# The Collecting Site

The site is located about 300 yds. From the access road. There is a well-marked trail from there to the collecting area. The trail is easy, but it does go down about 60 feet in elevation, ending at an artesian spring. Most of the material has been located near or in the spring area. Most of the area is sandy, with clay being predominate in the collecting area. It is usually muddy near the spring.

# Suggested Gear

Digging tool (rock hammer, shovel, etc.)

Probe - Some like to try to locate the wood by probing the ground before digging.

Rubber boots, if you plan to search in the spring.

Bucket

We will be making sure that trail is good and clear for easy access by ATV, so if you have an ATV, and want to bring it, go ahead. We will have ours there to help transport any finds back up the hill. Looking forward to seeing everyone here.






#### LAPIDARY/JEWELRY GROUP

Eight members of the Lapidary/Jewelry Group met at the home of Terry Roberts on June 10. Several members brought projects with them to share with the group. Kinney Polve brought some examples of Ocean Jasper cabs he had recently completed that showed the great variety of colors and patterns that can be found in this unique material. He also brought some sign up sheets for future classes in wire wrapping and silversmithing for Group members to sign if they wished to take some of the classes. Mitch Young brought

some outstanding cabs and examples of his wire wrapping artistry. One beautiful necklace had three wire wrapped malachite cabs separated by malachite beads (see picture 1 at right). Mitch also explained how he produced a very nice polish on some materials that may be hard to polish due to soft or porous areas using normal techniques. He showed some examples of this technique on blood stone, serpentine, and leopardskin jasper by coating them with a jewelry-grade two-part epoxy (see picture 2 at right). He also showed a gorgeous wire wrapped Sonoran Sunrise cab from old stock that had a brighter red cuprite mineral than seen in the material available in the current market (see picture 3 at right). 

#### BENCH TIPS BY BRAD SMITH

**ROCK-N-ROSE** 



FANCY RIVET HEADS—For a nice looking rivet head, use brass escutcheon pins. You'll have perfectly rounded heads that are all the same size and shape. The pins are a little hard to find, so try the best hardware stores first. Be sure to get solid brass pins, not brass plated steel. If unsure, test them with a magnet.

The pins are readily available online. Lee Valley Tools has them in 14 - 18 gauge and lengths from 1/4 inch to 1 inch. Go to <a href="http://www.LeeValley.com">http://www.LeeValley.com</a> and do an item search on "brass escutcheon pin"

For best results, select a drill that gives you a hole with a close fit to the rivet. Trim the rivet to a leave a little less than one diameter sticking out the back side. Place the head on a scrap of hard

plastic on the anvil so as to not flatten the head. I prefer a ball peen hammer (with a small 3/8 inch ball) for setting the rivet.

**EASIER PRONG SETTING**—When setting stones in a prong mount, the tool is less likely to slip off the prong if you grind a groove into its face or rough up the face a bit with sandpaper. Some folks prefer a prong pusher for doing this, and others like a set of pliers.

The easiest way to create a slot on the pusher is with a file, and the easiest way to create a slot on one jaw of your pliers is with a cutoff wheel. Then rough polish the slot with a medium grit, knife-edge silicone wheel.


