, unless a non-complying class is in the schedule.
- If plant material in the image is identifiable, the common and botanical name(s) are required on the entry card and on the back of the photograph.
- Photographs must be flush mounted on black foam core with a total perimeter dimension **no larger** than 50" and no smaller than 36". Frames and glass are not permitted.
- Each entry must be labeled on the lower right back of the mat with the exhibitor's name, orientation of the photograph, class and section. Exhibitor's name must not be visible on the front of the photograph or mat.
- All photographs will be passed by the Photography Co-Chairs to verify that all class specifications have been met.

The Photography Chairs may reclassify an entry, but only with the permission of the photographer. The Photography Chairs may subdivide a class, but the judges may not reclassify an entry.
