A View from the Pew

You Get What You Give

Our journey with St. Stephen's began more than 27 years ago. We were expecting our first child and wanted to find a church where our son could be baptized. I was brought up Presbyterian and my husband was raised Catholic. I was always fairly regular in my church attendance. For various and understandable reasons, my spouse took the usual path of a young adult and church attendance dropped off significantly. Ironically, we were married in the same Catholic Church as all of his brothers, sisters, and extended family were married, but we both knew the Catholic Church was not for us. We casually stumbled around various churches in the area but struggled to find the one with the right fit. We wanted a church where both of us felt familiar with the service and where we were able to find some similarities to how we remembered church on a Sunday

morning. Fortunately for us, the morning we walked into St. Stephen's, Jonathan magically incorporated fly-fishing and hunting into his sermon. One look from my husband said it all, "I think I found my church!" As they say, the rest is history...

Well, not quite...

We were young and little did either of us realize we had much to learn about the importance of community and family within a church. For us, church was what you did on a Sunday morning to fulfill your Christian obligation. Attending church on Sunday mornings was also necessary to set a good example for our children. We did not consider parishioners as family. No one other than immediate family needed to get involved in our personal life or know of any health issue; these were personal and private matters not to be shared with others. In our early years at St. Stephen's our attendance was sporadic, our involvement was nonexistent, and our financial contribution was minimal. When we did attend church, it was our practice to slip out the front doors to avoid fellowship hour so we wouldn't get trapped in



a conversation with someone, make new acquaintances, or perhaps even worse, to be asked to get involved!

As time marched on our family grew and my husband's career advanced. We settled into a convenient pattern for church attendance that fit our life. Every fall our attendance was fairly regular, consistent with the whole back to school so back to church philosophy. We attended almost weekly through the end of the year, until our attendance dropped off again in the beginning of the year. We would get motivated and start back again around Easter and then as the school year ended, so did our attendance at church. Going to church in the summer was never tops on our list until one day, my middle son asked if he could attend Vacation Bible School since we don't go to church in the summer. He made it very clear to us he wanted to go to any VBS at any church that caught his eye. Out of the mouths of babes...so much for setting a good example for our family.

We cringed when we would get the occasional phone call from Jonathan subtly inquiring about our spotty attendance. He had that special gift of not making you feel guilty when he could have easily done so. Jonathan's phone call would prompt us to pick up our attendance for a short period. As the years went on our attendance gradually increased and Jonathan gently convinced my husband to join the vestry. A few years later as our two older boys were in middle school, St. Stephen's started the Journey to Adulthood program and I joined the program as an adult leader.

The little elderly woman who often feels alone beams with a smile at the sight of you wrestling with your little one. She's been there before. She knows how hard it can be, but she smiles because to hear that brings back precious memories. To see young parents and their small children brighten her day, and she may have just received bad news this week about her health, but seeing the vitality of young ones removes — if but for a moment — her fears.



The older man who always seems to be grouchy notices you too. He's always talking about how children in this day have no respect or sense of good. But, he sees you — a young family — in church, and you don't miss any gathering. Like clockwork, he can depend on the sight of you and your young family. You give him hope that maybe the church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who love God enough to bring their restless children to worship.

Bring your children to church. If you don't hear crying, the church is dying. As hard as it might be for you as a parent who's half-asleep, keep on doing what you're doing. You are an encouragement, and you're starting off your children's lives as you should.
