

The Anticipation

When I was a kid my family made a much bigger deal out of Advent than we do today. We had an Advent wreath in the center of the dining room table – and not a single sign of a Christmas decoration till after the fourth Sunday of Advent. Each Sunday we would light one more candle while my father said a special prayer for that Sunday. Of course for us kids, we saw each additional candle lit as one week closer to Christmas. Believe me, the feelings of anticipation and longing were not lost on us!

I grew up in the middle of a family of ten and we could stir each other up into a frenzy of anticipation! Besides the Advent wreath, there were other signs that the big day was getting closer. My parents would be talking about when to get a tree, Mom would start digging out the Christmas decorations and then the weekly shopping trip would bring “exotic” and wonderful treats into the house to be shared in our Christmas Feast – talk about anticipation! We didn’t see our Grandparents very often and a visit from them was always a special time, especially at Christmas. When my Dad would announce at the dinner table that he had spoken to my grandparents that day and they were going to be with us on Christmas, the reaction around the room was something like Bob Cratchit’s wife bringing the Christmas pudding to the table.



We had a nativity set that was one of the first signs of Christmas to be displayed in a place of honor in our living room. When I got old enough to be trusted with the figurines, I was given the task to put the scene together. I always felt honored to be entrusted with this task. I would form hills from crumpled shopping bags, blue construction paper made the midnight sky and a strategically placed Christmas bulb, the light from the Star. The result was a diorama of the first Christmas – almost. The baby Jesus was not put in the manger. I still love to set up our Nativity set in much the same way.

The anticipation peaked about 6:00 am on Christmas morning. Someone would awake with an urgent need to use the bathroom. Our only bathroom was downstairs just off the living room where the wonders of a child’s Christmas awaited us. The bathroom goer returned upstairs to report their findings. Soon all were awake. Now the rule in our house was the no one was allowed downstairs till we all came downstairs together. So when my parents would hear us, they would prepare the room. The tree was lit and we were called to come down. The look on my parents faces, as they watched our reaction to the revealed bounty before us was something I’ll never forget. Amid the “oohs” and “aahs,” we were reminded to look at the nativity and see that the baby Jesus had arrived.



I think this has been a year of anticipation and even a little anxiety at St. Stephen’s. We wait with eager anticipation the calling of our next spiritual leader. But I think we are also a bit anxious about our future. What will the next chapter of our faith together at St. Stephen’s look like? What are we being called to do as missionaries of Christ? How will we ...? And so on.

Grasp onto that childhood anticipation and leave the adult anxiety aside. Jesus’ birthday is coming! Embrace that same feeling of awe we experienced as a child as the bounty of Christ’s love is revealed to us. Feel it again as we await the miracle of the birth of Jesus our Savior in a stable in Bethlehem – and believe that HE came to show us the way. HE understands our feelings of anticipation but not our anxiety. Merry Christmas to all!

Buildings & Grounds Update

As usual, buildings and ground had another successful year for completing church projects and getting our building back up to snuff. The Clydesdales were busy as usual. After a productive spring cleanup, we removed the abandoned lawn mower behind the shed (took 3 weeks getting it into the dumpster).

After the backflow testing was completed, two new water valves were installed for the outside water system; summer preventative maintenance were performed on all the furnaces. We installed a new heat vent for the Narthex. Two new sprinkler control boxes were installed, which made Jackie Ingersoll happy to keep her flowers watered. We also installed four vents in the shed to improve ventilation.

We installed a secure mail box to prevent future mail theft. The dead tree in front of the school was cut down and headed off to never-never land. The City of Troy Fire Marshall inspected and reported on our building. The proper amount of people for the parish hall is now posted on the wall (mainly for rentals). We repaired the faucet in the handicap bathroom. The outside sprinkler system was properly winterized for the season. (Another price bargain). We replaced the rooftop furnace motor for the Gathering Area. We painted the church sign out front and the shield on the building. And I must say, it turned out extremely well.

Our two large summer jobs involved the parking lot and Memorial Garden. The vendor we hired to sealcoat, crack fill, and stripe the parking lot did a magnificent job. We watched and observed the job to make sure there was no skimping on material used. Our faith in humanity was briefly restored for a day or two.

We replaced the Memorial Garden furnace and A/C unit. Another deal by the Clydesdales. The water heater was moved and brought up to city code. We cleaned out the furnace room and expect it to stay cleaned since it will no longer be used for storage.

And finally, the roof leaks will be fixed as soon as



the weather cooperates and melts the snow off the roof. The roofer has done an excellent job so far, as we are watching his every move. We have made excellent progress this year on getting our building back in shape.

Our list is finally getting smaller and under control for next season. Until then.

Judy Lazzaro

Judy Lazzaro and her family joined St. Stephens in 1994. Judy was Catholic, her husband Jim was Presbyterian, and St. Stephens was a compromise for both of them. Judy called the church and heard Jonathan Sams' recording. He was warm, open and welcoming. Later, they found out that Phil and Linda Pierce, their next door neighbors, were members at the church.

Judy has been a Sunday school teacher, served on the Communication and Welcome committees and the Vestry, and on Outreach. She has organized the Red Cross blood drives at the church, worked at SOS, and collected Kroger donations for years.



She is involved with Samaritas, a refugee organization, which provides many opportunities that fit her schedule. Judy's grandparents were immigrants and she wanted to work with refugees. She has worked with refugees from Syria and Iraq, driving them to English as a Second Language classes. With the number of refugees decreasing, Judy's work decreased.

Earlier this year, Judy has been involved, with several other volunteers through Samaritas, with a family from the Democratic Republic of Congo. Judy drives family members, only one of whom speaks English. This is outside her comfort zone, but she is honored to do the work. Judy's work demonstrates her Christian beliefs in action.





I don't know the real reason for their departure, I'm sure each family has different reasons. This trend happened regardless of who the rector happened to be at the time.

We talk about Family a lot when we discuss the St. Stephens community. For me, St. Stephens has been very much like a family. And because of that connection I can't imagine attending any other church. Which brings me to a question I struggle to understand. We were having too much fun worshipping and growing alongside our "Family".


Please consider crafting a gift for someone in need of a crafter willing to care for someone unknown to you.



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
