Message from the Board

Hello FOH members:

I would like to thank the BOD, staff and most importantly the loyal **Hullett Volunteers** for their hard work this past winter in helping FOH staff with general property maintenance, trail care and nesting structure data and maintenance.

2019 marks the end of our 5-year **Agricultural Agreement** and the process of tendering out a new 5-year plan has begun. **FOH and MNRF** will also be reviewing their 5-year **Operational Agreement** to ensure that that Hullett Marsh is moving forward in the right direction with this unique partnership.

Rapid freeze/thaw conditions have damaged some of the Hullett interior access roads. Please use caution when travelling on these roads. Slow travel is by far your best option for the safety of yourself, your vehicle and wildlife.

FOH has acquired student funding through the **Canada Summer Jobs** program. This program will allow students opportunities to learn as well as contribute to the success of the Hullett Provincial Wildlife Area (HPWA).

Water Access Restrictions

Water access (for any purpose) is **not permitted** in the HPWA from May 15 to August 1 in Zone A and May 15 to July 15 in **Zone B** annually to minimize the disturbance to nesting waterfowl. This includes retriever training activities, wading, canoeing and kayaking.



Horse Access

Hullett Marsh is a beautiful area and from the back of your equine partner, even Horses more SO. are allowed all over Zone B and the dyke systems but are limitations. there Between the months of



October and May, the dyke systems are soft. Riding horses on the dyke tops during this time causes damage to the dykes and poses a potential danger to horses. Please abide by the set rules and regulations to help maintain the HPWA and reduce wearing of the trails and dyke systems.

Eagle Buffer Zone



FOH established a 400- metre buffer zone in the fall of 2013 to protect our resident eagle nest from human disturbance. Our resident female is banded and now over 10 years old. Over 12 eaglets have fledged since the spring of 2013. Please respect the privacy of the eagles and the perimeter around the nest site.

THIS BUFFER ZONE IS ACTIVE FROM FEBRUARY 1st TO JUNE 15th.

Brake for Turtles

As temperatures are on the rise, so is activity of snakes and turtles throughout Hullett Marsh. Hullett is home to a variety of different species of turtles, snakes, and amphibians. The majority of these



species are listed as Species at Risk in Ontario, so please slow down if you see them crossing the road.

Turtle Nesting

FOH has been looking for volunteers for our turtle nesting program which will run from mid-May to



mid-July. Approximately 20 volunteers have expressed interest in this project. FOH is planning to install 10 cages over the nests throughout the Marsh to help increase the nest's survival rate. Volunteers will assist in finding turtle nests, installing cages and recording the position of the cages. Volunteers will monitor these cages to

ensure they are not tampered with. If you are interested please contact FOH staff at fohoffice@tcc.on.ca to connect with the project leader. March Break Volunteers

During the month of March, students look forward to their March Break. Some students go on vacation, some relax and some come out to volunteer in their community!



This past March Break, FOH hosted 2

March Break Work Days. During these two days, 4 high school students came out to gain community hours. On day one, students assisted FOH staff with splitting and the collection of firewood for heating our shop. Overall, an additional 2 truck loads of firewood were collected and stacked by our volunteers.

Day 2 consisted of the preparation of nesting materials for both our Wood Duck Box and Mallard Tube programs. Students sieved 3 bales of wood shavings, ensuring the finer materials were removed to provide optimal nesting material. Students also added additional



nesting materials inside prepared Mallard Tubes, plus added material into feed bags for future field work.

In return for their hard work and efforts, FOH provided a lunch for each day students participated.

All in all, these students received community hours required to graduate as well as volunteer experience for their resume.

Species Profile: Western Chorus Frog

The **Western Chorus Frog** (*Pseudacris trisceriata*) is one of many frogs and toads found in Ontario, including Hullett Marsh. At approximate 4cm in size, this frog is a

small, smooth skinned tree frog. The Western Chorus Frog varies rom green-grey to brown in colour. A dark band runs through the eye of



the frog, while a white to cream coloured stripe runs along the upper jaw. A key characteristic of the Western Chorus Frog are three stripes broken into blotches. Species that are apart of the tree frog family are known to be more often heard than seen. The breeding call of these frogs resembles the sound made by running a fingernail along the teeth of a comb.

Although these frogs are part of the tree frog family, they rarely climb trees and prefer aquatic habitat. The Western Chorus Frog inhabits forest openings around woodland ponds, damp meadows, marshes, swamps, and temporary ponds. These frogs breed in almost any fishless pond with a minimum of 10 cm of water.

Over the past 10 years, there has been a decline in the population found in Ontario by 30%. Habitat loss and fragmentation have been the main causes. Specifically, forests and wetlands that Western Chorus Frogs use for breeding habitat, are being developed for urbanization into wetlands. Provincially, the Western Chorus Frogs found in the Great Lakes/ St. Lawrence region are Not at Risk by the Province of Ontario.

Hullett Marsh is known to have Western Chorus Frogs around the property. We are fortunate to have Canadian Wildlife Service conducting surveys within Hullett and surrounding areas this year to provide a further understanding about the species and its populations in Southern Ontario.





Nesting Report: 2018 Nesting Season


In some areas of Canada, 70% of our wetlands have already been lost or degraded. Every day, we lose another 80 acres of wetland (Ducks Unlimited). The need to protect and maintain waterfowl nesting habitat has never been greater.

Thanks to the help of the dedicated staff and volunteers at Hullett Marsh, the Mallard Tube and Duck Box Nesting Programs continue to thrive and produce fruitful results for ducks and duck hunters alike. The collection of detailed data over multiple nesting seasons has continued to provide us with greater insight into the nesting habits of ducks in the marsh. Last year, the Hullett Marsh Waterfowlers Association (HMWA) relocated nesting structures in order to produce better results; these relocations have been a success! This year, we decided to remove consistently unsuccessful boxes and tubes in order to increase our staff and volunteer's efficiency by reducing the amount of time and effort needed to run the programs.

Mallard Tubes


The Friends of Hullett observed a 23% usage rate in our Mallard Tubes during the 2018 nesting season; 13% of the 61 tubes were considered successful nests. As we have now collected 3 nesting seasons worth of data on our Mallard tubes (excluding the Delta Waterfowl tubes that were placed throughout B-Zone last year), we have limited the amount of tubes that were reinstalled back

into the marsh during winter. It was decided that the tubes that have not had any usage over the past three years would not be reinstalled for the 2019 nesting season.



Duck Boxes

The Friends of Hullett observed a 58% usage rate in our duck boxes; 80 of 139 were used by waterfowl over the 2018 nesting season and 30 of 139 or 22% of the boxes used were considered



successful. Of the boxes that were used, it was found that 50% of the waterfowl usage was from **Hooded Merganser**, 31% by Wood Duck and 19% used by both species. A total of 6 boxes have been removed over the winter.

Being a waterfowler means a lot more than just shooting ducks. That's why this past season the volunteers who support the **Youth Waterfowl Clinic** and the staff of the Friends of Hullett decided to make a greater effort to instill these conservation concepts into our youth. We now dedicate an entire day to teaching apprentices the importance and techniques behind maintaining our duck nesting programs.

Hullett Timber Project


If you have been on Hullett's trails recently, you may have noticed markings on various trees. FOH and Nick Courtney of GWG Resources Services have



been working together to complete a Tree Marking Prescription on five woodlots within Hullett Marsh. These woodlots contain a variety of hardwood species, the majority being White Ash and Hard Maple.

Since the invasion of Emerald Ash Borer, Ash species throughout Huron County, including Hullett, have been affected. As the Ash Borer moves it way through the county, the value and quality of these trees degrades and pose a hazard to Hullett users and the ecosystem.

As safety of both the public and the ecosystem is a top priority of FOH, it was decided to hire Nick to mark these woodlots to optimize the health and safety of the

Youth Waterfowl Clinic

The 4th annual Hullett Marsh Youth Waterfowl Clinic will tentatively be held Sept 14th, 20^{th} 21st, & 2019. In celebration of "Waterfowl Heritage Day" FOH will be hosting a 2 weekend educational event and waterfowl hunt for licenced vouth hunters between the ages of 12 and 17.



Youth are required to attend "Conservation Day" Saturday, September 14th. Mentors and Youth both must partake in the Friday September 20th clinic starting at 5pm and the waterfowl hunt at 5am the next morning.

This clinic offers 10 youth an incredible opportunity to learn about gun safety, duck calling tips, decoy placement, concealment, bird cleaning and waterfowl conservation. They will a be paired with an experienced waterfowl hunter who will mentor them on a guided duck hunt in **Zone A** of Hullett Marsh.

With youth spots filling up quickly, we are in need of mentors and volunteers for this event. If you are a knowledgeable and safe waterfowl hunter who is able to guide a youth on a hunt, please consider being a mentor. We are actively seeking mentors, youth and volunteers to make this year's event a success once again.

HASAR Training at Hullett

A topography that mimics the region makes Hullett Provincial Wildlife Area ideal for training exercises by Huron and Area Search and Rescue (HASAR), with its wooded areas, trails, ponds and open fields.



HASAR is the newly

established non-profit organization that includes professional trained volunteers available for deployment for methodical land and water searches for lost people, stolen property, etc., in Huron, South Bruce, Perth and Lambton Counties.

The organization has held a number of training exercises at the conservation area, fanning out in teams identifiable by their red toques and ball caps, reflective vests, with many also in grey uniforms with "Search and Rescue" written across the chest. Members used compasses or walked in line through the woods in a

search pattern looking for objects that could indicate clues of a missing or lost person.



A March 9th exercise with 38 members was part of the Basic Search and Rescue (BSAR) Course of required all searchers and mandated bν the Ontario Search and Association, Rescue which has certified HASAR.

"We met all the objectives and we feel it was a great success not only to have all members pass the training, but the morale and comradeship were evident within the members," said Patrick Armstrong, who is interim HASAR commander and co-founder.

"Hullett absolutely is part of our training area given its size, topography and support from the association that maintains it. We at the Huron & Area Search and Rescue wish to thank the staff and volunteers of Hullett Provincial Wildlife Area for allowing us to use the area for our training. This co-operation will lead to further partnerships and training where members of our organization will hone their skills to be of better service to the community."
