On September 15th and 16th, Friends of Hullett and HMWA hosted our 2nd annual Waterfowl Heritage Day Youth Waterfowl Clinic in celebration of Canada's National hunting, trapping and fishing heritage.

Many thanks goes out to the various organizations, and individuals, that provided meals, awesome loot and cash donations towards this important event. Thanks to everyone's generosity, these young hunters went home with assorted hunting magazines, duck calls, an ID poster, decoys, shotgun shells, camo ball-caps and many other goodies.

Eight youths were paired with eight experienced waterfowl hunting mentors for this two-day event. Firearm safety, hunting ethics, calling, decoy placement, species ID and, of course, conservation were some of the skills shared with these young hunters.



1 Canada Goose, 7 Mallards, 1 Northern Shoveler, 1 Wood Duck, 6 Bluewing Teal and a gorgeous Northern Pintail, totaling 16 ducks. This harvest made this YWC a huge success. Good job youth and mentors and we hope that you enjoy the waterfowl protein!

#### **Summer Students**

This summer FOH hired Jason Barger (thanks to funding from Canada Summer Jobs fund), a student in Fish and Wildlife Technology at Fleming College, as our maintenance supervisor. As well as everyday maintenance, Jason's job was to lead volunteers, along with rehired maintenance workers, Bailey Van Massenhoven and Cecil McMichael (thanks to funding from the MNRF). This team spent 7 weeks this summer working on numerous projects such as extensive timber removal, adding signage, parking barrier upgrades and numerous other projects.



Working rain or shine (usually more rain than shine this summer), this team developed their mechanical expertise along with teamwork and leadership skills. Only with their help has the marsh been able to stay afloat with summer, especially with the mosquitos scaring the volunteers away.

#### **Summer Events**

**Pluckin' Fest:** Hullett Marsh joined in Clinton's Pluckin' Fest in the Historical Area. Between the old milk cans and yearbooks, Hullett showed off its ancient photos, past user guides, aerial photos and other historical items from the Hullett office.

**Retirement Raceway:** Hullett Marsh was at the Clinton Raceway for the final race of harness racer John Campbell. The interpretive trailer intrigued some with its displays and frog calls. Thanks to those who stopped to say "hello".

**QDMA Raffle**: This year, the Quality Deer Management Association held a raffle where 75% of the earned proceeds would be donated to Hullett Marsh. In total, \$585.00 was put toward the Youth Waterfowl Clinic for 2018. Thanks to everyone who bought tickets.



#### **Hullett Marsh Waterfowl Association**

This volunteer subcommittee within the FOH, continues to put waterfowl first. The HMWA's mandate is to continue to improve the production, attraction and harvest of waterfowl at Hullett. Again in 2017, waterfowlers have devoted hours of time, hard work and money into making the area increasingly attractive to both nesting and migrating waterfowl. In 2016, the list of accomplishments was long. Again in 2017, a lot is happening:

- The Invasive Phragmites is being treated in late summer/early fall. The Waterfowlers have pushed for this action and are helping locate and identify the problem areas to be sprayed.
- The Mallard Tube program is continuing to be improved. Data has been collected, from 2016, so that optimal locations for placement can be determined. Chris Ambrose, a new director, has stepped up to keep this programme on track.
- The Wood Duck Boxes have all been renumbered and GPS'd. Our local Wood Duck population is in great shape. Over 280 Wood Ducks were banded at Hullett in 2016 thanks to our program and the large number of natural cavities.
- The Whitetail Swamp Rehabilitation project is closer to reality. Funds are being secured and plans for work in the swamp have begun. Some standing water, year round, in the form of potholes and ponds should provide nesting, loafing and roosting areas for waterfowl. A variety of wading birds and raptors will also benefit.
- New signage is in place in the 1-50 parking lot as well as at the hunting stakes.
- On request of the HMWA, the Whistler Pool boat launch has been dredged as has the canoe canal out to #40.
- Bait will be placed in two baited areas by staff and waterfowler volunteers throughout the hunting season.

#### **Split Opener Hunting Seasons**

Hunting at Hullett Marsh is always full of changes. This year there is a "Split-Opener"; **Waterfowl** opening day is the  $\underline{23^{rd}}$  of September and the **Pheasant/Small Game** opener is on the  $\underline{25}^{th}$  of September.

Make sure you always read the Hullett regulations before hunting in the marsh as you never know what may have changed since the last time you were here.

#### **Summer Water Levels at Hullett**

Get ready to get your feet wet because Hullett Marsh has received large amounts of rain this summer. All ponds and pools (except Greenwing) are full of the wet stuff with no cells in draw down.

Please keep in mind that heavy rains make the roads and trails soft which can lead to washouts, large potholes and ruts. FOH tries hard to maintain these areas but only with the help of volunteers can these issues really be fixed.

Here are just a few updates to the 2017 Hunting Regulations that will affect Hullett users:

- Increased pheasant and squirrel season to December 31, 2017
- Decreased season for Ruffed Grouse to December 31, 2017 as well as a decreased bag limit from 5 to 2
- Hunting season for snapping turtle has been permanently closed

Remember that HPWA is in Wildlife Management Area 85.

#### **Field Hunting Stakes**

This will be the 2<sup>nd</sup> year for our two field hunting stakes, F1 & F2. The parking for F1 is lot 41494 on Bridge Road and F2 is lot 81001 down Burns Line. These stakes will be opened for hunting once the bean crops are harvested this year. Please refer to the hunting page on our website, or our new user guide, for details.



#### **Phragmites**

Hullett Marsh is highly used by a large variety of plants, animals and human activities but some have become a grave issue. Invasive species are found everywhere: in the waters, in the sky, in our diet and, commonly, in our lives.

If you have been following the newletters and Facebook/Instagram posts you will notice a large amount of talk on Phragmites; an invasive reed that has taken over the marsh. This weed is native to Eurasia and was originally brought over as a spiffy looking ornimental grass for gardens. It soon got out of control and has now invaded throughout North America. It has a tendency to squeeze out other species and leave nutrient deficient lands in it's wake. For Hullett Marsh, a very special area full of species at risk and endangered habitats, phragmites is a big concern. This summer we were finally able to do something about it.



Hours of Phragmites hunting has taken place in the last couple years but nothing like this year. During the summer, a massive index of the Phragmites stands in Hullett Marsh was mapped and prioritized based on location, density and size (among others criteria). To date, 120 stands of Phrag has been found, spanning from sizes of one meter squared to 90 meters squared. With this collected information, Friends of Hullett has put together a game plan to help reduce and manage the invasive plant. With the help of Giles Restoration Services, professionals in herbicide application in aquatic environments, FOH can finally begin removing this devastating plant from our ecosystem. Since August, a third of the stands have been sprayed with the last two thirds to be sprayed by the end of September.

**Complex Sign:** Friends of Hullett has bought a brand new 4 x 8 user map found at the office complex.


