





- Some of the most affordable in-state options include University of North
 Texas at Dallas (doesn't require an essay!), University of North Texas, and
 Midwestern State University (doesn't require essay).

PART B) Four-Year Application

- You will be entering as a Freshman in Fall 2020
- Most applications will ask you for a first choice school → select this based on your intended major (ex. If you want to study business, select the college of business).

FAFSA: FSA ID

TASK 3: FSA ID www.fsaid.ed.gov

- The **FSA ID** is a **username** and **password** used by students, parents, and borrowers to:
 - Log in to U.S. Department of Education websites
 - Electronically sign documents (like the FAFSA!)
- You will use it:
 - Every year you apply for federal student aid at <u>fafsa.ed.gov</u>.
 - To receive a federal student loan.
 - To apply for work-study.
 - To perform important activities as a federal student loan borrower, such as choosing a repayment plan or applying for a deferment

FSA ID: <u>www.fsaid.ed.gov</u>

Remember, this is only STEP ONE of completing the FAFSA. After you create your FSA ID, you will then be able to log into www.fafsa.ed.gov to submit your FAFSA (**which will require student's + parents' 2018 Tax Returns & W2s).

Attend a FAFSA/TASFA Night at Woodrow to finish your application
 -- every Thursday throughout October in the library, 5:00 7:00 pm!

FSA ID: Does my parent need one?

- If you are a **dependent student**, then your parent will need an FSA ID in order to sign your FAFSA electronically.
- Not sure if you're considered a dependent student for FAFSA? Go to <u>StudentAid.gov/dependency</u> to find out.

IMPORTANT

- You and your parent must have different FSA IDs.
- You must create your own FSA ID—it's your electronic signature and you need to own it.
- Your parent must create his or her own FSA ID.
- You and your parent should each use your own **email** & **phone number** when creating an FSA ID (you can't use/share the same email address or phone number).


FSA ID: Fill out your information ACCURATELY

 MATCH THE SPELLING OF YOUR NAMES → FIRST, MIDDLE INITIAL, LAST-- They should match what is on your Social Security Card.



FSA ID: Create Security Questions & Answers



- Answering your challenge questions is one way to unlock your account or reset your username and password.
- Make sure your answers are easy to remember (they will not change while you're in college!).

FSA ID: Verify Your Email & Phone Number

- Once you verify your email, you can use your email address to log in to Department of Education websites (including your FAFSA application!).
- Verifying your email AND phone number will make it easier to recover your username and password.

TASK 4: Creating a Resume

Purpose:

- Communicate that you are able to communicate!
- Show employers/admissions officers that you are professional and dependable. Typos are a red flag!
- You accomplish this by clearly articulating your experience and showing consistency.

Quantify as much as possible:

 Use numbers, percentages, and supporting facts to show that you have a track record of success.

Resume Tips

Grammar:

- Use action verbs to begin a describing a bullet point.
- **Verb tenses**: if something on your resume is in the past, use the past tense (managed, delivered, organized) and if you are still actively in the role, use the present tense (manage, deliver, organize).
- Avoid using Pronouns "I" or "me" or "my"
 - **EXAMPLE**: Instead of saying, "I served and waited tables daily," say, "Served meals, cleared tables, monitored five tables, and provided exceptional customer service to up to 30 customers daily."

Spacing/Format:

- Maintain a consistent font and font size throughout your resume.
- Use a standard/professional font (ex. Times or Arial); use 11 or 12 point font size.
- Format in a logical structure (i.e. most recent activities first).

COLLEGE ESSAY WORKSHOP

TASK 5: College Essay Where does it fit into your application?

- The essay is one component of the larger profile / application process.
- It provides an opportunity to make your application more personal: you have a direct say!
 - If you think your transcript/test scores don't distinguish you, your essay CAN.
- <u>Throw structure out the window</u>. A college essay is not a five-paragraph research paper.

College Essay

- DON'T repeat the prompt.
 - The most influential person in my life is my mom...
- DON'T give me the factual background.
 - I was born on December 6, 2002 in Dallas, Texas.
- DON'T write in third person.
- DON'T regurgitate your resume (it's already in your application!).

- DO immerse me in your world: **TIME** and **PLACE**.
- DO get specific.

D0 tell a story only you can tell.

Standing Out: Dive Right In

"

A week after arriving in Israel for the first time in my life, I was fitted for a uniform and given a cursory tour of a military base in the Negev southern region of Israel. On the first night at 2:00 a.m., I was abruptly woken by soldiers shouting in Hebrew, banging on the doors of the barracks. My ears ringing, I hastily pulled on my uniform, not knowing what I was supposed to be doing, only knowing I needed to keep moving. I found myself bewildered, outside, at ready, in position with the rest of my chanichim within two minutes.

I was late.

You can distinguish yourself by telling a story → take your reader to a specific moment. This will allow you to incorporate vivid details that make your essay more memorable.

College Essay: Questions to Ask Yourself [THE WHY]

- Why is this important to you?
 - Why are you writing about this?
- What does this say about your your identity?
 - o Is there something you aren't saying?

Tell a story and REFLECT on its significance.

- How does this explain what is different or unique about your life experience?
 - Why will it be interesting to colleges?
- When, if ever, did you experience a transformation in how you viewed a situation or an event in your life?
 - How have you changed because of a situation, experience, or event?

College Essay: Last Tips

- If you are a first generation college student, ADDRESS THAT SOMEWHERE IN YOUR APPLICATION! Colleges are looking for you!
- At the end of the day, you're trying to win over an admissions committee. You ultimately should be reflecting a positive light on yourself. Get personal, but also stay appropriate.
- You CAN address something difficult or sad. But remember to turn it into something positive—remember the purpose of this essay.
- You **don't have a ton of space** (~500 650 words) to express **who you are!** Make sure every sentence has a purpose. Unless you're making a rhetorical move, don't repeat yourself (or the prompt)!
