Minutes of the April 18, 2017 GCP General Membership Meeting:

Welcome: Betsy Griffith thanked the program chairs, Piper Burrows and Mary Funsch, and the hostesses, Sharon Lorenzo and Kathleen Murphy. She read a note from Barbara Morrison and reported that Barbara Gallup is at home feeling better and thanked everyone for their well wishes. Betsy encouraged members to reach out to Barbara if they had not already done so.

Roll Call: Tracy Sipprelle made the roll call and a quorum was achieved.

Inspiration: Betsy read the Chinese proverb for inspiration: "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The next best time to plant a tree is today." Betsy then reported on the trees that she, Martha Sword and Kathy Enquist selected from the Pleasant Run Nursery to have for sale at the French Market on Arbor Day. She will be taking pre orders. The following native and non-native trees were chosen by Betsy, Martha, and Kathy for the sale:

Awards: Mary Funsch presented a "GCA Judge Emeritus" to Vicki Trainer. The plaque was issued in 2014.

Conservation: Helena Bienstock and Wendy Mager reported on their visit to the NAL meeting in Washington D.C.. Helena thanked Kathleen Biggins for her work on C- Change and mentioned she was the only presenter who received a standing ovation at the NAL meeting. Several topics were discussed at the NAL meetings, some of which included talks on waste management, food supply and the impact of climate change on the environment. Speakers included senators and congressman from both sides of the political aisle such as Ryan Costello, Republican Representative from PA and Sheldon Whitehouse, Democratic Representative from RI. Mrs. Whitehouse, wife of Representative Whitehouse, spoke on Ocean Conservatory. Wendy Mager mentioned the meetings with Representative Bonnie Watsman Coleman and Senator Cory Booker. Wendy reported that Rep. Coleman spoke on the importance of environmental jobs and hiring for National Parks. Senator Booker spoke on the importance of improving air quality and removing diesel, and clean water initiatives and encouraged that a C-Climate Change presentation be done for congressional staff. Menendez spoke on the elimination of drilling and the importance of contacting your senators about your concerns.

Floral Design: Stephanie Wedeking reminded everyone of the Floral Design Meeting at her home on Tuesday, April 25 at 11:45 a.m., which will include lunch. This is a time change from the green book. HISTORIAN, Barbara Chatham & Sandi Tatnall

Although The Garden Club of Princeton has reached its 116th anniversary, its history of giving annual awards actually began in1929 with the Genevieve Thompson Award, a vase given to the member who, in all aspects, contributed the most to the club during the previous year. The vase was donated by Genevieve Dallas Thompson who was an active member of the club from 1916 until 1925. Born and raised in St. Louis, she met her husband, a professor of mathematics at Princeton University, while visiting her sister in Princeton. Their first home was at 11 Morven Place, but after the death of her husband, she moved to the Princeton Inn. A very attractive and popular member, she served as treasurer during her affiliation with the club. Since then, the club has expanded its array of awards to include exceptional achievement in horticulture, artistic design, conservation, and photography, among others.

Pre-registration is required for each of three classes in the **Floral Design Show**: A) Botanical Arts Brooch, limited to 6 entries; B) Isn't it Romantic, limited to 4 entries; C) A Placement Class to be judged as a par class, limited to 6 entries.
