# Merry Christmas & Happy New Year

Matthew 2: 1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, <sup>2</sup>asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." <sup>3</sup>When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; <sup>4</sup>and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. <sup>5</sup>They told him, "In Bethlehem of



Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: <sup>6</sup>'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'" <sup>7</sup>Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. <sup>8</sup>Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." <sup>9</sup>When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. <sup>10</sup>When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. <sup>11</sup>On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. <sup>12</sup>And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

We continue to celebrate Christmas until January 6<sup>th</sup> when we recognize the visit of the Magi. Lots of people started celebrating Christmas right after Thanksgiving and are tired of having their trees and decorations up. They begin taking them down December 26<sup>th</sup>. Well for those of you who enjoy your Christmas greens, you can keep them up until Epiphany, which is January 6<sup>th</sup>. A couple of things to note about the reading of the Magi, or the wise men, are that there is no number mentioned. We use the number three because there are three gifts mentioned: gold, frankincense and myrrh. The other thing to note is that they entered a "house" not a stable. So that we believe the Holy family made it home by the time the wise men came to visit. We don't know exactly how long it took them to make the journey. Nonetheless we celebrate the Epiphany of our Lord on January 6<sup>th</sup> each year ending the Christmas season and beginning the Sundays after Epiphany or "Ordinary Time".

What a letdown after our caroling and gifting of presents and feasting on delicious meals with family and friends. And the church goes back to green from white and gold. OH BOY, what a letdown.

However, what we have now is a time to reflect on our lives and our relationship with our Lord. We ask ourselves the questions:

Why are we, "Good Shepherd Lutheran Church," here in this community? What difference do we make? Why am I here? What difference do I make as a disciple of Christ? What has Christ done for me? What can I, in turn, do for others in Christ's name?

This is the time to reflect on these questions, my friends. We are a community built on Christ's love and forgiveness. There are so many people out there right around us that have no clue about Jesus and what he has done and will do and it is up to us to invite them in to meet him.

May we all be witnesses to God's love in Christ Jesus during this "Ordinary" time of Reflection.

The following article is notes from the Good Shepherd Congregation Retreat! Sister Michelle Collins, from our synod offices, led us in our "Core Values Retreat" and has provided this detailed report for your review. The retreat is recommended by the synod when a congregation is preparing for the selection of a new pastor. We were very pleased to hear from Sister Michelle that this was the largest group attending her retreat AND she has worked with congregations larger that Good Shepherd.

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Hernando, FL is a medium/large congregation (2 services, average worshipping attendance 100-150). The congregation is a mix of ages, with a dwindling appearance of young families. The congregation has a 30 yr. history. The most recent pastor left in August, 2017, so the congregation is going through a season of transition with an interim pastor. The Core Values Retreat was called as part of the interim process as directed by the synod office. The retreat was presented as mandatory before a Call Committee can be formed. About 40 people attended the retreat, including council members, staff, and active involved volunteers. Some who attended have been part of the congregation for a long time, while others joined recently.

The goals of the retreat were articulated as:

- To get a sense of the congregation's history as a way of lifting up the congregation's core values
- To get a sense of biblical core values that are drawn out of scripture
- To begin articulating a list of core values for Good Shepherd Lutheran Church
- To understand the purpose of clarifying core values in preparation for calling a new pastor

The retreat began with a definition and description of core values and an invitation to begin articulating personal goal values by reflecting on some questions, including: "What is it easy for you to spend money on? What rituals and traditions really matter to you? What do you want to be remembered for? What lesson/s would you like to pass on to the next generation?" This exercise helped the participants begin understanding what core values are.

The next activity involved laying out a historical timeline of Good Shepherd as a way of drawing out the congregation's core values. Participants were invited to list significant events (positive and negative), major decisions, and other major influences in the congregation's life. Although the church has been in place since 1987 or so, there was more emphasis on the recent history of building expansion, pastoral transition, and the new stained glass windows. Based on this timeline, the group was asked to make a list of values that these events point to—what values are apparent from the congregation's story? Those words were listed on large paper.

The next activity was to draw out core values from the biblical story. Groups formed at tables, and read one of 3 passages of scripture: John 4:1-26, Acts 10:1-23 and Philippians 2:1-9. After reading and discussing the texts, additional words of value were added to the list.

The group was then invited to 'vote' on the 7 words they thought most strongly described what Good Shepherd values/stands for/thinks is important. There was a tie, so a total of 8 words were lifted up: All-inclusive, Stewardship, Outreach, Willing to Evolve, Worship, Children and Youth, Generosity, and Mission. In discussion the other words listed were added to these main 8 words as descriptors, sub-categories, included in the main word, etc. Groups were assigned to write a brief sentence or description to these 8 words.

The group generally felt that the 8 words and the corresponding sentences accurately begin articulating the core values of the congregation. Additional conversation for clarity and brevity may be helpful, but these 8 sentences generally describe what the congregation values at this point in its history. The group was interested to get additional feedback from those who were not able to make it to the retreat, and was intent on making sure there was follow-up so the ideas generated could be shared. The group was also very concerned about the council and the call committee continuing to take these values seriously in conversation with pastoral candidates.

#### **Some general observations:**

The participants in the retreat were generally engaged in the conversation about core values, and gradually were more able to point to values rather than programs as what was important. Throughout the day, I tried to emphasize that if the VALUES can be the thing the community agrees on, there can be flexibility and creativity in the programs that come out of those values. This helps people approach areas of disagreement from a less combative stance. There was still a tendency to point to programs, though, so as the conversation continues, an ongoing emphasis on the motivations/values of ministry will continue to be important. I also noticed that there was not a lot of conversation about spiritual growth, spiritual practices, etc. There was a lot of conversation about relationships with each other and relationships with the community being important, but not as much conversation about relationships with God. The conversation about worship had to do with creating space for positive relationships (non-judgmental about music styles, greeting neighbors and new people in the pews, etc.), and less about creating a space for spiritual experience or an encounter with God. The group's commitment to the values of being all-inclusive, generous and willing to evolve is interesting in light of the groups other commitment to children and youth. Additional conversation about how these values are connected will be important.

One additional note: Along with core values, a congregation in transition is also asked to articulate a mission statement. If Good Shepherd does not currently have a mission statement, perhaps one of the core values statements (mission or generosity, for example) might be speaking more to a mission statement. Leadership could consider using one of those statements as the mission statement. Good Shepherd already has the following statement on the web site as a mission statement:

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church exists to welcome all people to faith; equip all people with a faith that works in real life; and send us in service into the world in Jesus' name.

A conversation with leadership about whether this statement still describes Good Shepherd's mission may be adequate.

#### **Next steps:**

The conversation about core values will need to continue. Additional feedback from those who weren't at the retreat may be helpful. Formatting the statements into concise statements that can be shared and discussed broadly will be helpful. Additional conversation about 'what does this mean' will help expand commitment to these values.

- Approved facility usage for the Shrove Tuesday's pancake supper by the Cub Scouts.








- Wooden craft sticks
