Sour Cream and Onion Scalloped Potato Casserole

By Lynn Tate Servings: 6

Ingredients Casserole

2 boxes (4.7 oz. Each) Scalloped potatoes

3 cups boiling water

1 cup milk

1 pkg. (7.5 oz.) chive and onion cream cheese spread, softened

1 cup sour cream

1 Tablespoon Dijon mustard

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

1/2 teaspoon onion powder

2 1/2 cups shredded cooked chicken

1 cup thinly sliced red onions

2 Tablespoons chopped fresh chives or green onion

Chive Sour Cream, if desired

1/2 cup sour cream

2 Tablespoons chopped fresh chives

1/8 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

Steps

1.)Heat oven to 375° F. Spray 13x9 inch (3 quart) glass baking dish with cooking spray. In a large bowl, stir sauce mix pouches (from potato mix boxes. Boiling water, milk, cream cheese, sour cream, Dijon mustard, salt, pepper, garlic powder and onion powder with whisk. Stir in potatoes (from potato mix boxes), chicken and onions; pour into baking dish. Bake 30 minutes.

2.) Then stir mixture. Bake 15 to 20 minutes longer or until thermometer inserted in center of casserole reads at least 165° F and potatoes are tender and lightly browned. Top with chives. In small bowl, mix Chive Sour Cream ingredients; serve with casserole.

<u>Note:</u> I grilled my chicken and didn't serve the Chive Sour Cream.

Safety First

As most of you know our country is in a "Pandemic" (a disease epidemic that has spread across a whole country or world) with the Coronavirus also known as Corvid-19. 

The serenely colored aquamarine invokes the tranquility of its namesake, the sea. In fact, the name *aquamarine* is derived from the Latin word *aqua*, meaning water, and *marina*, meaning *the sea*. Aquamarine is most often light in tone and ranges from greenish blue to blue-green; the color usually is more intense in larger stones, and darker blue stones are very valuable. This gemstone is mined mainly in Brazil, but also is found in Nigeria, Madagascar, Zambia, Pakistan, and Mozambique.

March's birthstone was also thought to enhance the happiness of marriages. Like many beryls, aquamarine forms large crystals suitable for sizable fashioned gems and carvings. The favored cuts are emerald (step) and brilliant cut with long or rectangular shapes. Turbid stones get a cabochon cut.

Heated Aquamarine: Most commercially available aguamarines are already heated. They can even be treated at the mine before they reach the market. This applies to finished stones as well as rough. Not all aquamarine can be heated successfully. Stones from some sources will crack and break apart during treatment and thus aren't normally heated. In general, aguamarine is usually under stress along the length of the crystal at about a third to the middle of its thickness. Beryl tends to crack lengthwise. Since most aquamarine isn't that big around, yields and stone sizes will decrease dramatically when it cracks. Seeing green in rough beryl doesn't necessarily mean the stone is unheated. Stones from some locations retain some green color even when heated successfully. Heating an aquamarine with a flaw, bubble, or inclusion will usually make the problem grow. Even if you only see a hint of a flaw, that may indicate there are problems in the stone you can't see.

<u>History & Lore:</u> This gemstone was believed to protect sailors, as well as to guarantee a safe voyage. The serene blue or blue-green color of aquamarine is said to cool the temper, allowing the wearer to remain calm and levelheaded.

In the Middle Ages, many believed that the simple act of wearing aquamarine was a literal antidote to poisoning. The Romans believed that if you carved a frog into a piece of aquamarine jewelry, it would help to reconcile differences between enemies and make new friends.

Still, other historical groups took this lore even further, using aquamarine as gifts to the bride at a wedding in order to symbolize long unity and love. Some even believed it could re-awaken love between two people.

The Sumerians, Egyptians, and Hebrews all admired aquamarine, and many warriors would wear it into battle to bring about victory. Many ancient medicines used powder from aquamarine to help cure all manner of infection, but it was said to be particularly good for eye ailments.

It is also considered to be a great addition to mental health and is used widely as a symbol in Tarot as well as a meditation aid and is said to help one cultivate more inner tranquility. It is also considered by some to be a great aligner of the spiritual and the physical, for those who feel out of harmony or alignment with oneself. No matter how you use aquamarine—either as a piece of jewelry or as an aid in a spiritual journey—its cool, tranquil color is the perfect complement to any skin tone or setting.

Bloodstone



Bloodstone is a dark green variety of chalcedony adorned with a splatter of bright red. It has been a popular gemstone for at least two thousand years and has served as the modern birthstone for the month of March since 1912. Bloodstone is sometimes referred to as "heliotrope" by European authors and in works of the 18th century and earlier.

Physical Properties

As a member of the chalcedony family, bloodstone is a cryptocrystalline quartz. It inherits from that a conchoidal fracture and a hardness of approximately 7 on the Mohs hardness scale. However, the hardness of bloodstone is usually slightly lower, at about 6.5.

The lower hardness and opaque diaphaneity are attributed to included mineral matter of at least several percent on the basis of weight. Tiny inclusions of chlorite, amphibole, and pyroxene are thought to contribute to the green base colors of bloodstone. The splashes of red are concentrations of iron oxide minerals - most likely hematite.

The most highly regarded bloodstone has a solid base color of deep forest green. On top of that is a light splatter of sharply contrasting and clearly visible blood-red dots. These are arranged in a spray or a random pattern as if they were blood spatter.

Specimens with this preferred color scheme and pattern are rare. Some people relate this color pattern to the "Blood of Christ" and give it a religious significance. That is where the name "bloodstone" and some of the gem's popularity are derived.

It is unusual to find green chalcedony with markings that are only red in color. Usually there are dots, bands, or streaks of white, yellow, orange, and brown. If these other colors are less abundant than the red markings, the material is still called bloodstone by many people.

When colors other than red dominate, either alone or as a group, the material is usually called "fancy jasper." The name "jasper" is used because opaque chalcedony is, by definition, a jasper. Bloodstone is not called "jasper" because the name "bloodstone" is more specific.

Bloodstone Localities

Most bloodstone used today is mined and cut in

India. Other sources of bloodstone include Australia, Brazil, China, and Madagascar. In the United States, small deposits of bloodstone have been found in California, Nevada, Oregon, and Washington. Bloodstone forms at shallow depths and low temperatures by precipitation from silica-rich groundwaters in fractures and cavities.

<u>Lapidary Use:</u> Top-quality bloodstone is almost always cut into cabochons. Some is also cut into wands, small sculptures, bowls, and other utility objects. Occasionally it is cut into large faceted stones. A large amount of middle to lower grade material is processed in rock tumblers to produce tumbled stones.

Bloodstone has historically been a stone of men's jewelry. It was often cut with a signet design, mounted into a ring, and used to seal documents and letters. Today, flat-top or gently domed cabochons are popular in men's rings and cufflinks. It is sometimes cut in relief or intaglio with the bust of a warrior, a dragon, family crest, national symbol, or other motif.

Bloodstone as "Aphrodisiac"? In India, specimens of bloodstone with the finest colors are crushed, ground into a powder, and used as an aphrodisiac. This use removes much of the best bloodstone from the gem and jewelry market. The price for a gram of aphrodisiac rough is higher than the price for a gram of cutting rough.

Bloodstone as a "Healing Stone": For at least two thousand years, many people have believed that bloodstone has "healing and protective properties" that are beneficial to people who own it, wear it, or carry it on their person. It has been thought to control bleeding and inflammation, among other things.

For these reasons many people wear bloodstone rings or pendants as a talisman. Within the past few decades, these beliefs have seen a revival in the United States as part of the New Age movement. There is no scientific or medical evidence that these beliefs have any medical value beyond the placebo effect.

IDENTIFYING UNMARKED SOLDERS

There are plenty of ways to mark your sheet or wire solders, but suppose you forgot to mark them and have a couple that you can't identify. The answer is to compare the melting temperature

of the unknowns with that of a known solder. What I do is take a thick scrap of copper or nickel and arrange several solders on it. Ideally, I would have a sample of easy, medium and hard known solders surrounding the unknown solder. Then I heat the plate from the bottom and watch the order in which the solders melt..

INEXPENSIVE ELECTRIC WAX PEN

You can make your own wax pen from a small soldering iron plugged into a light dimmer switch for heat control. Both components are easily found at a big hardware store or at Harbor Freight. As an example of the components, see items # 43060 and # 47887

File the tip of the soldering iron into the shape you prefer or even better get a soldering iron with replaceable tips. Then you can make several tip shapes for different tasks. Set the dimmer control just hot enough to melt the wax without producing any smoke.

A tip design that I find ideal for some work is a length of small gauge wire that lets me reach in around the model to melt some wax. The wire is 18ga and about 15mm long. I use Sterling wire to conduct heat easily to the tip, and I silver solder it into a hole on the end of a copper or brass rod that fits into the solderiron.
