VICKY'S NEW PROJECT By Kinney Polve



We're always looking for new ways and projects to improve on our lapidary skills. Vicky Polve has done just that. Since our visit to Quartzsite, AZ, over a year ago, she has wanted to attempt making pine straw baskets. Making the center piece for the baskets gives me an opportunity to use my lapidary skill in a little different way. Also it offers me the opportunity to use some of the beautiful material that we have collected over years, that couldn't be used for cabochons because of pits or fractures. It's still a learning process, but I think her first basket turned out pretty good. Hopefully I can refine the process of encapsulating the slabs in epoxy resin. Vicky assures me that once she feels comfortable making basket, she will offer a Pine Needle Basket class. She doesn't want to teach people how to make her mistake.

TERRY ROBERTS CABS

While searching through my stash of slabs recently, I came across some slabs and heels from agate nodules that a friend sent me three years ago. They came from two ranches in west Texas, one south of Alpine and the other south of Marfa. The ones that I chose to work with can be called sagenitic agates since they have inclusions of acicular (needle-like growths) crystals of an unknown mineral, possibly aragonite (a polymorph of calcite). Frequently, the mineral that created the acicular crystals is replaced by quartz that forms the agate and the inclusion is then called a psuedomorph. Replacement of the softer mineral while retaining the original contents of the softer mineral while retaining the original contents.



nal crystal shape is highly desirable since the harder quartz prevents undercutting when polishing.

Depending on the shape of the sagenites, the inclusions can be further subdivided into pom pom and bouquet ag-

ates. Pom pom inclusions are spherical in shape due to the needles radiating out from a central point in all three dimensions; whereas, bouquet inclusions are usually fan-shaped and do not radiate from a central point in all dimensions.

The first picture is a scenic cabochon with a pom pom inclusion that mimics a sun rising above land and shining through a quartz cloud. Pom poms come in a variety of colors, some of which are quite spectacular, especially when found near Needle Peak just outside the boundary of Big

Bend National Park. The second picture shows a polished slab with several yellow pom poms that came from Needle

Peak.

The third picture shows a small nodule that has been cut in half. I have polished one side of each heel to best show the bouquets with several colors. The presence of multiple colors is unusual since most of the bouquets that I have seen from the ranch south of Marfa are white or, less frequently, another single color. Both heels have an unknown black mineral in the largest bouquet that (to me) resembles a sea horse caught in a sea anemone (the bouquet).


NOTE FROM THE EDITOR

BENCH TIPS BY BRAD SMITH

SHARP KNIVES FOR CUTTING MOLDS—Cutting molds is easier and more precise with a sharp blade. A new Xacto blade is sufficient for cutting RTV molds but is usually not sharp enough for vulcanized rubber. For that it's best to use scalpel blades available from most jewelry supply companies.

The #11 blade is triangle shaped, and the #12 is hawksbill shaped. I find the hawksbill is particularly nice for cutting the registration keys of the mold.



USE YOUR THUMB—When using multiple bits in a Foredom, we often have to deal with several different shaft sizes - the usual 3/32 inch burs, the larger 1/8 inch shafts sizes and of course the many different sizes of drills. For some reason I really dislike having to turn the key multiple times to open or close the jaws of the hand piece chuck.



So I have two ways to speed up that task. For opening up the jaws, I just remember "four", the number of turns I have to make to open the chuck just enough from the 3/32 bur shaft size to the larger 1/8 bur shaft size.

For closing the jaws around a smaller shaft, there's a neat trick. Hold the new bit in the center of the open jaws of the chuck, put your thumb lightly onto the outer toothed collar of the chuck, and gently start up the Foredom. As the chuck turns, it will naturally tighten the jaws around the bur shaft or the drill bit. Then all you have to do is a final tightening with the key.

By the way, we editors do a lot of writing and often never realize how many people are reading and appreciating the effort. Today I was surprised by some feedback.

Way back in 2007, I wrote an article for the inaugural issue of Interweave's Jewelry Artist magazine about broom casting. Last year, a portion of it was reprinted in the company's huge Jewelry Making Daily blog. That was definitely neat, but yesterday I was blown away by their announcement.

My post was named the most popular one of 2015, eight years after the original. Who would have guessed that so many people get a kick out of pouring molten silver into a floor broom. My book on the entire


