After a busy week and weekend, filled with a club meeting and SCFMS Convection, it was time for a welcomed break. With Texas September temperatures heading toward the 100 degree mark, my compass was pointing to the northwest and higher elevations. With the 5th wheel hooked up and loaded for a long journey. My life partner / rockhounding buddy and I loaded up and we hit the road. The plan was to head toward Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, stopping along the way. The first planned stop was the area around Silverton, Colorado. Rhodonite was the treasure I planned to find at this location, and I say that loosely. If there is one thing I



have learned in my years of travel, it is never set my plans in stone. That means never making reservations unless I am certain that I will not be rushed to get there. As we all know, "What can go wrong, will go wrong". This was one of those trips.

Let me get back on track, we finally arrived in Silverton. After setting up camp we headed to the BLM Office (Bureau of Land Management). This is one of the best places to get information on an area, and to put a wrinkle in the best laid plans. I say this because it always seems that I'll find out about something else of interest in the area. And this was the case at the Silverton BLM Office. Armed with this new information, we decided to check out the Silverton Museum. At first glance the Silverton Museum doesn't look



like much, but as they say, you can't judge a book by its cover. They have an excellent mineral display, along with a lot of history on mining in the area. Well here comes another wrinkle. The Silverton area is also an off roader's paradise, with the Alpine Loop and hundreds of Jeep trails.

Well back on track, Rhodonite. With mine dumps located all over the area, we decided to go to the Sunnyside Mine. The Sunnyside Mine was one of the largest and longest running



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operations in this area, and a well-known collecting location for Rhodonite. The road leading to Sunnyside goes through the old town site of Eureka, which has a fascinating history of its own. From this point the road

requires a 4 wheel drive vehicle. Once at the mine, it wasn't long before we were finding our prize. But that wasn't all, there was Chalcopyrite, Quartz Crystals and other nice mineral specimens. The area all around the Sunnyside Mine is a great place to find Rhodonite, but you are going to have to break a lot of rocks.

Next was a trip to the Old Mayflower Mill. The Mayflower Mill was in operation for 61 years, until it closer in 1991. You can now take guided or self-guided tours through the mill. The San Juan County Historical Society is preserving this site for future generations. We took a self-guided tour through the mill, and even got to operate a few pieces of equipment. It wasn't too difficult to in vision the mill in operation. After visiting the mill, we just had to drive up to the old Mayflower Mine. I recommend 4 wheel drive for this trip too. The road to the mine is steep with a lot of switchbacks. On the drive up we could see what was left of the old tram bucket line and the towers that it rested on. All that remains of the mine is a large mine dump of waste rock, old rusty rails, and pieces of old mining equipment. The shaft has been concreted in with what would appear to be a tombstone. It reads Mayflower Mine 9/21/1973. If you ever get a chance to visit this area, take it. We really did find the treasure while we were here, it was the beautiful scenery, and the peacefulness of the mountains and streams. And just a little advice from a wayward Rockhound, leave some extra time in your plans for the unexpected.





SHRINKWOOD BOLO SLIDE



Here is a picture of a shrink wood bolo slide that I wire wrapped for a friend in Corpus Christi. In the process, I found out that dead soft Argentium sterling silver work hardens much faster than dead soft gold-filled wire. This presented a problem when I started spiraling the wire around a dowel rod. I could not control the wire as much as I would have liked to and I could not get a tight wrap with the end of the wire either for fear of it breaking (which is what happened to the hardwood dowel rod). I hope you like them. Terry Roberts

LAPIDARY SUB-GROUP By Terry Roberts

Thirteen members and two guests attended the September meeting of the Lapidary/Jewelry Group meeting on the home of Terry Roberts on September 13. Terry invited all to gather around a table where he had laid out a bucketful of slabs for them to pick through and take home. Kinney also brought several slabs to add to the pile. Everyone had a great time going through the slabs to find the treasure they couldn't live without. The group then gathered inside the house, except for Mitch who worked on making several cabs using Terry's cab machine.

Terry showed the group a bolo slide that he had wire wrapped for a friend using Argentium sterling silver around a shrink wood slab. This is a beautiful slab of petrified wood with the outside surface that is checkered due to shrinkage before it becomes petrified (at least that is the theory). It resembles the pattern seen on a giraffe's skin. The silver wire that is normally made into a bail for a pendant is spiraled around a dowel rod on the back of the slab to hold the bolo cord in place around the neck.

Terry then started teaching a new member how to wire wrap pendants. He will complete the lesson at a later meeting. While Terry was teaching, Bill Faulkner started wrapping a beautiful amethyst crystal slab that came from a geode with several of the group members watching his progress. He was unable to finish the pendant before the end of the meeting and will complete it later. The meeting adjourned around 4:30 pm. The next meeting will be held in Whitehouse on October 11 at a location to be determined later. Kinney wanted to let the group help make rock critters at this meeting for our annual gem and mineral show in January.

BENCH TIPS BY BRAD SMITH

SOLVENT DISPENSER-—Frequently I need to fill a small bottle with alcohol, like an alcohol lamp or one of the nail polish bottles that I use for the yellow ochre anti-flux. Often I can't find a small funnel and end up spilling almost as much as I get into the bottle. It's wasteful, and the

fumes can't be too good for you either.

A neat and inexpensive solution is to use a lab dispensing bottle to store small quantities of the solvents you frequently use. It has a wide mouth for filling and a fine tip for dispensing. You can get a small stream or just a drop or two. With the bottle's fine tip I don't spill a drop.

There are many suppliers on Google. One I've used is Carolina Biological Supply Company at www.carolina.com The bottle is Catalog # 716580 Unitary Wash Bottle, Low-Density Polyethylene, 125 ML US\$ 5.35

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
