January Meeting Minutes

The East Texas Gem and Mineral Society monthly meeting was called to order by President Rip Criss at 7:06 p.m. January 4, 2010 in the meeting room of the Museum/Activity Center of the Discovery Science Place on Broadway Street in Tyler, TX. The meeting was moved to the alternate location due to another event scheduled in the larger conference room.

Motion to accept minutes of the December 2009 meeting was made by Becky Whisenant, seconded by Tom Stringfellow and passed unanimously.

Keith Harmon spoke concerning the first Kid's Day planned in conjunction with the annual club show and the need for volunteers to sign up to help on that day and the other days of the show, including Thursday, Jan. 21 to work with the vendors setting up for the show. Tyler ISD has estimated they will bring 600, fifth grade students, 80 per hour to the event. Admission to the show remains at \$3 for adults, \$1 for kids and free admission for Scouts in uniform. Keith reviewed other information about the show and stressed the need for volunteers to sign up for different events and to bring food to the Dealer's Dinner the club hosts on Friday night for the vendors. Work day for the show was set for Saturday Jan. 9th. Please, bring glue guns, glue and any supplies you think might be needed. Material for the 'Wheel of Fortune' and silent auction tables are in short supply, so please bring donations to help with this year's show.

Keith and Don spoke about the permanent exhibit the Discovery Science Place wants to set up in their museum featuring fluorescent rocks and has asked our input and help.

Gene Goar announced that Pat Nixon of Hot Springs, AR, will be holding wire wrapping classes on March 5th and 6th for any members interested. Cost will be \$100 per person and that will include wire and tools that the attendees will get to keep.


Susan Burch said that she is currently emailing newsletters to 20 members at a significant saving to the club for postage and printing.

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SHOP TIPS

WARNING ABOUT SOYBEAN OIL FOR CUTTING...

A year and a half or so ago, someone in one of the Midwestern states wrote an article about using soybean oil for cutting rocks as it was clean and odorless and no environmental effects. So I decided to give it a try.

It worked very well at first when the weather was warm in summer, but when cooler weather came in the fall, I noticed it started to thicken up. I figured this was only natural, but as time went on, I found the carriage was getting harder to move back and forth and the cross feed difficult to operate. During last winter I didn't do any sawing and when I was ready to resume last spring, I found I could not move anything in the saw. Everything was coated with a very tough film about 2 mm thick and semi hard-ened.

When I proceeded to clean it up, I found nothing would touch it. After trying various solvents, cleaners, and even gasoline, I finally tried paint and varnish remover and that worked. After a lot of hard work and expletives, I got the box and lid fairly well cleaned up but had no way to get the threads of the cross feed underneath. So I loaded the whole thing up and took it to a steam cleaner. They worked on it for an hour or more, using different agents and finally got enough so the cross feed could be cranked again.

So the bottom line is, DO NOT USE SOYBEAN OIL IN YOUR ROCK SAWS. I hope none of you have tried it as I did.

There are a couple of articles slated for publishing soon in the Rock and Gem magazine, one on mining there and most importantly on how to get there, and the other article provides information on a large stone found there and recently cut. Detailed directions are needed to get to the mine.


