A Look into the Past

This month's journey into the past will take a look at participation in the Azalea Trail in March and April and the Tyler Fair in September. As I only have minutes, some years are more descriptive than others. This article covers 1965 - 1975.

April 1965 was the Club's first participation in the Azalea Trail. In April 1966, five couples and three singles set up a rock display on the first Sunday. On the second Sunday, four couples and one single set up. The Trail wasn't mentioned in 1967.

The only minutes for 1968 were an overview of the year. This included the April Trail and September Fair. This Trail was described as "the best ever, and with the innovation of the money tree, a good sum of money was received and much public interest created." The Tyler Fair was September 21 – 28 and they asked the Club to display some of their mineral specimens and lapidary work. This was the first exhibit

at the Fair. According to the minutes, "the display was constantly viewed by fairgoers."

At the Trail in 1969, the Club displayed their mineral specimens on the Tyler Courthouse Plaza along with the Tyler Art Club on March 20 and April 6. They had the money tree and a dealer present to draw in the public. "There were very nice prizes given along with the chances on the money tree. They took in \$161.83." The Club had a display case at the Tyler Fair in September.

The Trail display of 1970 was held on the Plaza with the Art Club again. "Charles Creekmur had a table of specimens for display and sale. Bill Glasgow had a table of Mexican coconuts (Geodes) and other minerals for sale. The junior members operated the money tree. The Club had a 'choose your coconut and have it cracked open for 75 cents'. It was a success and all, but a few, coconuts sold out of 150 pounds." The Club made \$226.89 in sales and commissions. This was the best Azalea project the Club had had so far. The 1970 Tyler Fair had Club members displaying in Club-owned cases.

The Trail of 1971 was more of the same description of previous years. Geodes sold for \$1 and were cracked open for 75 cents. I have no book of Minutes for 1972, 1973, or 1974. In January 1975, discussion of the Azalea Trail began. Fifty pounds of geodes would be ordered.

The January 1975 program was presented by Dr Susann Heidrich, member and Professor. She presented a display of creative artwork using rocks, polished and natural, giving many ideas for projects at the February workshop. Each member was asked to bring rocks, newspapers and pliers. Dr Heidrich would bring various other supplies for purchase. The public was invited via a newspaper article or ad and about 50 attended, several of whom were children. One dealer was invited to the Trail, but declined. Another dealer was invited, attended and gave the Club the required 10%. As there weren't enough jewelry or good geodes left for a second display, the second Sunday wasn't attended.

In July 1975, a member said they needed to be planning for the next Trail. He asked for more tumbling stones since the Club Supply had been used up. Also brought up were a mineral exhibit at Broadway Square Mall and perhaps a sale at the Garden Center during the Rose Festival. There is no mention of the Tyler Fair (or East Texas State Fair?) being a place of display. One member did enter her rock collection in the hobby division and won a blue ribbon.

Correction: In the December article, I made an error in a location of a field trip because of handwriting. Magna Cove should have been Magnet Cove in Arkansas.


