


The focus of this meeting was on how parents/guardians can support students at home.

Library and Online Databases

As you can see in the adjacent photo, Ms. Church, DeWitt Librarian, passed out bookmarks with info about online databases that children can access at school or at home. I've included a scan of the front and back of the bookmark below, but I can't include the passwords online, so please contact Ms. Church to get the login information. The children do not need to enter the passwords in school, because of the way the computers are set up. The instructions for getting to the databases are on one side of the bookmark, and the descriptions of the databases are on the other.







Mr. Gottlieb Shares Ideas from the Perspective of 7th Grade Teachers

I've included a scan of Mr. Gottlleib's notes below. To summarize and/or to highlight a few things not in the notes, Mr. Gottlieb said that 7th grade is a time when students should be becoming independent, and parents' role is to let them become independent, but pay attention and see how it goes. You can get onto School Tools to check grades on an ongoing basis—different teachers update these on varying schedules.

Allow independence:

As a student practices being independent, in addition to the points on the notes, be aware that the teachers would rather see a poorly done project that student did by themselves than see a great one, but suspect that the parent helped. Also, keep in mind that students may need help with buying supplies. And, they may need help thinking about situations wherein they might want to work ahead.

But, if independence isn't working...

Check that backpack doesn't contain a sort of compost pile of a mess and that assignment book is reasonably filled out. More suggestions in handout.

But what if it gets really bad?

- Step in and take more control. Ask to see homework before it's turned in and check assignment book.
- Call or email teachers to see if work is being turned in.

Talk to the PTA

Will present some types of communication between teachers and parents.

First: Middle school is a time when parents should back off to see how independent their students are.

We encourage you to keep an eye on your student, but let them be independent

- · Make sure they have time to do homework
- · Make sure they have a quiet place
- · Make sure they do not have irresistible distractions
- · Help them if they ask, but don't do the work for them.
- · If absent, help them find the homework on homework pages.

When it becomes clear that your student is not working independently, it's time to step in to help. (teacher calls or low grades)

- A. Check to see if they are organized (Check backpack)
 - · How are classes organized?
 - Where is homework?
 - · Do they keep their assignment book filled out?
- B. Take a way distractions
 - · Insist that they do homework before other things
 - Remove electronic devices until homework is done.
 - · Natural consequences for low grades

If they need more help. (no improvement in grades)

- C. Know the homework
 - · Go to the teacher's homepages and get the homework
 - · Ask your student to show you the homework before turning it in.
 - · Check their assignment book regularly
 - Call or E-mail teachers to find out if work is being turned in before grades come
 out.

How do you know what homework is assigned to your child?

Mr. Gottleib demoed how to use the Web to see the actual homework. Teachers are learning how to update the homework pages more efficiently—it requires learning new skills.

On the ICSD Web site (http://www.icsd.k12.ny.us/), on the button bar at the top, go to Grades 6-12 and choose DeWitt Middle and then click on Classes & Staff. This will open a page that Mr. Gottleib is maintaining. For many teachers it has a link that will lead to details about what's happening in class and/or what the home work is (If a teacher has nothing listed on the Web

page, get in touch with him or her.). The page is at http://www.icsd.k12.ny.us/dewitt/index.php?

You can also go to http://www.icsd.k12.ny.us/dewitt/ and on that page there is a Staff Directory button and a Teams button. Be sure to check out your child's team!

This led to a comments about the different online tools that teachers are learning and exploring in order to post homework and other info online. Tools being used include Edmodo, Blackbird, and Google Docs. It was expressed that there will always be new tools coming along that are better than before, and it can be difficult for teachers and parent to keep up, but this fact seems to be part of the lay of the land.

Ms. Volckmar Shares Ideas from the Perspective of 8th Grade Teachers

Ms. Volckmar passed out a list of comments and suggestions, and it is included below. She also offered these words of hope: they really do listen and pay attention to what you do and how you live and what you say to them, and they will follow your lead even if they are testing you constantly now. So, be of good cheer.

A few things that were emphasized or that are not in the handout:

- An example of knowing your kid, is knowing if your child tends to conceal if things are not going well.
- Vigorous exercise can be extremely helpful for smoothing out emotional ups and downs.
- Watch out for a roller coaster of good grades, relaxing effort on schoolwork, and recovery back to good grades.

Here is the list, copied and pasted from a Word file that Ms. Volckmar used for the handout:

Eighth Grade Team Suggestions for Parents, in Aid of Student Success

Parents are a child's first and most important teacher. Your child really is listening and learning from your guidance and example.

You know your own child. Trust your instincts about his/her strengths and areas needing structure and support.

These are good and helpful:

- Middle schoolers typically need 9 hours of sleep a night for optimal alertness.
- Vigorous exercise promotes physical, emotional and mental health.
- It is not truly possible to concentrate effectively on more than one verbal source of input at a time. Therefore avoid/prevent doing homework simultaneously with texting, Facebooking, Internet surfing, and TV watching, or listening to music with lyrics.
- Help your child keep an organized backpack and binder, and an orderly place to do schoolwork.
- Help your child come to class prepared with materials: paper, pencil, pen, etc.
- Communicate with your child's teachers at regular intervals about your child's progress.
- Help your child have a safe and focused place in which to do homework.

Parent question: How much should parents participate in writing assignments?

Ms. V answers: Depends on the kid. In 7th and 8th grade, a kid's developmental mission is to become independent. So, kids may not want help. So, it depends on the kid and the parent-child relationship. Help with grammar, capitalization, run-ons, for example, can be good. It can be a great chance for a partnership between child and parent, but parent should be a tutor—goal is that child can write just as well in in-class assignments.

Mr. G. adds: In terms of writing for science. Good if parents take the opportunity to help, so long as it is a learning experience for the child, not just for the purpose of making it better.

8th Grade End of Year Trip Plans

Ms. Volckmar talked about this, but the write-up in the PTA email list the next day was much better than my notes, so I've inserted it here from the email:

May 11th Field Trip for 8th Graders to Ellis Island and NYC

The 8th grade teachers are finalizing plans for a grade level trip on May 11, 2012 to Ellis Island and New York City. We will visit Ellis Island in the morning for a tour and program that supplements our Social Studies/English unit on Immigration. In the afternoon, we will split into several interest groups for tours of many different NYC sites, including museums, monuments, and historical areas.

We will leave DeWitt at 5:00 am and return by 11:00 pm. In the afternoon, each group of 12 students will be supervised by two adults, one teacher and one parent volunteer. The trip cost per child will be approximately \$80.00, most of which covers the cost of chartered buses.

Our commitment is for every child to go, so numerous fundraisers and requests for donations will be organized to reach this goal. A more detailed letter will be sent home before the Thanksgiving holiday. In that letter, we will be asking for the following: student permission to attend, parent volunteers to help chaperone, parent volunteers to help with fundraising, and a \$20.00 deposit. Our first fundraiser was the Nov 10th dance, from which all proceeds will go towards the Ellis Island trip. If you have ideas for fundraisers or have any other questions, please get in touch with an 8th grade teacher.

Co-President's Report (Vanessa Wagner)

- Vanessa thanks various people for help with various events.
- The school directory is being printed.
- PTA direct appeal has raised \$1100+ so far.
- PTA is planning a fundraiser on February 4.

Shivaun walked us through the financial information shown on her written report. I've included a scan of the report below.

Principal's Report (Mr. Knight)

- Mr. Knight is now officially full-time after hip resurfacing procedure.
- Mr. Knight shared some booklets that he has in his office. They have tips and ideas about helping middle schoolers in school. He has shared some of the tips from those booklets in a recent PTA newsletter.
- He has the idea of adding some of these tips to the homework planners, in future years.
- He also has the idea of doing a mini-bootcamp for the first few days of school, which would focus on general skills to be successful: note taking, time management, organization, etc.
- Because of scores on the most recent ELA testing, DeWitt is a SINI school with respect to students with disabilities. (SINI stands for School in Need of Improvement)

This is because not enough students with disabilities scored above Level 2. Mr. Knight is working on submitting a report about this to the state. State will then review and send back recommendations. Based on those recs. DeWitt must create a plan for use next school year. Some of the problem is with the recent change in the cut score for what was needed to get a Level 3. Mr. Knight is seeing this as an opportunity to improve. (About 2/3 of the middle schools in NYS are SINI schools, for one reason or another.)

• Tip from Mr. Knight: Be vigilant about how your student is using electronic devices especially with respect to socialization and etiquette.

Next PTA meeting is January 9. This is a change from the previously planned date. The meeting will be about nutrition.
