#### Playing with Parables

ne of my favorite Bible scholars is a Jewish Professor of New Testament (yep, you read that right) named Amy-Jill Levine. I've had the pleasure of hearing her lecture on the topic of Jesus the Rabbi, especially on his use of the illustrations and short stories we call parables. Prof. Levine insists that a good teacher like Jesus would leave his stories open-ended, forcing the listener (back then and us now) to draw their own conclusions.

This summer, our Sunday Gospel passages have featured some of Jesus' best known. The word "parable" is related to the word "parallel," and means "set alongside." Imagine parallel bars for gymnasts: they don't intersect, but they are related. A parable is not an allegory, where each character or action is meant to be something else, though you would get this idea from Matthew's telling.

For instance, Matthew 13:1-9 tells the familiar parable of the sower tossing seed onto all kinds of soil. Later in the chapter, there's the explanation that "The seeds are God's words, the soil is people, the birds are Evil One... "This tidy correlation is likely a later insertion by "Matthew" to help his confused audience. Which was nice of him, but maybe not what Jesus had hoped for, because it directs one's imagination.

I think Jesus wants his audience to be imaginative, to associate his illustrations with other things they know (like farming, or fishing, or bread-baking, depending on the parable). Similarly, I think we could develop our own parables the draw on what we know best! Come on, use your imagination with me.

The reign of God is like secretary who knows every client by name and makes them each feel like an old friend when they stop by her desk.

Or, The work of God's people is like sprinklers going off in the early morning before the household wakes up, watering the yard secretly so the children have soft, green grass that gives them joy at playtime.

Here's my idea for a fun summer challenge: Think up some parables or metaphors of your own, write them on a card or paper, and drop them into the collection box I'm placing at the back of the worship space. This is an All Ages Challenge. Later in September we will open the box and let the Sunday School illustrate our parables, creating a home-grown collection as part of their own study of parables this Fall.

I encourage your creativity! If you need more inspiration, take another look at Matthew ch. 13, which contains a string of short parables. Or Luke ch. 10 for a long one (the Good Samaritan). And enjoy the journeys your imagination might take, as you enter the scenes our Savior describes.

#### An Adventure in the City

The Urban Adventure in June was an excellent example of our youth in action on many levels. From the very beginning of the three-day weekend the J2A group looked for and found numerous opportunities to grow as individuals and as a community.

Highlights included a wet Friday night as we all experience the fountain at Navy Pier, failing quickly in our plans to dodge the water and stay dry. Since we had traveled by van and then train to Chicago that day, then walked with our bags to the hotel and to dinner, we were all ready for some cool-down time, so it worked out just fine.

Saturday, walking wasn't the problem, but the bus and commuter rail system was the challenge of the day. From Wrigley Field to the "Bean", the crew rode and trudged around the city finding over a dozen landmarks and executing a route that was challenging for even the seasoned city traveler. With the exception of one bus ride that was so long it created some "facility-challenged moments", the group survived the trek.

Sunday was an amazing day of service, starting with Eucharist in the chapel at St. James Cathedral. The church provides a wonderful meal for the area homeless twice each month in the diocesan center adjacent to the Cathedral. We specifically planned to be there to help with this incredible outreach event.

All of us were put to work immediately after the Eucharist ended, setting tables and preparing food for about 140 people. This meal included ham, chicken, grilled sausage, tossed

salad, grilled onions and peppers, rolls, and more! It was a feast and everyone ate all they wanted, including seconds and thirds for those who wanted it.

Desert was ice cream and fixin's lovingly served by our youth to the very, very appreciative recipients. In addition, our kids had fixed bag lunches for all the folks as well, so the folks all left with another meal for the day!

When it was over, all of us felt so blessed to have been there to experience this incredible gift to the homeless and to us by the people of St. James. They were so appreciative that one of the staff who works at every meal made it a point to say several times that our youth were the best workers he had ever had! And they were.

Thanks to all of you who made this incredible trip possible by your prayerful support and thanks especially to Alan Giles and Anna Dorsey for their amazing leadership and guidance. I know that the Urban Adventure for our J2A group was an important rite of passage and that the weekend will be valuable as a key element in their continued growth as a community in Christ.

The trip began with a long day of driving followed by two days of mission work in Charleston, WV. This included cleaning, scraping, painting, and even repairing a cement step.

The days were hot but all of us were refreshed by the overwhelmed appreciation of those we were helping. During our evening reflections several in the group mentioned that they had been told by the ladies we were assisting that nobody in their neighborhood would help them and that the work they had done was a blessing.

The next stop was the New River for a day of whitewater rafting. This was the real deal. With many class 5 rapids to negotiate, every-



one got wet, laughed all day, were seriously challenged by the river and shared an experience they

will never forget. Since the previous night was in a bunkhouse with hard beds and no air, the ride to DC after the raft trip was pretty quiet!

In Washington D.C. Mo. Susan led us on a journey that would last two days in Washington and conclude at Gettysburg on Saturday. We considered our freedom and the price that

has been paid for that freedom, as well as what our own convictions are and what sacrifices we would make.

This journey included visits to Arlington National Cemetery, the Vietnam, Korean, and

WWII war memorials, the National Cathedral, and finally the battlefield at Gettysburg.



The reflections and dis-

cussions that were part of this were thoughtprovoking and indicative of the considerable spiritual depth of our youth. We all learned much from the experience and from each other.

Along the way we all were thoroughly entertained by the lively discussions that covered every imaginable topic and were often punctuated with the unmistakable, infectious laugh that Mr. Armstrong shared liberally. The group traveled together effortlessly, making the most of every opportunity.

Through days of hard work, aggressive recreation, lots of walking, long drives, meals on the run, and varying sleeping conditions, this group was always positive. The result was a blessing to all and a week everyone was very, very thankful for.
