Minutes of the October 13, 2015 Meeting

WELCOME: President Debbie Jordan called to order the General Membership Meeting of The Garden Club of Princeton held at D&R Greenway. She thanked our hostesses, Helena Bienstock and Charlotte McLaughlin, for their hospitality.

ATTENDANCE was taken and a quorum established.

MINUTES of the May and September meetings were approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Visiting Gardens: Barbara Gallup reminded members going on the October 21 trip to Storm King that the bus will leave promptly at 7:30 a.m. A light breakfast will be provided. Lunch requests had to be submitted to Barbie Bromley by October 13. Barbara encouraged everyone to wear comfortable shoes. She noted that the bus has a bathroom.

Civic Projects: Emily Firmenich thanked those who turned out for the first clean-up at Memorial Park and asked everyone to come for another workday on November 3 to prepare for Veterans' Day. The Committee is researching the costs of purchasing and installing plants for Phase 2 of the park restoration.

Conservation: Pam Mount announced a talk concerning climate change and the shoreline to be given on October 16, from 5:30 to 7:30 at Stony Brook Millstone Watershed by Bill Golden. Mr. Golden drafted the rules that led to the establishment of the EPA, inspired the clean-up of Boston Harbor and, most recently, founded a not-for-profit dedicated to the protection and restoration of American shorelines.

Katherine Dresdner announced two upcoming movie opportunities. The first, on the migration of monarch butterflies, will be shown on November 5 at the Morristown AMC theater and is sponsored by the Garden Club of Morristown. The cost will be \$10 per person. The second, entitled "Mission Blue," concerns the life and work of acclaimed oceanographer Sylvia Earle. It will be held at Margaret Sieck's house at 7:30 on Tuesday, October 20. Katherine has the milkweed plants previously ordered by members. The price has increased to \$3.00 per plant.

Floral Design: Betsy Griffith and Stephanie Wedeking described the three floral design classes that will constitute the show at our November 17 General Meeting. All three classes, botanical arts, floral hats and art in bloom arrangements, will be part of the Zone Show. This is a great opportunity to prepare for participation on the Zone level in May.

Garden History and Design: Meg Michael reported that the committee enjoyed a luncheon meeting held last week at her house. She asked members to look for news regarding a February workshop to be led by Elizabeth Wisler on designing a simple garden.

Horticulture: Kathy Enquist urged members to complete their amaryllis orders, noting that this year's bulbs are appreciably larger than previous bulbs. The kits are nicely wrapped and include instructions; they will make great holiday gifts. She reminded provisionals and interested members that the bulb-forcing workshop will be this Friday, October 16, at her house and be led by Cynthia Larsen. The rain location is the barn at Terhune Orchards. She recommended that members attend the Horticulture and Conservation Lunch and Learn Program at 11:00 on November 10 at the Present Day Club. Tom Schuler, the state apiarist, will speak about the challenges faced by bees and the ways we as gardeners and conservationists can help them. The cost will be \$35 per person and registration and checks should be given to Kathy.

Membership: Mary Hulme asked everyone to remember that proposals are due by February 1. It is time to think about possible candidates for membership.

Morven: Debbie Jordan informed the Club that after meeting with the chairs, Jenn Fenton and Cynthia Larsen and the Morven staff, it was decided to decorate Morven's front porch in a Colonial Revival style inspired by Williamsburg. The full committee will meet in the near future. Anyone interested in helping to assemble and install the decorations should set aside the morning of November 23.

Return of the Natives! Zone IV Meeting November Update: Molly Finnell

Members of Garden Club of Princeton will be invited to hear our key speakers during the May 4-5 Zone meeting. Here is a preview:

William Cullina holds degrees from the University of Connecticut and Hobart and William Smith Colleges in New York. During the 13 years he was the nursery director and head propagator at the New England Wildflower Society, he developed the largest native plant nursery in New England. The organization produces 75,000 woody and herbaceous plants annually for garden and restoration use. In 2008, he joined the staff at the Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens in Boothbay and has been its executive director since 2011. He has written several books on native plants ranging from woody plants to herbaceous perennials and grasses. His book, Understanding Perennials: A New Look at an Old Favorite, is a guide for gardeners to provide environments where perennials will thrive. In his role at the Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens, it is evident that Mr. Cullina excels at landscape design. There the gardens feature a broad array of native and non-native plants put together with great skill, creating one beautiful vignette after another. However, he considers himself primarily an educator, which bodes well for his talk at the Zone Show.

<u>Donald J. Leopold</u> has been studying native plants for nearly 30 years. He earned his Ph.D. in forest ecology from Purdue University in 1984, his master's in forest ecology from the University of Kentucky in 1981, and a B.S. in ornamental horticulture and nursery management from the University of Kentucky in 1978. In 1985, he joined the Faculty of Environmental and Forest Biology at the State University of New York College of Environmental Science and Forestry in Syracuse, New York. He has taught courses in dendrology, plant materials, freshwater wetland ecology, and numerous graduate seminars on conservation and restoration topics.

Currently, he is Distinguished Teaching Professor at SUNY. Dr. Leopold has published over 50 peer-reviewed papers, four other books, six book chapters, five book reviews, three proceedings, and many miscellaneous publications, all generally about topics in forest and wetland ecology.

One of his publications is a book called <u>Native Plants of the Northeast</u>, a <u>Guide for Gardening and Conservation</u>. "If you've always wanted to garden with native plants, this book is for you. With entries for nearly 700 species of native trees, shrubs, vines, ferns, grasses, and wildflowers from the northeastern quarter of the U.S. and eastern Canada, its comprehensive horticultural coverage is unsurpassed by any other single volume."

The Horticulture Committee will be selling daffodil, tulip and paperwhite bulbs at the next meeting. Top grade Dutch Master daffodil and Monsella tulip bulbs, the same bulbs that members potted up for forcing at the Bulb Forcing Workshop, will be sold in bags of 15 bulbs for \$10. Plant to beautify your yard and at the same time grow entries for The Club April Daffodil Show. To see pictures of the tulips, see vanengelan.com on line. Monsella is a beautiful early double tulip that is fragrant!

Also for sale will be paperwhite bulbs sold 10 in a bag for \$10. The variety we have ordered, called Paperwhite Nir, is one of the best paperwhites introduced to date, says the COLORBLENDS catalogue. The stems are shorter, and therefore much less likely to flop than those of Ziva, the standard variety. Its flowers are larger and showier and its sweet fragrance, while strong, is not overpowering. Each bulb will produce 2-3 sturdy stems crowned with clusters of white flowers. Allow 5-6 weeks from planting to bloom. Irresistable!

Amaryllis bulbs: Pick up for bulb orders will be at the November meeting, or by special arrangement.

HISTORIAN: SANDI TATNALL

The Garden Club of Princeton has been a presence in the Princeton community for a long time. Looking at the list of the Charter Members of 1911 you will see many names which are memorialized throughout the town to this day. One of the many distinguished members was Mrs. Alan Marquand, wife of the head of the University's Art Department. Mrs. Marquand accompanied Mrs. Russell to the meeting in Philadelphia at which the plan to organize a national garden club, to be called The Garden Club of America, was formulated in 1913.

She was also a vice president of our club and became a recognized authority on the symbolism and representation of flowers in records of the past. She was able to identify, locate and date trees and flowers represented in books and paintings of great antiquity. Princeton University awarded Mrs. Marquand an honorary M.A. in recognition of her scholarship. The knowledge she acquired enabled The Institute for Advanced Study to identify time periods of paintings, manuscripts and sculpture. In 1948 the Garden Club of America awarded her the Buckley Medal.

Next time you pass Marquand Park, which was the land surrounding her home, Guernsey Hall, pause and give a thought to our renowned Charter member. Mrs. Marquand lived at Guernsey Hall from her early years as a bride in 1896 until her death in 1950.
