




Funding

Central Huron Donation Fund

Hullett Marsh strongly depends upon funding from outside authorities. For a number of years, the Central Huron Donation Fund has provided significant funds towards Hullett Marsh and 2018 was no different. This year, we asked and received from Central Huron, \$960 towards a new iPad. As well as \$1,640 to assist in the production of our new Hullett User Guide. The iPad was purchased at the beginning of Summer and proved to be an excellent tool for all staff. It allowed for communications outside of the office complex universally. It also proved to be helpful with interpretive programming and organization of volunteers. We will continue to use this device to better our communications internally and externally. The funding towards the User Guide allowed us to print an additional 2,000 User Guides. The Marsh is experiencing a high amount of day-use visitors and the additional User Guides are essential to ensure there is no shortage! The Friends of Hullett would like to thank Central Huron for their generous donation which will help improve the overall community surrounding Hullett Marsh.

Phragmites Removal

Phragmites or Common Reed is an aggressive invasive wetland species that has been a constant struggle within the marsh. In 2017, Eric Giles and the Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority came into the marsh and sprayed a number of sites out of water with Round-Up using proper permits. FOH got additional funding to spray once again in 2018. On July 27, Giles and his team, along with our GIS and Wildlife Technician Greg, worked hard all day completing mop-up. Spraying the sites from 2017 which had new growth once again. In addition, new sites along the Mallard Pool were targeted as the water had been drawn down in this Pool. In addition to Giles, the Ausable Bayfield Conservation Authority combatted a number of new and dense stands in 2018. There are no approved chemicals for spraying Phragmites in water and therefore a number of stands still remain. The spraying in 2017 was extremely successful and with the additional spraying in 2018, out of water sites are nearly cleared. FOH will continue to monitor the growth of old and new stands and hope to eliminate this species from the marsh to better the habitat for all waterfowl and native plants.

Turtle Nest Protectors

During 2018, turtle egg predation was found to be an issue within Hullett Marsh. Friends of Hullett has recieved funding from Huron Fish and Game to manufacture turtle nest protectors. These protectors will be placed over turtle nest found to ensure eggs are not predated. Manufacturing of these protectors will begin in the winter months. Keep an eye on your email for future work days occurring to build nest protectors.



Summer Students

This summer we were lucky to receive funding both provincially and federally for three summer students. Julia Beaven and Luke Forbes worked tirelessly around the marsh as our high school students. General maintenance such as: pruning, painting, and assisting in any way that they could, always with a smile on their faces! We also hired Cassie Eveland as our Recreation and Event Coordinator. She spent her time coordinating volunteers, creating the Hullett User Guide, redesigning the website, which is now mobile friendly, working on general paperwork as well as implementing various interpretive events! We would like to thank our summer students for all of their hard work, it was an amazing summer! The marsh has never looked as good as it did this summer!

Road Maintenance

We would like to thank Central Huron for their donation of 500 tonnes of gravel and all the work they did! Burns Line, Conservation Road and Front Road are extremely smooth and look amazing! This work was necessary for all Hullett Users to ensure safe roads.

Parking Lot Maintenance

Our summer students and regular staff worked extremely hard during an entire week to completely redo parking lot 40536 Conservation Road. All barriers were re-dug and posts replaced.

Also a large thank you to all volunteers who spent their time painting all old parking barriers throughout the marsh. The barriers are now bright and bold!

Species Profile

Little Brown Myotis (Myotis lucifugus)

Previously known as the Little Brown Bat, the LBM is a species we have all seen but know little about. Identifying these little bats can be difficult as they are nocturnal (active at night), and look very similar to Big Brown Bats and Northern Long-eared Bats. The only difference is a small flap of skin protecting the LBM's ears. The smallest of Canada's 19 bat species, the LBM weighs similar to a Loonie or Toonie but has a wingspan of 22-27 centimetres.

What makes bats so special is their ability to echolocate. In order to 'see', the LBM pulses out high-frequency sounds that creates a returning echo when something is in their way. This sound is too high of a frequency for human ears. However, although bat's echolocate, this does not mean they do not have any vision. In fact, the LBM has vision almost identical to that of humans! Meaning the saying "blind as a bat" is the same as saying "blind as a human"!

Unfortunately, the LBM, once the most common species of bat, is now considered Endangered, both provincially and federally. The significant reduction in population is due to a highly contagious fungus known as White Nose Syndrome (WNS) (picture on right). This fungus absorbs the LBM's fat stores during hibernation and forces the bat to wake up from hibernation early in search of food and water. However, when waking early they use even more energy and then cannot find water or food and eventually become so dehydrated and starved it kills them. This is an introduced disease from Europe, brought over by cave explorers who did not properly wash their gear. To help the LBM, if you are in a highly-populated hibernation area, make sure you wash all gear (including: boots, coats, backpacks, etc.) thoroughly!



Water Levels

Ducks Unlimited Canada have come into the Marsh and assessed the need for water level changes in the early summer. Drawdowns have occurred in the Mallard Pool and Pintail Pool. The Pintail Pool does maintain some water; however, the Mallard Pool is almost completely drained of water. These drawdowns occur to encourage various natural vegetation to germinate, produce seeds and create additional vegetation. This process is beneficial to duck populations in the future. We hope that these drawdowns will not affect the fall waterfowl hunt, however we do encourage hunters to recognize these water level drawdowns and the possibility of the hunting stakes having a changed habitat.

In addition to these drawdowns, Bluebill, Butterball and Bluewing was raised by 30cm of water. It is important to also recognize that this will also affect hunting stakes and hunters should be prepared to access their stakes through a variety of means.

Pheasant Challenge & Release

With effective staff and being ahead of schedule, the Pheasant Challenge Tickets were printed earlier than normal! They can be purchased at the FOH Office by chance, through PayPal or e-transfer (minimum purchase of 3 tickets), Clinton Sporting Goods and local Ideal Supply stores. The prizes for the Challenge remain the same as last year. Tickets are \$10 and the draw will occur in early January. It is recommended that Pheasant hunters purchase tickets as the funds raised support the Pheasant Release every Fall.



The Pheasants, provided by Uplands Pheasantry, are purchased and waiting for Fall of 2018! As in past years, 10% of birds are banded. If hunters get a bird which is banded they are to contact the FOH Office to collect their prize. Pheasants are released at intervals throughout the hunting season without a schedule; Hullett staff release the birds when deemed necessary and are not authorized to inform hunters when or where the birds are released.

Pheasant Hunting is only permitted in Zone B!

Youth Pheasant Hunt

Each year the Huron-Perth Youth Pheasant Hunt uses the HPWA to conduct their annual hunt. This hunt is open to youth between the ages of 12 and 15.

Youth Waterfowl Clinic

In September, Friends of Hullett hosted 10 youth participants in our 3rd annual Youth Waterfowl Clinic. This event is to help promote youth hunting, as well to celebrate National Hunting, Trapping and Fishing Heritage Day.

This year, our Youth Waterfowl Clinic was run over 2 weekends. September 8, youth participants were provided with an opportunity to learn about Hullett Marsh's Wood Duck and Mallard nesting programs. Youth participated in a

nesting seminar, which provided learning opportunities on nesting structures, what to look for in a nesting structure, and how to determine a successful hatch, along with field work within Hullett Marsh

September 14 and 15, youth were paired with mentors guiding them

through their hunting experience. Firearm safety, ethics, waterfowl ID, decoy placement, concealment, calling and cleaning were the topics that youth learned about over these two days. This year's hunt proved to be very successful, with 30 ducks being harvested, including 6 different species.

Friends of Hullett would like to extend many thanks to all the organizations, volunteers, mentors, parents and youth for making these days possible. With their support, the Youth Waterfowl Clinic has been successful and will continue to be successful for years to come.
