
The source of my recent unhappiness was the terminal illness of my niece, who

Endowment Fund News

Onward and upward! The Endowment Fund balance has followed the stock market upward [with its few jiggles along the way], which is good news. Our balance has been hovering around \$150,000, from which our charter allows us to make grants totaling up to 5% of its average value, per year. This restriction helps ensure that the gifts you make will continue to support St. Stephen's ability to do God's work, indefinitely, because we are essentially spending earnings not principal.

The Endowment Committee has some new members, and at its March meeting elected its officers for the coming year. They are: Chair Don Ingersoll; Vice Chair Richard Kenefic; Secretary Jan Hopper. Trustees are Joan Knapp and Inge Wojas. Mo. Susan and Jim Trask are *ex officio* members.


The Endowment Committee oversees our professional portfolio manager from Raymond James, and we met

with her to discuss our portfolio's goals and performance at our April meeting. Some modest adjustments are being made to reflect the current market environment.

Tips on Reading the Bible

(Compiled by your friends at Forward Movement)

Choose a Bible that you enjoy reading

Visit a bookstore that sells lots of Bibles, and read different translations until you find your favorite. Choose one that has looks you like, so you'll enjoy seeing it and want to read it. If you already have one, great but if you don't enjoy reading it, it's time to find another one. Try another translation. If you like NRSV, try CEB. The differences can deepen your understanding and spark conversation. Not sure? Go online to Bible webpage Search for your www.biblegateway.com. favorite passage and read it in several translations.

Get to know your Bible-Explore the table of contents, historical information, maps – discover the special features of your Bible.

Locate your favorite parts of the Bible - Mark your favorite scriptures, prayers, and people with a ribbon, bookmark, or stickynote. Keep adhesive flags on hand for marking passages you want to revisit.

Remember that the Bible isn't one book-It's a library, with lots of books in one place. Start with the parts that interest you most. You don't have to read it in order, and if you do, it won't be a linear story. That's okay! Pick a consistent time of day you'd like to read-Get help if there are parts you don't understand. Study Bibles offer commentary and explanations of the text. Online resources can offer in-depth questions and answers. At church, ask questions of your clergy and laypeople who are knowledgeable about the Bible. Find more resources at www.thegoodbookclub.org/resources.

After you read, ask yourself these questions:

What happened? What does the text say? What excited or surprised you? Any other emotions arise? What does the text mean? How does what you read apply to you?

Read the Bible with others-As you continue to read, you may have questions or the desire to talk about what you've read. Find or create a Bible study group! Forward Movement can help with resources for group bible studies; visit www.forwardmovement.org to learn more.

Dig into the history of the Bible-Your Bible may have historical information, or you can find it online. Find a current map of the region and compare it to a map of the time the Bible was written.

Read the Bible out loud-Reading out loud engages your senses differently and can lead to new understandings and means to what you read silently. Read aloud with a friend, spouse, family member or even your pets.



Join us for group Bible Study any Wednesday morning at 10:00.

The St Stephen's "No experience required" Bible study has been held for many years, but you can come any time and feel at home.

We meet in the Bishop Emrich Lounge (aka the Library) from 10-11:30 a.m. every Wednesday morning. We make frequent use of big-screen internet for maps, video clips and immediate answers to our students' questions. And just for fun. Prayer begins and ends our time together.

Currently we are reading Paul's epistle to the Colossians, a group of new Christians who were grappling with cultural challenges like, "How is Jesus different than the Greek / Roman gods we used to worship?" and "How is my household impacted, now that we're Christian?" His advice, written in the 50s AD, includes some profound and timeless theology.
