The President's Message

From my August garden of butterflies, bees and hummingbirds,

Although my garden is parched and punctuated with thistle, weeds, Japanese beetles and spent blooms, it is also a destination for visiting butterflies, bees and hummingbirds, joining the ever present cardinals, robins and rabbits, easily distracting my eye from the necessary work at hand. I was so happy to see the butterflies join my other garden friends. Although I have not seen a Monarch, many other varieties are plying my buddleia and coneflower.

Fortunately, many of our members have spotted Monarchs in various gardens and locations in the Princeton area, both in town and in surrounding open fields. Sometimes the Monarchs are dancing around the familiar butterfly plantings enjoyed by all varieties of butterflies and bees. Some of our members have spotted Monarchs following the GCP branch of the Monarch Highway, feasting on milkweed planted in our gardens.

At War Memorial Park, recently, the Town of Princeton removed invasive, overgrown ivy and dead and dying trees and shrubbery as promised. This fall, we plan to partner with the Town and other stakeholders to plant dogwoods and a crabapple to match existing plantings, recreating the symmetrical design at the sides and immediate back of the bench in keeping with the 1967 Butler Plan. In June, a small but dedicated crew of GCP members and our Shade Tree Commission friend, Joanne Diaz, pruned back the existing azaleas and we plan to shape the existing rhododendron in a similar fashion in the near future. In consultation with the D&R's native plant experts, we will use the winter to plan new beds of native plantings for the back of the Park, including a bed of butterfly plantings, taking advantage of the light provided by the Town's removals. In the meantime, the Town will mulch the bare soil to improve the appearance of the Park while it is in transition and keep down the dust. We will continue to enjoy our display of annuals, roses and boxwood in the front planters. Please stop by to view the changes. Interestingly, in addition to the changes at Memorial Park, someone has planted a sizable pink crepe myrtle, now in bloom, at Mercer I. Park. When I made inquiries, the Town arborist stated that she did not know who had done so.

In addition to our continued work on the Monarch Highway and War Memorial Park, we will enjoy a wonderful year studying "Native Plants that Attract Pollinators", building a "Solar Suitcase", and co-hosting the 2016 Zone IV Meeting and Flower Show. We will compete in Floral Design, Hort and Photography Shows, hear stellar speakers including Rick Darke (at a joint meeting with Stony Brook GC) and travel to Storm King and the Philadelphia Flower Show. On the evening of September 12, we will kick off the year with our spouses and friends at "Cocktails, Cackles and Sunset", a gathering at the gracious home of John and Betsy Griffith. ATTENDANCE: Attendance was taken and a quorum established.

APPROVAL OF FEBRUARY AND APRIL MINUTES: Minutes of the February 17, 2015 and April 21, 2015 meetings were moved by Betsy Hoover, seconded by Tommye Schiro and approved by the membership.

COMMITTEE SIGNUPS: Betsy passed around the signup list for 2015-2016 committees.

TREASURER: Marlene Doyle reminded everyone that dues can be paid today and encouraged all to consider a contribution to the Education Fund when paying annual dues.

Marlene encouraged all to remit expenses to her as soon as possible and no later than May 31 so the budget for next year can be finalized.

ZONE IV SHOW: Co-Chair of the Zone Show, Molly Finnell, presented an up-to-date overview of the Zone Show "Return of the Natives" scheduled for May 4-5, 2016. She indicated that it was an ambitious show and will require a lot of volunteers. She will call on members to act as volunteers closer to show time.

MONARCH HIGHWAY EFFORT: Sophie Glovier and Emily Firmenich presented a slide show documenting the partnership efforts of The Garden Club of Princeton with other non-profit groups to promote the monarch highway efforts.

They presented a proposal for the membership to vote on using monies remaining in the Monarch Highway "account":

Motion: Grants totaling \$1,350 to FOPOS (\$350) for the pollinator/monarch butterfly garden at Mountain Lakes and to Howell Farm (\$1,000) for establishing a garden at their location. Vote: Betsy Hoover moved, Katherine Dresdner seconded, membership approved.

If you cannot perform your job, please find a replacement and inform one of the captains. Please consult GCP website for a detailed description of the duties of a Captain, Passer, Clerk, Runner, and Placer.

Class A: Edibles from your Garden

- 1. Fruits and Vegetables
 - a. Fruits.
 - 1. A collection of fruits shown on your own terra cotta saucer.
 - 2. A single sample of a fruit shown on your own terra cotta saucer.
 - b. Vegetables.
 - 1. A collection of vegetables shown on your own terra cotta saucer.
 - 2. A single vegetable shown on your own terra cotta saucer.
 - 2. A collection of five diferent herbs, one stem of each, artistically arranged in a clear glass container to be Supplied by the exhibitor. Each stem is to be listed on the entry card. Judging will be based 60% on horticulture and 40% on artistic merit.

Class B: Flowers – Best Blooms from your Garden

One stem per exhibit unless otherwise noted.

- 1. Annuals
- 2. Perennials
 - a. New Jersey Natives
 - b. Cultivars of New Jersey Natives
 - c. Non-Natives
- 3. Biennials
- 4. Non-Hardy Perennials and Shrubs
- 5. Shrubs branch height not to exceed 26"
 - a. New Jersey Natives
 - b. Cultivars of New Jersey Natives
 - c. Non-Natives
- 6. Bulbs, Tubers and Rhizomes

Class C: Collection featuring a New Jersey Native Aster (new botanical name is Symphyotrichum)

Collection of 3 stems or branches featuring one flowering stem of a New Jersey native Aster or cultivar of a New Jersey native Aster, and two stems of two different plants (not Aster), which may or may not be in flower. Cut specimen collection to be displayed in a clear, un-colored, un-cut, un-etched glass container supplied by the exhibitor. Judging will be based on 60% horticultural and 40% artistic merit.

Class D: Roses (Rosa)

- 1. Single stems. One bloom on one five-leafed stem, grown without pesticides.
- 2. Single stems. One bloom on one five-leafed stem, grown with pesticides.
- 3. Single stem. More than one bloom on a five-leafed stem, grown without pesticides.
- 4. Single stem. More than one bloom on a five-leafed stem, grown with pesticides.

Class E: Succulent Container Garden

A collection of at least 3 different succulents displayed in a trough * not to exceed 18 inches in diameter/diagonal inside measurement. Key card required. Judging will be based on 60% horticultural and 40% artistic merit.

*Troughs shall be defined as a hyper tufa, stone-like or cement container of any shape.

Class F: A Bloom from the Garden of a Provisional

A bloom or flowering stem from the garden of a provisional, entered by that provisional with the assistance of her proposer.

Class G: Par (See Rules)

Class H: Educational Merit (See Rules)

All classes will be subdivided as necessary. Please see Garden Club of Princeton Horticulture Rules.
