

## What Lies Beneath Salem's Clear Waters?



One day last summer I woke up to a morning that could not have been any better. The sky was as clear as it could be, and the surface of the lake was perfectly still. As I looked down through the shallow water beneath the dock, I could see every detail of the bottom as if I was looking into a goldfish tank at the local pet shop. Absolutely high-def.

I slide the paddle into the canoe and pushed off just to get a few minutes out on the open water before the conditions changed. I was amazed at how clear the water was below even with 10 feet between me and the bottom. And as I started off around the point, I had my attention on milfoil, but within a few hundred yards, my mind wandered to more exotic targets known to be down there. Objects that very likely have been preserved by the cold deep in which they've been laying and by the material of their construction.

Objects that were lost by members of the family well over 40 years ago by now, a pair of eyeglasses from one uncle, and an anchor that belonged to another.

So like some armchair Indiana Jones, I ventured off toward the area of the lake where the legend of the eyeglasses is believed to have taken place; wondering if today after all these years, I'd catch a glint of sunlight off the edge of a lens sticking up in the mud, or perhaps see the last filaments of anchor line reaching up from 80 feet below beckoning with a ghostly wave for help.

I wasn't on board any of the boats at the time these items went down. I never heard the ker-plunk of the glasses as my uncle bent over the side only to watch his spectacles slide off his nose and into the drink. I don't even know how the anchor line snapped so many years ago as that story never had much to it anyway. Yet, there remains a mystery to these objects. How far down are they? Could they be retrieved with the right equipment? What condition are they in? What else may be lurking down there I don't even know about? Might some scrap of treasure from Rogers' Rangers adventures across the border be lying right alongside my uncle's pair of prescription bifocals?

After about 20 minutes of mindless paddling and staring, I called off the recovery mission. The breeze had just arrived and a light ripple was now obscuring the view below. But what a story that would have been. A trophy to hang on a wall. And don't think I wouldn't. Imagine a set of rusted up eyeglasses mounted on a wall plaque like a shellac trout.

Yes, it would be a cool thing to find. I'd have a documentary crew mock up the recreation. Me (played by Dennis Quaid) out there in the elements with no food or water, only my wits and will to guide me. Out on the open water with no power, compass or bacon.

But then again, some things are best left in mystery. Forget the film crew After all, someone might drop a lens overboard.

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## Honoring a Long-Time Friend, Administrator, Educator

David H. Wood (1932-2009)

The Salem Lakes Association took a loss last summer after the passing of its original founders and long-time president and ally, David H. Wood.

David was born and raised in Derby Line, VT, the son of Leland and Helen (Heyer) Wood. He was the loving husband to Marlene, their children and grand children. He was also one of the most dedicated stewards of the Salem Lake waters serving as a key advocate, researcher and monitor over many environmental issues and events that influenced the quality of life here for so many friends, neighbors and visitors. His energy and guidance helped shaped an association that has held fast to its charter now for 26 years.

Dave graduated from Derby Academy and the University of Vermont. He earned his Master's Degree in Education from Boston University. His career in education as teacher and principal spanned a period of 34 years; 12 of which he served as principal of the Lake Region Union High School.

In his younger years, Dave spent his summers organizing and teaching swimming lessons and as a lifeguard to youngsters at the Salem Lakes 4-H Camp. In later summers, he was employed as an Immigration Inspector.

Dave and Marlene purchased a cottage on Big Salem and resided there for more than 45 years. He enjoyed fishing and woodworking, and was always busy at some task. Through the years, Dave's passion became the Salem Lakes, their evaluation and preservation as places of beauty, recreation and valuable resources to family, residents, visitors and to the Town of Derby.

In 1984, Dave was among one of the original founders of the Salem Lakes Association, a group chartered to conserve the ecological quality of the lakes and protect the lakes from invasive species, plants and animals. He was a key spokesman for the association and represented the best interests of lake front property owners any time he dealt with state and regional government and environmental policy makers and opinion leaders.

To this end, David in conjunction and cooperation with the State of Vermont Agency of Natural Resources, instituted the Lay Monitoring Program whereby the water quality of the Lakes is monitored for clarity, phosphorous levels, Ecoli count at various times and locations during the summer, thus providing valuable information to all in determining the ecology of both Big and Little Salem lakes.

David also instituted the Greeter/Monitoring Program, which is in its seventh year at the Salem Lakes boats accesses. Monitors are employed to check any and all water equipment entering the lakes, checking for noxious and invasive animals and or plants. Monitors also provide printed and verbal educational information to any and all persons in regard to protecting the lakes.

"Dave's passing was very sad news to receive," said current association president Andy Major. "Much of what Dave did for this lake will benefit us now and for generations ahead. We're very fortunate to have had such a dedicated, caring individual. He was a model example of what it means to be a true steward. We at the Salem Lakes Association are determined to continue his work."

## Public Access to be Named In Honor of David H. Wood



The access area on Big Salem will be dedicated to David Wood. A new dock will also be part of the landscape at the ramp.

Now that summer is just about here, many people are anxious to get their boats into Big Salem for good fishing, sailing or a lazy cruise around the lake. And as of this July, that access ramp will no longer be a number on state map. It will be named the David H. Wood Access, to honor the former lake association president who passed away last August.

To commemorate the dedication, the Salem Lakes Association has scheduled a special visit to the site on Saturday, July 24 at 9 a.m. where members of the Wood family will be on hand to view a new state sign to be installed at the entrance to the access area. A new dock will accommodate launches alongside the ramp.




# Long-Time Lake Advocate and Co-Founder Si Houghton, 83



Si was one of the original founders of the Salem Lakes Association, which has as its objective to protect the lake and surrounding environment for all to enjoy now and for future generations.

He was very active in the association, as a director and chairman of several programs including the fisheries committee. This committee supported the stocking of fish in the Clyde River and the lake. Si monitored the lake levels all his life, especially when lake levels were harmful to other lakeshore owners as they were able to be controlled by man.


