

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹ When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the

place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. (Matt. 2:7-11)

We begin this new calendar year in the Christmas season. And, yes, we are still celebrating Christmas in January. We are in the midst of the 12 days of Christmas –New Year's Day is the 8th day of Christmas. Christmas is celebrated until January 5th. Even as the calendar winds down, the Church Year still continues on!



So ... in a week the season of Christmas will end and we will enter into the season of Epiphany. On the day of Epiphany, we remember the arrival of the Magi and gifts that they brought for Jesus, the new king they had been searching for. As part of the season of Epiphany, we celebrate other church festivals within the season of Epiphany – *The Baptism of our Lord* (1/12), *The Presentation of our* Lord (2/2), and the *Transfiguration of our Lord* (2/23), For this month's newsletter, I wanted to give a brief introduction to the season of Epiphany, as well as to teach about what to expect during Epiphany.

What do you know about Epiphany? If you don't know much, don't feel too bad; you are not alone. This is one of the least known church seasons of the church year. Here are some facts:

Origin: The season of Epiphany is one of the oldest seasons that is observed in the Church Year. The only other season that is older than this festival/season of the church year is Easter. Epiphany begins on January 6^{th} , and it seems that the date has its origins in a pagan festival that celebrated the birth of Aion. Back in the late first or earlier second century, the church replaced this festival with a celebration about the baptism and birth of Jesus. Modern Christians celebrate this date as the arrival of the Magi, or The Wisemen, as they are normally called.

<u>Name and Themes:</u> The word "Epiphany" means "manifestation" in Greek. This season focuses on Jesus' manifestation as true God and true man. You see this with the inclusion of texts like the baptism of Jesus and

the Transfiguration. Texts about Jesus' miracles are also common in this season (like His first miracle at the wedding at Cana), and they bear witness to His identity as God. Another theme in this season is light, and it is often reflected in the hymns.

<u>Color:</u> The color for the season of Epiphany is green. Green often depicts growth and fulfillment. White will be used for the three festival Sundays, but the remainder of the Sundays of Epiphany the color Green is also used. It is the same color used during the season of Pentecost (which is the longest season of the Church Year). The idea of the color green being used can lead credence to the idea that Jesus is the fulfillment of Scripture, and that the prophecies about him, his work, and his coming are being fulfilled.

<u>Length:</u> The season of Epiphany can vary in length. Last year, it was almost as long as it could be, and this year it will be 9 days earlier (April 12) than last year. What effects the end date? Easter. Last year, Easter was on April 21, which is one of the later dates that it can be. This year, Easter is on April 12. (Three days before Tax Day!) The latest date that Easter can be is April 25. The next time that will occur is in 2038. The next time after that? The year will be 2190! Epiphany this year will be eight weeks long when you include the appearance of the Magi. Epiphany can have as many as nine Sundays!

Merry Christmas to all, and may the Blessings of our Lord be upon you in this New Year. And, may the Lord's blessings be manifested before your eyes this Epiphany season!

Applying Biblical Principles

Applying Bible Principles

nce upon a time, there was a craftsman who spent many hours each day laboring over his workbench. Hour after hour, he would mix clay with water and turn the spinning wheel to form beautiful vases and other objects of art. He was a master potter, second to none.

One day, though, as he was working and molding the clay exactly as he desired, the clay spoke. Indeed, it not only spoke, but it also began telling the potter what to do. "Press in a little more here. Put more pressure there. Give me a nicer curve down here. Don't make me so short and stout." And things like that.

Preposterous, you'd say. And you would be right—that would be preposterous. A lump of clay can't tell the potter what to do or how to mold it. Neither can we as Christians tell God how to shape and mold us. But that doesn't prevent us from trying.

Some Christians, in fact, go through their entire lives trying to tell God what to do with them and how to do it. It is as though they are the recipients of some master plan and that God's role is limited to carrying out their bidding.

The apostle Paul asked this rhetorical question in Romans 9:21,

Has the potter no right over the clay, to make out of the same lump one object for special use and another for ordinary use?

The answer is obvious. Of course, the potter has power over the clay to mold it as the potter desires. In a similar way, God is the potter; we are the clay. All that we have comes from God. And all that we have — including our time and our talents — belongs to God. Just as a master potter has the right

to shape and mold the clay as he sees fit, God has the right to do the same with us. As we yield to God's sovereignty and wisdom, we will come forth exactly as God desires.

William Zambrano wrote,

. . . you were born in this era because this is the time when your unique mixture of talents will be of greatest good for God's eternal kingdom. And nobody can provide exactly what you provide.

It all boils down to this: Will you use the "unique mixture of talents" God has given you to make a difference for Christ, especially here at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church? Will you take your rightful role on God's workbench and allow God to fulfill the role of "master potter" in your life? Or will you continue to try to tell God what to do as you view your time and talents as things that belong to you?

As you think about total stewardship over the next few months, and as you consider what kind of job you are doing in managing the time, talents and treasure which God has entrusted to you, to recall Steve Mizerany's slogan, "Don't be confused!" Remember, God owns it all!






- Permanent markers
- Foil pan and cooking spray
- Drop cloth
- Gloves
- Quick-set concrete (and adult help)
- Bucket and paint stirrer

What you do:

- 1. After reflecting on the past year, use markers to decorate stones with memorable words, dates and drawings.
- 2. Spray pan with cooking spray. Set pan outside on a drop cloth.
- 3. Wearing gloves, mix concrete in a bucket, according to instructions.

- 5. Press in stones, handprints and other decorations.
- 6. Let dry completely. Remove from pan.
