
There were no field trips scheduled for January due to the annual show. Stay tuned, things will get back to normal in February.

direction of sediment transport. The elongate sand bodies represent ancient fluvial systems and offer optimal locations for high yield water wells. In western Rusk County, the Wilcox reaches a maximum thickness of approximately 1500 feet. The unit thins toward the uplift and is reduced to slightly over 600 feet thick in its outcrop in the eastern portion of the county.

During the mid-1970's, the state highway department undertook a widening project on the section of Hwy 259 south of Henderson, Texas to Mt. Enterprise. Approximately 8 miles south of Henderson construction cut through a high hill exposing a good cross-section of the Wilcox Formation. The Wilcox is not only a very good aquifer in East Texas, but it is economically important as a source of lignite that is fuel for several area electric power producing plants.

The author made many weekend trips to that road cut when the heavy machinery was not working to collect petrified wood and several very unusual mineral species for this part of the country including quartz crystals with carbon inclusions, halotrichite, sulfur, pyrite and chalcopyrite. About halfway up the cut, a thin seam of very fine-grained siltstone was exposed that contained shrinkage cracks lined with tiny tetrahedrons of chalcopyrite sparkling in a rainbow of color. They were deposited as copper-rich water permeated the cracks and combined with the free sulfur that leached out of the sulfur rich lignite. There have been a number of reports of high concentrations of copper sulfate in some water wells in Rusk and Nacogdoches counties that could explain the presence of copper. It combined with the iron from the limonite stringers that are shot all through the formation to form chalcopyrite, CuFeS_2 . The other "rare" mineral for East Texas was the presence of halotrichite, a hydrated iron, aluminum sulfate, $\text{FeAl}_2(\text{SO}_4)_4 \cdot 22\text{H}_2\text{O}$. It was rarely seen, usually late in the day when there was no moisture, since even morning dew could dissolve it. It appeared as a white "fuzzy" efflorescence on the siltstone. Tiny well terminated quartz crystals lined cavities in the petrified wood and many had a sprinkling of cubes of pyrite, FeS_2 , on them. Here again, the iron coming from the limonite and sulfur from the lignite.

A RARE MINERAL OCCURENCE FOR EAST TEXAS

In East Texas and Rusk County, the Eocene age Wilcox Group consists of beds of sand, silt, and clay, with locally economic amounts of lignite. These Wilcox Group sediments represent multi-facies, fluvial-deltaic systems where channels and associated sand facies form the framework for groundwater movement. The Wilcox aquifer is the source of good quality and quantity of water for Henderson, Overton and New London. The sand bodies are elongated, sinuous, and laterally discontinuous with axes generally oriented north to south consistent with the

The material removed from the cut was used to build up the roadway back toward Henderson so large pieces of petrified wood could be found for a half mile north. There were several logs of wood that were too large for me to handle at the time, and I had intentions of going back better prepared to get them. I shared the location with a fellow rockbound and he went the next week with a 16-foot trailer, ramps and a winch and cleaned every scrap wood he could find; pretty well putting an end to the collecting.

After 40 years, Mother Nature has reclaimed the cut and large pine trees have pretty well covered the collecting area; however, the siltstone layer can still be found to contain a few shrinkage cracks.

BEZEL SANDING

I always had a problem holding on to bezels when I'm sanding the bottom to level before soldering. At the last silversmithing class I instructed, Fred Mahaffey came up with a solution. With just a little modification to his technique, it worked great. He used the foam back of my diamond sanding block, but I think a piece of high density foam would work just as well. Lay your bezel on a piece of 400 grit sand paper and place the foam block on your bezel. Now just sand in a circular motion. Be sure to use a circular motion. If you just use a straight back and forth motion, you will end up taking more material from the edges on the end of your stroke.

I hope this will help you on your next project.


