<u>Website:</u> Sue West reported in Kathy Becnel's absence. She stated that Kathy intends to finish her tenure as webmaster, which will end at the close of 2019. At that time, Leslie J will assume the duties of webmaster, with Nicole Green serving as her backup.

<u>Sunshine:</u> Clemencia was unable to be at the meeting. Sue said she would ask Clemencia to send a card to Carmen, who is in the hospital. Sue encouraged all members to contact Clemencia whenever they become aware of a member in need of a little sunshine. Contact

information is in the newsletter. The club received a thank you card from Cindy Braden. The daughter of the Satchfields, who were lifetime members, sent the club a card stating that they had both passed away.

<u>Newsletter:</u> Lisa Fitch asked the members to please submit articles, recipes, anything.

<u>Workshops:</u> July classes will be offered by Aurora King and Lisa Fitch. Cindy Braden is offering Dream Catchers. August classes will be offered by Julie Boudreaux and Kathy Becnel. Check newsletter for more information.



- 14 16" of Beadalon Wire 19 or 49 (49 is the most Flexible)
- 4 8mm Round Swarovski Crystals
- 18 6mm Bicone Swarovski Crystals
- 24 4mm Bicone Swarovski Crystals
- 4 6mm Silver Spacer Beads
- 2 Split Rings (Sterling Silver)
- 4 Crimp Beads
- 4 Crimp Covers (Optional for finish look)
- 1 Clasp of your choice

Optional: **Small Chain of 1 –1 1/2 " to make watch adjustable. You can add a 4mm bead to end of chain, if so I usually put a crimp cover over wrapped wire.

Bits. Tips and Tricks

HOW TO MAKE SUNSHINE SPARKLE EARRINGS

Approximate finished length: 2 inches

Beads and other products needed for one pair of earrings: (Swarovski # 5328 color)

You can choose any color or make it multi colors

- 6 3mm Light Topaz Swarovski Crystal Bicone Bead
- 12 4mm Light Topaz Swarovski Crystal Bicone Bead
- 8 5mm Light Topaz Swarovski Crystal Bicone Bead
- 8 6mm Light Topaz Swarovski Crystal Bicone Bead
- 34 24 Gauge 2-inch Head Pin
- 1 Base Metal French Ear Wire with 1.5mm Ball End
- 3 inches Base Metal 1.9mm Rollo Chain

Tools needed to complete the earrings:

Round nose pliers

Chain nose pliers

Wire cutters

Beading Techniques needed to complete the earrings:

Wire Wrapping

Attaching an Ear Wire

Instructions to complete "Sunshine Sparkle" earrings:

Step 1

Using wire cutters, cut the chain into a 25-link length (1.5 inches). Make sure you have 25 links!

Step 2

Open the loop on one ear wire and attach it to one end link of the chain. Close the loop.

Step 3

Place one 6mm bicone bead onto a head pin, making one unit. Wire wrap this unit to the 3rd chain link.

Step 4

Place one 6mm bicone bead onto a head pin, making one unit. Wire wrap this unit to the opposite side of the same chain link used in the previous step.

Step 5

In the same manner as in Steps 3-4, continue using head pins to wire wrap these beads to the specified chain links:

5th link: 1 – 6mm bicone bead, 1 – 6mm bicone bead

7th link: 1 - 5mm bicone bead, 1 - 5mm bicone bead

9th link: 1 - 5mm bicone bead, 1 - 5mm bicone bead

11th link: 1 – 4mm bicone bead, 1 – 4mm bicone bead

13th link (right side): 1 – 4mm bicone bead

15th link (left side): 1 – 4mm bicone bead

17th link (right side): 1 – 4mm bicone bead

19th link (left side): 1 – 4mm bicone bead

21st link (right side): 1 − 3mm bicone bead

23rd link (left side): 1 – 3mm bicone bead

25th link (last link): 1 – 3mm bicone bead

Step 6

Repeat Steps 2-5 for the second earring

In its purest form, the mineral corundum is colorless. Trace elements that become part of the mineral's crystal structure cause variations in its color. Chromium is the trace element that causes ruby's red, which ranges from an orangey red to a purplish red.

The strength of ruby's red depends on how much chromium is present—the more chromium, the stronger the red color. Chromium can also cause fluorescence, which adds to the intensity

of the red color.

The name ruby comes from the Latin word ruber, which means "red." The glowing red of ruby suggested an inextinguishable flame burning in the stone, even shining through clothing and able to boil water. In the ancient language of Sanskrit, ruby is called ratnaraj, or "king of precious stones."

Ruby has been called the most precious of the

12 stones created by God.

The Ruby represents love, passion, courage and emotion. For centuries this gem has been considered the king of all gems. It was believed that wearing a fine red Ruby bestowed good fortune on its owner. Rubies have been the prized possession of emperors and kings throughout the ages. To this day the Ruby is the most valued gemstone.

The color of a Ruby is the most important feature of the gemstone. Rubies are available in a range of red hues from purplish and bluish red to orange-red. The brightest and most valuable color of Ruby is often "a Burmese Ruby" – an indication that it is a rich, passionate, hot, full red color with a slight blue hue. This color is often referred to as "pigeon blood" red, a Ruby color only associated with the Mogok Valley mines in Myanmar. The color Pigeon Blood Ruby red, is

not associated with the color of a pigeon's blood but rather the color of a white pigeon's eye. Ruby is the most valuable variety of the corundum mineral species, which also includes sapphire. Rubies can command the highest per-carat price of any colored stone. This makes ruby one of the most important gems in the colored stone market.

125West Ruby



The 125West Ruby is currently the largest ruby in the world.

This unique specimen is one of the world's largest known rough ruby gemstones and weighs 8.2lbs or 18,696 carats.

The ruby is semi-translucent to opaque and contains rutile, which may create a six-ray star if cut 'en cabochon' (i.e. polished but not faceted).

The crystal displays a strong red fluorescence when exposed to long-wave ultraviolet light. It measures 122.4mm x 112.3mm x 133.9mm.

Bench Tips from Brad . . .

RING SIZE VARIATIONS

The numerical sizes marked on ring gauges and ring mandrels are often not the same across different manufacturers. If you're using a ring gauge to measure a customer, be sure to compare the markings on the gauge with the markings on the mandrel you use to make the ring. They may not be the same.

Also, you may have to adjust a little for the width of the ring shank. If you're making a wide shank ring, the ring generally has to be a little bit larger in diameter than the ring gauge size in order to get a comfortable fit.









NEW MELTING DISH

A new melting dish or crucible must be given a protective coating of borax before its first use. Borax extends the life of the ceramic material. Once done, it generally does not have to be repeated.

The procedure is straightforward. Heat the new melting dish to red with a large torch. You'll need plenty of heat. I use an acetylene/air Prest-O-Lite torch with a large #5 noz-zle.

When the dish is hot, sprinkle in a half teaspoon of borax, let it melt, and spread it with a carbon rod over all of the interior surface of the dish. Add more borax if needed.

Sometimes you will have to hold the dish at an angle to coat the sides up to the rim. And don't forget to coat the pouring spout itself.
