## Pastor's Page

rdinarily in February I would be writing something concerning Lent or Lenten habits. This year Lent does not begin until March 6. So, what to write this month?

I was thinking I would write something about St. Valentine since St. Valentine's Day is February 14. However, therein lies another problem. We really do not know much about the historic St. Valentine. The name "Valentine" was itself a common name in the third century. So common in fact, that a Roman emperor had that same name. In the early martyrologies of the Church, three different St. Valentines are mentioned, all sharing Feb. 14 for a feast day. Unfortunately, the historical record is sparse.



The first St. Valentine was a priest and physician in Rome. He, along with St. Marius and his family, comforted the martyrs during the persecution of Emperor

Claudius II Gothicus. Eventually, St. Valentine was also arrested, condemned to death for his faith, beaten with clubs, and finally beheaded on Feb. 14, AD 270. He was buried on the Flaminian Way. Later, Pope Julius I (333-356) built a basilica at the site which preserved St. Valentine's tomb.

The second St. Valentine was the Bishop of Interamna (now Terni, located about 60 miles from Rome). Under the orders of Prefect Placidus, he too was arrested, scourged, and decapitated, again suffering persecution during the time of Emperor Claudius II Gothicus.

The third St. Valentine suffered martyrdom in Africa with several companions. However, nothing further is known about this saint. In all, these men, each named St. Valentine, showed heroic love for the Lord and His Church.

Stories (really legends) from the middle ages had St. Valentine performing Christian marriage rituals or passing notes between Christian lovers jailed by Claudius II Gothicus. According to <u>legend</u>, St. Valentine signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and healed from <u>blindness</u>. Another common legend states that he defied the emperor's orders and secretly married couples to spare the husbands from war. However, this person, whomever that may have been, was not the patron of love as we know it.

There is one legend/explanation that says Valentine was martyred the day before the pagan festival to the goddess Februata Juno at which boys drew girls' names for acts of sexual promiscuity. Were legends about the martyr's death modified to replace the heathen custom? No one knows for sure.

The popular custom of showing love and affection on St. Valentine's Day is almost a coincidence with the

feast day of the saint. During the Middle Ages, a common belief in England and France was that birds began to pair on February 14, "half-way through the second month of the year." Chaucer wrote in his <u>Parliament of Foules</u> (in Old English): "For this was on Seynt Valentyne's day, When every foul cometh ther to choose his mate." For this reason, the day was dedicated to "lovers" and prompted the sending of letters, gifts, or other signs of affection.

It seems that the erstwhile saint behind the holiday of love remains as elusive as love itself. Still, as St. Augustine, the great fifth-century theologian and philosopher argued in his treatise on <u>Faith in Invisible Things</u>, someone does not have to be standing before our eyes for us to love them. Jesus, himself, gave the greatest commandment that we should love our neighbor as ourselves. And much like love itself, St. Valentine and his reputation as the patron saint of love are not matters of verifiable history, but of faith.

Is it important that we know all the facts about Valentine? In my opinion what is important is to remember that while it seems that the exchange of "valentines" is more the result of secular custom rather than the memory of St. Valentine, and that the celebration has been secularized with cupids, flowers, and chocolate, there is a Christian message that should be remembered. The love of our Lord, is a sacrificial, self-less, and unconditional love. Such is the love that each Christian is called to express in his/her own life, for God and neighbor. Clearly, St. Valentine, no matter which Valentine, showed such a love bearing witness to the faith in his dedication as a priest and in the offering of his own life in martyrdom.

So, since I have nothing left to write, I guess I will start on next month's issue of The Shepherd's Voice.



Make this valentine for a family member or friend.




#### What you need:


- 10 wooden craft sticks
