The East Texas Gem & Mineral Society met February 4th, 2008 at the Discovery Science Place in Tyler. President Rip Criss called the meeting to order at 7:00 and welcomed guests Robert Ortega, Al Gay and Jared Kindred. It was also nice to see Marilyn back. There was a motion by Gene Goar, 2nd by Colleen, to accept the minutes from the last meeting. This passed. Jeri gave a treasurer's report and commended the show chairmen and all the workers on an excellent show with good results: 1,667 adults and 1,660 students in attendance. The grand prize winner picked up her treasure just before the meeting.

Under old business President Criss mentioned the information/publicity table out front at the show advertising the Discovery Science Place and that they thanked the club for allowing them to participate in the show. Gene announced that he and Becky will be presenting two programs on fossils and dinosaurs for the DSP during Spring Break on March 11th for any students present. It will be geared toward youth and will help publicize our club as well as fulfill our promise to the DSP to help with educational & entertaining youth outreach. The possibility of a summer kids' night club meeting was also discussed.

Laura reported that 9 members went on the fossil trip for shark teeth at the infamous road cut and had a great time. She announced a trip to the coal mine at Jewitt with a mine tour and an opportunity to collect the petrified wood there which has been analyzed and classified as sequoia. This will be limited to 20 people with attendees at the meeting given first priority. Laura also reported that the Arkansas quartz crystal collecting at the Coleman mine will be sometime this spring, probably in March and members planning on going should let her know as soon as possible.

Door prizes were drawn, then a break for refreshments. For the program Gene presented information on fossils, specifically mammoths, dinosaurs, and ammonites and displayed his very nice collection. He also practiced on us a little and got feedback for doing his presentation for the younger generation coming up in March. Thanks, Gene.

LIGNITE ON A SATURDAY AFTERNOON



Well, here we go a trippin' again! Sorry 'bout posting two stories in one mailin', but we finally got our groove.... It was 'nother purty day, not too early, but early nuff to eat some vittles at the Little Mexico in Palestine, Texas. We gathered up at the Jack in the Box at 1pm sharp, and headed to the Texas Lignite Mine in Jewett. We were early, and after clearing security at the gate we were greeted by Dave —

(the engineer at the mine.) There were 18 total in our group; two didn't make it Folks, twice the size from last months' field trip!

We were all invited inside to have a breifin'. I believe it was the first time Dave held a meetin' in the hall. (the conference area was occupied), but we did it! He told us a little about the 17 acres of this particular area, and how wide and deep the lignite is our group hit him with some very challenging questions themselves. The aerial map he showed us, and the layout of the operation, the tiny, tiny dot to the South was the buildin' we were in! We finally got our buckets and such and loaded in the two vans (that were provided for us). We drove past acres and acres of reclaimed property that are called "reclamation", but did you know they put topsoil on it, , plant it in grass, fertilize it, cut it, and use the hay (sort of recycle that too) to prevent erosion in other areas, and introduce the cutting to new reclaimed land? Did you also know that deer, coyotes, armadillos, hawks and the like are seen there, and NO-BODY is allowed to hunt them? It's like wildlife preserve to boot!

Okay, okay , we're getting' to the good part. We drove up to and got to stand in a "small bucket" for a photo shoot. If you look closely, we're all wearin' the same yellow vest with orange stripes....I swear, I thought we looked more like the highway clean up crew! LOL After seeing the machinery and stoppin' to talk and get a visual on the drag bucket, we got to put on our hard hats, safety glasses, had a safety meetin' right there beside the van. Ok, Ok, I guess you folks are ready for the rest of the story, now there is total truth in this here story, we're stickin' to it!

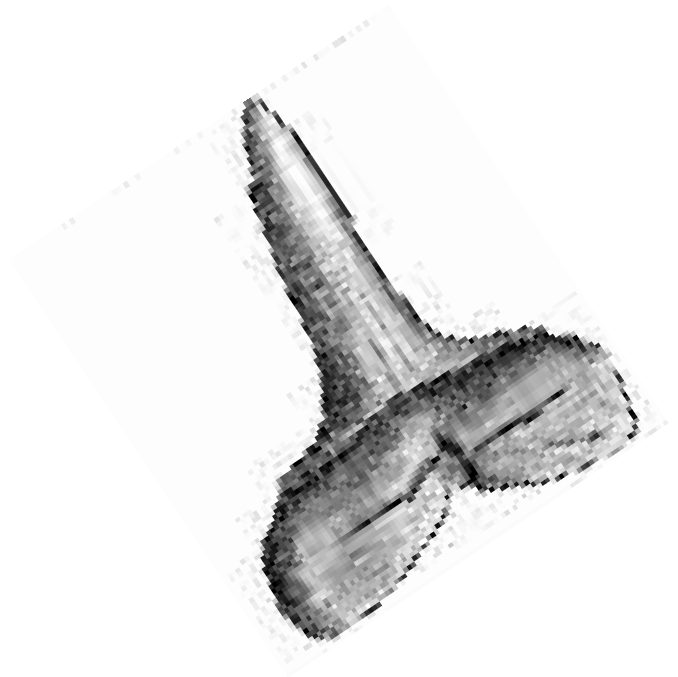
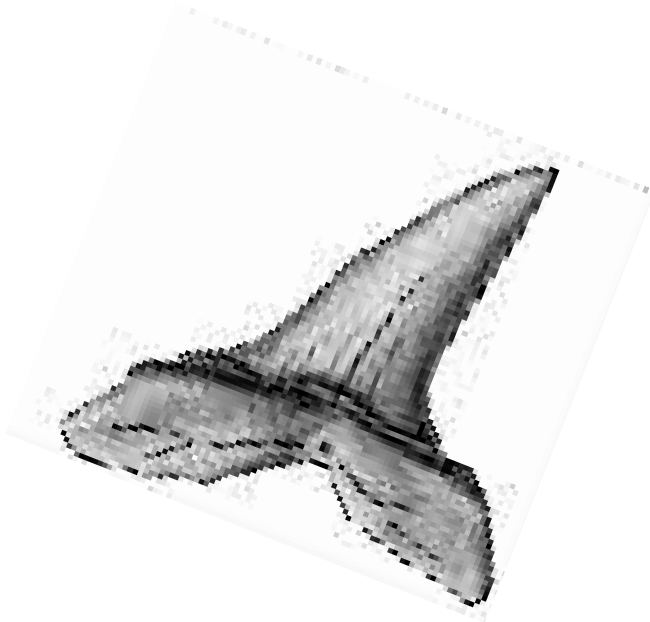

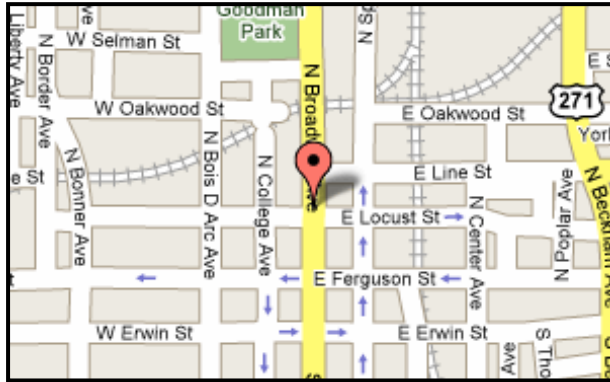
