

Pastor's Page

ow that it is the end of October and going into November, it is time to commemorate the Reformation. Notice I said, "commemorate." We do not "celebrate" the Reformation because the Reformation caused a schism in the church and we do not celebrate schism. And, we do not celebrate the

Reformation as "Lutheran Pride Day." What we do do is commemorate the work of the Holy Spirit as God used ordinary people to challenge the powers to be in an effort to bring God's message of grace, love, peace and salvation to the world in a new and powerful way. A way that the church at the time had been ignoring.

In 2016, Linda and I had the opportunity to visit family in Germany. While we were there we took the opportunity to visit many of the sites where Luther and the other reformers lived and worked. One of these places we visited was the city of Eisenach. This town is where Martin Luther lived as a schoolboy. He lived there with a family by the name of Cotta. The house is still there. It is situated across the main square from the village church which sits in the



center of the square. The Cotta house now contains a museum to Luther and the Reformation. In the gift shop which you visit on the way out of the museum – yes, just like we do in the USA – they had a black tee shirt that I found rather humorous. On it was a figure of Luther holding a hammer and it had written in bright red and orange letters these words: "Luther hit the nail on the head – 95 times." I did not buy the shirt because I did not want to spend the \$20+\$ that they were charging. Now, I wish I had.

As you probably know, on October 31, 1517 a young Martin Luther, one of the new professors at the University of Wittenberg, walked up to the Castle Church door and nailed what is known to history as "*The 95 Theses*" on the church door in an effort to challenge the church to a debate. What he got, instead, was something far more than he could ever have imagined. He literally, hit the nail on the head!

That simple act set into motion a series of events that changed the church, it changed the face of Christianity, it changed European society, and it changed history forever. What we need to remember is that the Reformation did not end in one day. It only started on October 31, 1517. We live, breathe, worship and believe in light of what began to take place that day. Reformation is about making the Word of God accessible and visible to people of every language, every race, every time and every place. "Reformation" is an ongoing movement, and not a once and done event. In fact one of the mottos of the reformers was the statement, "Semper Reformanda" which is a Latin term which means, "Always Reforming". Reformation is something the church does in faithfulness. It means to make the Word of God available and accessible to everyone, everywhere, and in any way, because as Luther (himself) said, "We are a priesthood of all believers." We live it out in our lives and among the people we interact with.

So, what about now in Citrus County, Florida? What kind of Christians are we today? And, what kind of church are we and what kind of Church will we become? How do we live as the priesthood of all believers and be always reforming? What, you don't like change? Well, the Holy Spirit brings change and transformation.

At the ELCA churchwide offices in Chicago is a person by the name of Rafael Malpica Padilla. He serves as the Executive Director of ELCA Global Mission. I have heard him speak on a couple of occasions and have found him to be very faithful. I have also found him to be very articulate. And, he understands what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. He knows the meaning of the questions I just posed above. I would like to share some thoughts of his with you. The question, "What kind of priest are you?" is about theological identity; it applies not only to priests, but to the priesthood of all believers – the church.

So therefore, the question remains. If we are a priesthood of all believers, what kind of people of faith are we? For Lutherans shaped by Martin Luther's insight that all of life is part of our calling from God, the question of theological identity is not only about the interior faith of our hearts and minds, nor is it only a description of how we live within church walls. It's also about the life of faith we live out in the world around us. This has always been the essence of Lutheran Christianity. Malpica Padilla, in addressing the issue, pointed to the simple question Martin Luther once posed in a sermon where he asked, "How do we stand before God, and how do we stand before neighbor?" Malpica Padilla went on to say, "At the heart of our Lutheran identity is relationship with God – justification by faith." Justification is a free gift of God's Grace apart from human works. But, if justification is nothing less than the total restoration of our personal relationship with God, it is also something more: a transformation of our relationships with others.

For Lutherans, justification is, "Not only freedom from 'sin and brokenness'; it is 'also freedom for' a purpose," he added. Where Luther wrote that sin is being curved in on the self, "justification means striving toward the other. It is lifting your chin up so you can see the other and not just the other who looks like you, but especially the other who is different from you."

Love of God and Love of Neighbor, for Luther and for Lutherans today, is a theological identity that guides our whole lives. It's worth considering how the Reformation roots of social action continue to guide Lutheran identity and calling – exploring how we stand not only before God, but also before our neighbors. What kind of Christian are we today? And, what kind of church will we become? Those were the questions before Luther and the Reformers. They are the same questions that face us today.




he following are highlights from the October Council meeting:



We thank Peg H. for two Christmas quilt tops, Gloria P. for tops and bottoms and for sewing edges and Pat M. for flannel backing.


On October 16th we had eight quilters and 1 sewer and we finished four quilts and took time to greet two snow birds back.




