s I am writing this article, a fifty-year anniversary is taking place. July 1969 was the flight of Apollo 11 with Neil Armstrong, Michael Collins, and Buzz Aldrin. The culmination of the flight was the Moon Landing. If you recall back in 1969, the television airwaves were fiercely ruled by the Big

Three: ABC, CBS, NBC. There was no one else. PBS didn't launch until a year later in 1970. In many rural areas only one or two of those options were available to home viewers. Not surprisingly, programming was completely predictable, depending on your rabbit ears.

The schedules were all the same. Monday through Friday the networks showed news programs, a few local shows, and then network-sponsored TV series and entertainment shows. But on the weekends we got cartoons. Yes. Let's hear it for cartoons. As I recall (I was 10 years old at the time) Saturday was a monster swamp of animated shows. Sunday housed the Wide World of Sports, Animal Kingdom, and of course, that great ruler of Sunday TV was "The Wonderful World of Disney." Weekends were "kid time" on most TVs.



But not on the weekend of July 19-20, 1969. Everyone was counting down to the space launch of Apollo 11 and watching every step of the mission by three astronauts. The greatest show on earth was no longer on earth, but on the moon. Everyone with access to a television was glued and gripped by what was unfolding right before their eyes. Who remembers where they were when Apollo 11 landed?

In 1969 this country was almost as divided as it is today. There had been the assassinations of Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy in 1968. There had been riots at the Democratic Convention in Chicago. Civil rights struggles continued to be stone-walled and steam-rolled. It was the height of the "Cold War"—it being the biggest reason that there was an Apollo 11 mission to the moon in the first place.

But as everyone watched together the moment when human beings reached so far beyond themselves that they were even beyond our own planet, we suddenly saw a larger picture, a more cosmic image, of what human beings with a purpose and vision could accomplish. It was a healing moment for our nation, and an intoxicating moment for our world.

Now scroll back to first century of Roman-occupied Israel. This is the world that Jesus and his first followers knew. It is a small, small world. No one knows anything about the universe except that there are "stars up there." The "heavens" and the "earth" were believed to be divided and separated by some sort of divinely created protective shell.

Yet those who were confessing faith in a new sort of Savior and Redeemer offered an explosively cosmic view of the reach of this story. The Apostle Paul writing his letter to the Colossians envisioned the cosmos as a

universe that was truly "unified" by God's design and God's providence, and where the "bond" that connected all its parts together was the Spirit of Christ.

In his epistle to this Church in Colossae, Paul quotes what is known as the "Christ Hymn" (Colossians 1:15-20). This hymn is believed to be an early hymn, a prominent fixture in Christian worship gatherings which was recited by all the faithful. It proclaims not just Jesus' divinity. It also proclaims his status as the "firstborn of creation." It assures disciples that Jesus is the one in whom "all things hold together" or "all things cohere."

Paul wanted those very localized and separated early Christians to know they were part of an even greater, cosmic story that embraced the one they called Messiah. Jesus was before time, in time, and beyond time. Indeed, he was "before all things." John's gospel begins, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God. All things were made by the Word and without the Word nothing was made that was made."

"In Christ all things hold together" (vs.17). Jesus was a cosmic event. Jesus was a walk on the moon. Jesus was a glimpse at the greatness of God's creative design for all life in all creation. But beyond the "big picture" of Jesus as the universal Christ and Savior of the cosmos, Paul zoomed in and zeroed down on the here and now. After affirming Christ's there-ness and then-ness, Paul addressed his here-ness and now-ness. It was not just the "universe" that Jesus offered himself to, it was his gift of wholeness and wellness that he offered to each and every disciple who came to him in faith. The gift that Christ offers is his own self, not just his sacrifice, but his personal, continual, and perpetual presence in the lives of all those who open themselves up to the mystery of being "in Christ" in their own lives.

"The Living of Christ." For that is what biblical imitation, that is what true following, ultimately entails. We do not "imitate" Christ, but we do impart Christ by the implantation of the Spirit. We are called by the living God of the cosmos to an "implantation" of Jesus' resurrection spirit. By the power of the Holy Spirit the resurrected Jesus lives his risen and rising life in this world. To be a disciple is not to imitate Jesus but to be so imprinted by Christ's story that it is "no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me." Once the risen Jesus' spirit is implanted within us our vision of the universe changes and our mission in life is forever altered. Like in 1969, suddenly our horizons, our world view, our universe view, shifts radically beyond our own selves and sees, if only for a few glimpses at a time, vistas of God's Big Love and Big Picture of the world.

If we are not just "imitating" Christ but actually imparting Christ's life and living his story in this world, we are not mimicking Jesus but manifesting Jesus. He becomes the author of our life story, and thus your authority, in the same way as whoever you give authority to in your life becomes the author of your life-story. This is a culture where every commercial says, "Make this brand the author of your story." Or "build your story on this product or process" or "let this celebrity be the author of your life story." When you come to a point where you trust no one but Jesus to be the author of your life story, you begin to be "imprinted" by spirit of Christ.

What Jesus wants is to share his resurrection life with us. Jesus wants to inhabit our lives every day in every way so that he is alive and arisen, he is present and participating in this world that he loves so much he came to show us the extent of that love. Do you understand how revolutionary this is? This is the Christian Moon Walk. But, it seems to be a secret that is not shared enough by the Church. It's up to you and me to impart that secret, to tell it on the mountain-tops, to walk it on the moon, to come out of our closets and moon walk our secret. This is a panacea for the planet, a cure-all for the cosmos: *"Jesus died for us; We live in Christ and Christ lives in us."* Let's imitate it, impersonate it, and manifest it. Now is the time for Christians to do some moon walking.

ELCA Churchwide Assembly

This month the ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the primary decision-making body of the church, will meet at the Wisconsin Center in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, August 5-10, 2019. The Churchwide Assembly meets every three years. Delegates (aka voting members) from all 65 synods of the ELCA will gather to discuss and make decisions about how to go about God's work as a church. This year the assembly will gather under the theme "We are church."

At the ELCA Churchwide Assembly the voting members meet with confidence in God's grace around word and water, wine and bread, to carry on their work on behalf of the entire church. Over the course of the assembly, voting members:

- Hear reports and review the work of churchwide officers, leaders and units;
- Receive and consider proposals from synod assemblies;
- Elect officers, board members and other leaders as specified by the constitution or bylaws;
- Establish ELCA churchwide policy;
- Worship together;
- Adopt a budget; and
- Conduct other business related to the ELCA churchwide organization.

There is also one important responsibility of the assembly that will take place -- the election of the Presiding Bishop and Secretary as well as persons to the Church Council and to churchwide boards and committees.

Please remember to remember in prayer those who gather for 2019 Churchwide Assembly. Keep in mind that their work is our work. The work that the Churchwide Assembly will do is a process of communal spiritual discernment to bring about God's will for God's people. Together, the Assembly will worship, pray, engage in Bible study, deliberate and conduct business in plenary sessions. When members of the assembly participate in and make decisions about the mission and ministry of the ELCA: We are church. We are Lutheran. We are church together. And, we are church for the sake of the world.

In order to meet the demand, along with budget restraints, we've had to cut \$600 a week in purchases. This means we are unable to purchase fresh vegetables and pet food. As of now, it also looks like we'll be cutting an additional \$600 a week effective August 1st, which will amount to a total of \$1,200 a week, and will mean cutting canned good purchases. Florida Bahamas Synod Assembly

June 6 to 8, 2019



Greetings! This is Part 2 of my report on the Florida Bahamas Synod Assembly. Part 1 gave information on how to get more information directly from the synod office. Again, if you want

At this year's assembly, for the second time the attendants were seated with their conference. We are in the Pinelands Conference which includes other ELCA congregations from Citrus, Marion and Levy counties. Mike and I were also able to sit together with our pastor, Dennis Koch and Rebecca Donohue, our Good Shepherd youth voting delegate. This was a great opportunity to become more familiar with them and other Pinelands members.

I have mentioned voting several times and this year's voting took place over the three days. All voting this year was for new representatives of the synod council. Great effort is taken by the ELCA to have wide representation on the council and we voted on: Southwest: one clergy member, Southeast: one lay female and one PCLE (Person of color or primary language other than English), North: one PCLE and one lay male, Synod-wide: one youth, and At-Large: we elected six females. All elections are by a majority of voting members. Each plenary session is started with a "Credential Report." This year's reporting was made by newly ordained Pastor Sarah Loche. Pastor Sarah approached the podium carrying her new baby, Nathan. He was an absolute doll! Each time he came up to the podium with his mom he was happily sucking on his pacifier. Pastor Sarah would pull the pacifier out of his mouth and he would smile, giggle, wave and "talk" while his mom completed her report of the number of people attending, the required number of voters to make the vote. On E-Spirit you can see pictures of how

adorable he is. And what a great way to liven up the voters and get people's attention.

The Bishop and staff really extend themselves in putting together a fabulous agenda and program over the three days. Two years ago when we attended, the representative from the Milwaukee home office of ELCA commented to our assembly, "I have been to years of assemblies and never have I seen a group who laughed so much! This is great that so many people are effortlessly, and with fun, completing the work at the assembly!" This year the agenda included three items called Holy Humor, also known as Al Ernst, also known as "The Jesterdog Expedition." He is a hilarious man with stories we have all experienced or can experience. Right now we are working to add Al to the Winter Music Series for a performance in November or December. Speaking of the Bishop, our new Bishop, Reverend Pedro M. Suarez, was an amazing leader of our three days and is a remarkable leader of the Florida Bahamas Synod. In the first plenary session, he spoke about his first year as bishop and the challenges and rewards. He told us about his interest in the ministry of VITALITY and stewardship across the synod, intentional diversity, and healthy leadership. He proclaimed, "The Holy Spirit is ALIVE in our congregations!" He explained, "What do bishops do?" The answer is, "Attend lots of meetings, lots and lots of meetings!" He has led the personal contact from the synod offices to visit over 80% of the ELCA congregations in the synod since he took office last October. At Good Shepherd Lutheran Church we had a visit from the bishop's office when one of his two assistants, Pastor Rob Carlson, presided at the installation of Pastor Dennis Koch in December 2018. In May, Pastor Carlson visited the Pineland Conference Meeting at Citrus Springs Hope Lutheran Church. Bishop Suarez has been to Geneva, Switzerland representing the ELCA, he has been to Puerto Rico three times, and attended many ordinations and
