The Great And Holy Week

THE TRIDUUM

The period from the Thursday before Easter to Easter Eve is the climax of the Lenten period; is, in fact, second only to Easter itself in importance for the liturgical year, and is second to none in drama and symbolism.

This three day period is known as the Triduum (which is simply Latin for "three days") AND <u>SHOULD BE CELEBRATED AS ONE GREAT EVENT.</u>

MAUNDY THURSDAY

Maundy Thursday is not, as is widely believed, a commemoration of the institution of the Eucharist. It marks, rather, the giving of the greatest commandment ("Mandatum" in Latin, whence the middle English word Maundy") to love one another. The first Eucharist, then, becomes a true agape, the love feast of the Greek Christians. The Maundy Thursday service is the pivotal point of Lent. On Ash Wednesday there is confession but no absolution. That absolution is given on Maundy Thursday, thus closing that great penitential period. This is one of the reasons that the Maundy Thursday worship begins with the instructional portion of the service, the sermon. It is Pastor's Page continued...

in a very real sense a continuation of the Ash Wednesday service. The liturgical color is red, not the purple of the main portion of Lent. There is the darker side to this service, however, as it ends with the chanting of Psalm 22, which may be conceived as a homily delivered by Christ himself, during the ceremonial stripping of the altar. The service does not so much end as it is suspended, to be continued the next day.

GOOD FRIDAY

Good Friday is an extension of the Maundy Thursday service; it includes the reading of the Passion of our Lord. There is no celebration of Holy Communion during this service as this will take place after the proclamation of the Resurrection of our Lord on Easter Sunday morning.

THE GREAT EASTER VIGIL

The Vigil is full of readings from Scripture. Prepare your hearts and minds to hear the slow unfolding of God's gracious activity in the world and among us. Twelve readings are appointed, not all of which are read each year, but as a whole they lift up the greatest moments of the history of God's salvific work--creation, flood, testing of Abraham, deliverance at the Red Sea, the gift of wisdom, the valley of dry bones, the deliverance of Jonah, the deliverance from the fiery furnace, and more.

But why add an Easter Vigil?

Some churches call Holy Week the "liturgy of the three days." In a way, there are not three or four services that make up holy week, but one long service divided up into multiple parts. On Maundy Thursday, the church remembers Christ's last supper in the upper room with his disciples, and his servant-act of washing their feet. On Good Friday, the church commemorates his death on the cross. On Saturday, the church keeps vigil, mourning with the disciples, buried in the death of Christ, but anticipating the Easter morn. So it keeps vigil, re-tells the story of God's might deeds among Israel and in creation. It sits with the new in faith, and watches in anticipation for the light of Christ. The Easter Vigil is in this way both very solemn, and profoundly joyous.

THE RESURRECTION OF OUR LORD EASTER SUNDAY

This service is the climax of the three days proclaiming that Jesus has RISEN, HE IS RISEN, INDEED! We come together to celebrate and to worship our Risen Lord. At this service is when we receive Holy Communion after the proclamation of the Resurrection.

EVANGELISM

Why Should We Evangelize?

Desire to be obedient. Jesus commands his disciples to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matt. 28:19).

Love for the lost. Love should compel us to have compassion on those in need, and everyone's greatest need is eternal salvation. Consider how richly God has loved us (1 John 3:1, 4:10). If we are to love our neighbor as ourselves (Matt. 7:12), we should love them as we have been loved, which at the very least means sharing the gospel with them.

Love for God. Our ultimate motivation in evangelism must be to see God glorified, and God is glorified when the truth about him is known and made known.

But Pastor, I don't know how and I'm just not going to go around knocking on people's doors telling them about Good Shepherd, and I've invited my neighbors a dozen times and I've told my coworker a dozen times, and I don't want to sound like a religious fanatic, and I, and I ...

Well folks at the risk of sounding like a NAG, we are offering a class on "HOW TO" Evangelize and I hope that the whole congregation will take advantage of it at one time or another. After Easter, we will be offering it again, because it is that important. Please be prayerful in deciding whether or not you will attend.

The following are highlights from the March Council meeting:

> CALL COMMITTEE: Kathy Swartz reported on the progress of the Call Committee stating that the Call Committee had met with the representatives from the Synod and have distributed the first of several questionnaires. They are also working on a financial package to offer the prospective pastors. However, this package will largely depend on the congregation's survey results. Pastor Felice, who has a lot of experience in this process, passed along to the Council that we, as a church, are "way ahead" in our Call Process, meaning we are progressing at an excellent rate.

A proposed Order of Worship liturgy booklet to be used during worship service, that would preclude use of the current hymnals, was presented. The intent of these Order of Worship booklets is to make it easier for visitors to follow the liturgy and would change for each of the liturgical seasons (i.e. Lent, Easter, Pentecost, etc.). The vote was overwhelming against the proposal. Eric Hahn suggested that we give visitors the "large print" booklets that are prepared each Sunday. It will be the usher's responsibility to hand the visitors these booklets as the visitors are greeted by the Pastor.

- Dan Cashman and Jack Wolff (respective Head Ushers) will inform their ushers of this new duty.
- Date for "Pasta with Pastor" set for 20 October. A Ministry Fair will also be held in conjunction with the "Pasta with Pastor."
- The Synod had approved our new Constitution
- The "Path" has requested more money from Good Shepherd. The Council voted to keep our donations to the Path at our current level. The Cub Scout Pack asked if the church wants girls to be accepted into the Pack. Mike Busler stated that the National Boy Scouts of America has acted on this issue and that Good Shepherd should go along with the Boy Scout of America guidelines.



Several important items were discussed at last month's Worship & Music meeting:

- John Gifford is training Bob Bonomo in the sound booth. Harvey Johnson has contacted someone to make the rails for the sound booth so that the glass can be extended upward.
- We are still working on a ground for the hearing Loop system. Roger mentioned that John was going to contact Schlabach to see if they could help.
- Pastor Johnson will be instructing ushers at the 8:30 & 11:00 services in lighting the candles and other duties.
- Ann Possinger has all the months covered for distribution of the flowers after Church services. Thank you Ann!

- We want to thank all the leaders for helping with our Wednesday Lenten services. We so appreciate your help.
- Pastor Johnson mentioned that the ushers training went well for the 8:30 & 11:00 services.
- In new business, Pastor Felice brought up for discussion printing the Liturgy in a separate booklet for the different seasons of the Church. Lynn Bechdolt brought a sample of a printed pamphlet that she worked with in her church. It was much simpler to follow the service since it's all in one place. The worship book/hymnal would be used just for the hymns. It was decided to try it for 6 Sundays starting the Sunday after Easter. Dan Cashman, our liaison, agreed to present this change to the Council for its approval.
- There was discussion about the Flock which performs periodically for the services on Sunday. If someone is interested in joining that group, or any of our musical groups, they should contact Jeanne Kirk who is the Director of Music.
- Our next meeting will be Tues, April 3 at 10:00 am







CRASS CRAFT Make this special cross as a reminder

Make this special cross as a reminder of Jesus' death and resurrection.



- Adult help
- Piece of wood
- 5 nails
- Hammer
- 2 balls of yarn (blue and yellow)

What you do:

- 1. Hammer the nails into the wood to form a cross shape (see example).
- 2. Tie the blue yarn to the bottom nail. Wrap it up and around the top nail and back down to the bottom nail. Then wrap it around the middle nail and around the side nails. Repeat until the yarn is wrapped about halfway up the exposed nails.
- 3. Repeat step two with the yellow yarn. Wrap it around the nails until only the heads are visible.
