

2019 Scholarship Eligibility

- I. A Candidate must be worthy. Worthy being defined as one who contributes and participates in club activities.
- II. Candidates must attend and participate in at least 3 meetings and/or workshops or a combination of both. (Workshop and meeting cannot be on the same day.)
- III. Candidates must be a member of the club for at least 1 year before being considered.
- IV. Candidates must be willing and able to go to the school of his or her choice. (The scholarship is not transferable.)
- V. Candidates must use the scholarship the year it is given.
- VI.No club scholarship awarded to the same person in two consecutive years.

MOST IMPORTANTLY:

Candidates must be willing to return to the club, give a "Show and Tell" program and share his/her newly acquired skill and knowledge with other club members.

A list of eligible members (from 2018 society participation) will be available before the 2019 drawing.

HCGMS Scholarship Rules Standard Operating Procedures Pated 12/11/17

Scholarships

The Board of Directors will determine the number of school scholarships to be awarded. They may elect to award a minimum of two scholarships annually provided there is a minimum of \$5000 in the general fund. Scholarship will generally be to the William Holland Lapidary School or Wild Acres. However, it may be used for another school teaching other lapidary classes per board approval. Class must be in earth sciences, lapidary, jewelry, mineralogy, petrology, paleontology, geology, or other related fields. Total monetary value of this scholarship will not exceed \$500 (\$400 for tuition and board and \$100 to cover misc. expenses).

Scholarship Eligibility

Recipients of scholarship are defined as one who contributes and participates in club activities.

- A. Recipient must have attended and participated in at least Six meetings and/or workshops or a combination or both (Attending Workshop and meeting on the same day cannot be counted as two).
- B. Recipient must be a paid member of the club for over 12 months of the previous year before being considered.
- C. Candidate must be willing and able to go to William Holland, Wild Acres, or other lapidary school.
- D. The scholarship is not transferable to another person.
- E. All Scholarships must be used the year awarded. No scholarship will carry over to the following year.
- F. Recipient of scholarship will have 30 days from the time scholarship is drawn to commit to attending and using the scholarship. If the scholarship is drawn in February, then you will have until the March meeting to commit to the scholarship. You do not have to have a class chosen or deposit made to a school at this time.
- G. No club scholarship will be awarded to the same person two years in a row.
- H. Candidate must be willing to return to the club, give a "show and tell" program and share his /her new acquired skill and knowledge with other club members
- I. Candidate club dues must be current.
- J. Scholarship recipients are highly encouraged to attend the Southeast Federation sponsored workshops. Only with the board approval can a non-Federation sponsored workshop be substituted for a Federation sponsored workshop.

Process

- A. Board of Directors will decide the number of scholarships to be rewarded
- B. Treasurer verifies that the candidate has paid his/her due by the 3rd Saturday of January and has been a member of the club for over 12 months. He/she will provide a list of candidates to Secretary no later than 7 February.
- C. Secretary will review the participation record of the paid members to determine legibility prior to the February meeting.
- D. The list of eligible candidates will be read at the February business meeting. Any club member that feels that they meet the eligibility requirements and whose name is not on the list may ask to have their record reviewed. Treasurer and Secretary will review the records to determine the eligibly.
- E. At the February meeting names (or number) will be drawn for each of the scholarships. Two alternates times the number of scholarships will be drawn (if 2 scholarships are to be awarded 4 alternates will be drawn).
- F. Any candidate whose name is drawn for the scholarship will have 30 days to notify the president if he or she cannot accept the scholarship.
- G. When the president is notified that someone cannot accept the scholarship, he/she will offer it to the next person on the alternate list. The new awardees will have 30 days to notify the president if he or she cannot accept the scholarship.
- H. Any of the following, will make the recipient ineligible for a club scholarship for a period of two years.
 - a. Failure to notify the president within the prescribed time frame that they cannot accept the scholar-ship.
 - b. Failure to use the scholarship.
 - c. Failure to give a "show and tell" program and share his /her new acquired skill and knowledge with other club members



Lessons from Geese



Editor's Note: "Lessons from Geese" was transcribed from a speech given by Arrien at the 1991 Organizational Development Network and was based on the work of Milton Olsen. It circulated to Outward Bound Staff through the United States. We share it here hoping that we can all learn these lessons.





Fact 1: As each goose flaps its wings it creates an "uplift" for the birds that follow by flying in a "V" formation the whole flock adds 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew alone.

Lesson: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.



Fact 2: When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of flying alone. It quickly moves back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front of it.

Lesson: If we have as much sense as a goose, we stay in formation with those headed where we want to go. We are willing to accept their help and give our help to others.



Fact 3: When the lead goose tires, it rotates back into the formation and another goose flies to the point position.

Lesson: It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks and sharing leadership. As with geese,6+ people are interdependent on each other's skills, capabilities and unique arrangements of gifts, talents or resources.



Fact 4: The geese flying in formation honk to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

Lesson: We need to make sure our honking is encouraging. In groups where there is encouragement, the production is much greater. The power of encouragement (to stand by one's heart of core values and encourage the heart and core of others) is the quality of honking we seek.



Fact 5: When a goose gets sick, wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow it down to help and protect it. They stay with it until it dies or is able to fly again. Then, they launch out with another formation to catch up with the flock.

CHICKEN WONTON TACO'S



INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons stir-fry sauce, any brand
- 4 tablespoons Asian sesame vinaigrette dressing
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 4 tablespoons coleslaw dressing
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon teriyaki sauce
- 2 to 4 wonton wrappers
- 2 tablespoons green onion tops fresh cilantro, to taste
- 1 cup cooked chicken breast, diced
- 1 cup shredded cabbage

INSTRUCTIONS

Brush the wonton wrappers with olive oil, drape them over the side of a baking dish, bake at 350°F for 5 minutes

Toss the chicken in the stir-fry sauce 3 tablespoons Asian dressing, soy sauce, and teriyaki sauce, pour into a frying pan and heat until cooked through.

Shred cabbage, stir in the coleslaw dressing, fill each wonton with meat mix, top with slaw, add chopped green onions and cilantro. (You can make regular coleslaw to your liking with carrots and purple cabbage for color. It's even better if you make it a day ahead of time)

I've made these at home after I fell in love with them at Applebee's. They are delicious! Check out the different versions on the internet.



Bench Tips from Brad





STIFFENING EARRING POST

Soldering an earring post will always soften the wire a bit. The easiest way I've found to harden it is to grip it with pliers and twist it a couple half turns. This work hardens the wire and also tests your soldered joint.

SOLVENT DISPENSER





A neat and inexpensive solution is to use a lab dispensing bottle to store small quantities of the solvents most frequently used. The bottles have a wide mouth for filling and a fine tip for dispensing. You can get a small stream or just a drop or two. With the bottle's fine tip I don't spill a drop.

A Google search will turn up many suppliers. One I've used is Carolina Biological Supply Company at www.carolina.com The bottle is Catalog # 716580 Unitary Wash Bottle, Low-Density Polyethylene, 125 mL US\$ 5. They have several sizes and other bottles labeled for specific solvents.

Garnets being a set of closely related minerals that form a group, resulting in gemstones in just about every color. Found in metamorphic rocks (which are rocks altered by heat and pressure) on every continent.

Even though red garnets have a long history, modern gem buyers can pick from a rich palette of garnet colors: greens, oranges, pinkish oranges, deeply saturated purplish reds, and even some blues. The most common and widespread of gems is the red garnet. Not all of the garnets are as abundant as the red ones. A green garnet, tsavorite, is rarer and needs rarer unusual rock chemistries and special conditions to form.

Demantoid is a rare and famous green garnet, spessartine (also called spessarite) is an orange garnet, and rhodolite is a beautiful purple-red garnet. Garnets can even exhibit the color-change phenomenon similar to the rare gemstone alexandrite.

Varying in chemical composition, all garnets have essentially the same crystal structure. We have more than twenty garnet categories, called species, but only five are commercially important as gems. Those five are pyrope, almandine (also called almandite), spessartine, grossular (grossularite), and andradite. A sixth, uvarovite, is a green garnet that usually occurs as crystals too small to cut. It's sometimes set as clusters in jewelry. Many garnets are chemical mixtures of two or more garnet species.

History & Lore: Red garnet necklaces, thousands of years ago adorned the necks of Egypt's pharaohs, and were entombed with their mummified corpses as prized possessions for the afterlife. Signet rings with carved garnets were used to stamp the wax that secured important documents in ancient Rome.

Carbuncle is a term used in ancient times to refer to red garnets and any red stone. Carbuncle was thought to be one of the four precious stones given to King Solomon by God.

In Roman scholar Pliny's time (23 to 79 AD), red garnets were among the most widely traded gems. In the Middle Ages (about 475 to 1450 AD), red garnet was favored by clergy and nobility.

In central Europe around 1500 red garnet's availability increased with the discovery of the famous Bohemian garnet deposits. The source became the nucleus of a regional jewelry industry that reached its peak in the late 1800s.

Garnet Varieties:

The six main Garnet minerals types are Almandine, Pyrope, Spessartite, Grossular, Andradite, and Uvarovite. Listed below are other types and varieties.

<u>Color-Change Garnet</u> - Garnet that exhibits a different color in natural and artificial light. Color-Change Garnet is a intermediary mix between the Pyrope and Spessartite (though closer in composition to Pyrope), and presents a color change from a light brownish, yellowish, or greenish in daylight to a pink or purplish color in incandescent light. A few rare specimens may even have a bluish color, which is extremely rare for Garnet.

<u>Demantoid</u> - Olive-green to emerald-green gem variety of Andradite Garnet.

Gooseberry Garnet - Light green to light greenish-brown variety of Grossular Garnet.

<u>Hessonite</u> - Orange to orange-brown, transparent variety of Grossular Garnet.

Imperial Garnet - Light pink, transparent gem variety of Grossular Garnet.

<u>Leuco-garnet</u> - Colorless, transparent variety of Grossular Garnet.

<u>Malaya Garnet</u> - Reddish-orange form of Spessartite Garnet (or more accurately a mixture intermediary between Spessartite and Pyrope) that originates in the Umba River Valley in Tanzania and Kenya. This term is sometimes used as a synonym for Spessartite.

<u>Mali Garnet</u> - Garnet gemstone from the African country of Mali that ranges in color from green to yellow to brown (though most often a greenish-yellow). The deposit of these Garnets was discovered in Mali in 1994, and this form of Garnet is a relatively new gemstone. The scientific classification of the Mali Garnets are not clearly identified; they can be either Grossular or Andradite, though are usually an intermediary form closer in chemical structure to Grossular.

<u>Mandarin Garnet</u> - Bright orange to orange-red Spessartite Garnet, originating from the African countries of Namibia & Mozamique.

Melanite - Lustrous, opaque black or very dark red variety of Andradite Garnet.

Mint Garnet - Grossular Garnet with a light-mint-green color.

<u>Mozambique Garnet</u> - Red Garnet from the African country of Mozambique, which produces fine quality Garnet gemstones. Mozambique Garnet is usually Almandine, but may also be Pyrope.

Raspberry Garnet - Raspberry-red variety of Grossular Garnet.

Rhodolite - Rose-red form of Garnet with a light color or more purplish color than typical Garnet gemstones. It is usually an intermediary variety between Pyrope and Almandine, though more closely towards Pyrope in composition.

<u>Star Garnet</u> - Form of Almandine Garnet that exhibits asterism in the form of a four-rayed star. <u>Tangerine Garnet</u> - Light orange to orange-yellow Spessartite Garnet, originating from the African countries of Namibia & Mozambique.


<u>Topazolite</u> - Yellow to brownish-yellow variety of Andradite Garnet.

Tsavorite - Green to emerald-green transparent variety of Grossular Garnet from Africa.

10 cubic meters in volume & weighed 35,000 kilograms.



I 1.63 ct. Namibian Demantoidlarge brilliant cut garnet

It was an exceptional stone of intense vibrant green with a touch of blue. The original rough weighed approximately 46 ct—about 9 grams—making the yield a little over 25%. This is an exceptionally large gem for Namibia's Green Dragon mine, where the bulk of production is suitable for small calibrated gems. Namibian demantoid was first discovered in the 1990s.


