During the second week of November my son, Chris, and I stopped in Dallas to pick up my old college dorm-mate, Dr. James Carter of UT Dallas as we drove out to Socorro, New Mexico for the 39th Annual New Mexico Mineral Symposium. The Friday before the lectures on Saturday and Sunday, the early arrivals took an all-day field trip to the Chupadera Copper Mine for malachite, fluorite and barite. On Thursday, Ray DeMark, owner of the Blanchard Mine claims in Bingham, met a small group to collect Linarite at the Sunshine #3 in the Oscura Mountains. Featured speaker at the symposium this year was Dr. Peter McGaw giving a History of the Mines and Minerals of Santa Eulalia Chihuahua, Mexico. Other presentations included; "Electric Opal, Mexico's Daylight-luminescent Hyalite Opal", "Collecting Geode Minerals in the Midwest", "Mineral Collecting in Indonesia", "New Discoveries at Copper Hill, Taos Co. NM", "Minerals of the Torpedo-Bennett Fault Zone, Organ Mtns, NM", "Capillitas Mine Argentina Rhodochrosite", "Arizona Pseudomorphs", Arizona's Love Affair with Minerals", "Micromineraleering in the 79 Mine", "Color Stability in Minerals", and "Mineralogy Through the Ages". After two days of lectures and a half-day to spend in the new Mineral Museum of the NM Bureau of Geology and Mineral Resources on the campus of the NM Institute of Mining & Technology, we left Monday morning for the long drive home to arrive exhausted but looking forward to next year.

A Look into the Past By Julia Toombs

I took on the position of Historian, because I am an organized person and some of the past history items needed that. With the purchase of some supplies, the task took about a week.

For those of you interested in history, you might find this article interesting. I am not a "writer", but I will do my best each month to give you an idea of what our predecessors did for the Club. This article covers 1957 – 1967.

Last month, I passed on to Kinney the organizational information for him to print in the Newsletter. As I have been reading the minutes from the beginning, only about one field trip a year was held, though couples went on personal excursions as in conjunction with a vacation. There were always samples and a door prize at the meetings.

In January 1957, they applied for membership in the Texas Federation of Mineral Societies. In March, they were approved and all members received cards at the April meeting. In May, our own Charles Creekmur suggested a field trip to Magna Cove, 20 - 30 miles from Hot Springs, Arkansas. Charles' name first appeared as an attendee at this meeting.

In April 1958, the subject of incorporation was brought up and members were interested enough to hire a lawyer and proceed. Due to incorporation requirements, the constitution and by-laws needed some changes. A few were: Name – East Texas Gem & Mineral Society, Inc; Duration of Society – 50 years; Charter Members – those who sign the Constitution and By-Laws and have paid fees by January 15, 1957. The Charter was filed in the office of the Secretary of State on August 4, 1958.

In January 1959, an emblem design was presented and accepted. In August, a suggestion was made to publish a club bulletin to cover activities and mail to members and other clubs. In September, a suggestion was made to publish a newsletter.

In April 1961, a decision was made to keep up the Newsletter. (There is nothing that says when it actually started.) In May, the Club was cleared by the Federal Government to be tax exempt. A permanent type ID badge was suggested. November 6 was the fifth anniversary of the Club. In December, they were informed that they were not tax-free on account of not having a special course of study by accredited teachers. "Taxes are retroactive back to 1958 which takes practically everything in our treasury." (I don't know the tax owed.)

In January 1962, by a vote of 17-7, incorporation was upheld. Small rock auctions would be held monthly to go toward the tax owed. The years 1963 – 1965 have no real minutes, only lists of attendees.

In December 1965, Charles Creekmur was elected President and his wife Carolyn, Secretary. Minutes began again. In April, our Club participated in the Azalea Trail on the first and second Sundays. Displays were set-up. A Rock Swap was held at Tyler State Park in October.

In January 1967, Charles was elected President again. The question of Club owned facilities was brought up. Newsletter publication would resume. In July, the dues of the Texas Federation were reduced to 50 cents. The idea of having a Club show on a small basis was again brought up and the responsibility was given to Charles.

When Charles returned to the area in 1965, after being gone for several years, he breathed new life into a Club that was close to disbanding. The following entry is a description of the year:

"Dec. 1967 – In review the year 1967 was highlighted by the outstanding work done by our President in an attempt to pep up the Club, get more member participation, more field trips, etc. But as usual the member response was just as pathetic as ever, with a mere few doing all the work, planning, programming, etc. The President even wound up issuing the bulletin himself and this has long memories(?) when Bill DiMarco and Adele were officers and they had to edit and publish the bulletin also. Well with election of new officers, maybe things will change, but I doubt it. A cheer and a vote of thanks to "Wilkie" for a job well done."

I believe the above paragraph was written by Adele DiMarco. I say this by comparing handwriting from year to year. In December 1965, officers were elected and stated for 1966, though the Secretary never signed her name. In December 1966, there was no mention of officers being elected. In 1967, there was no mention of officers ever, including the Secretary's entries. On June 1, 1968, Adele made an entry that she and Bill were heading to parts west. It is the same handwriting for 1967 minutes, such as they are.


