## A Look into the Past

There are a few people within the East Texas Gem & Mineral Society that know me well enough to know that I have a sense of humor. I try to always have some degree of humor in my articles. Colleen Hayes wrote this in January 2004. She gave me permission to rerun it. I hope she didn't experience *all* of them in the same trip.

Field Trip Notes - How to Have a Successful Day

- 1) Try not to get hopelessly lost.
- 2) Need to avoid snakes, scorpions, wasps, chiggers, ticks, and sunburn.
- 3) Only have car trouble near cell phone towers.
- 4) Remember water, food, chips, Twinkies, and chocolate. (You will be able to work off extra calories, so take advantage.)
- 5) Take extra clothes for when you fall in the creek, slide in the mud, or crawl in the dirt.
- 6) Take extra Tylenol along for those over 40, for the end of the day.
- 7) Most of all have fun and good luck. Remember to share.

At the February 2004 meeting the program was a slide presentation on the history of Illinois Fluorite. Two questions were answered by Charles Creekmur and Bill Holbert. I found both questions and answers *very* interesting.

- 1) Why is the term *Spar* on the end of some Carbonate minerals like Fluorspar?

  Spar is a word of German origin meaning rock. Feldspar literally means field rock. It is a term loosely applied to any transparent or translucent light-colored mineral that is readily cleavable having a vitreous luster: Iceland spar (Calcite), Fluorspar (fluorite), feldspar heavy spar (Barite). It is applied locally by miners to small clay veins found in coal seams.
  - 2) Why does Fluorite come in so many colors?

A variety of *activator* elements as impurities are responsible for the fluorescence in fluorite (especially the rare earth elements), but it is unknown if this essence plays a role in the colors exhibited by the mineral. The term fluorescence comes from the mineral fluorite since the property was first observed in this mineral. Those specimens from Cumberland, England, are usually so highly fluorescent that you can see it in the daylight, although not all fluorite is fluorescent. Color zoning, phantoms, and inclusions of other minerals are not uncommon in fluorite and add to its collectability.

Added by Don Campbell - Fluorite is a Halide, not a carbonate. The different colors are usually stray trace amounts of different ions in the mineral crystal structure. One book says that the color in some fluorite is due to the presence of hydrocarbons. None of his books said specifically which ion caused which colors in fluorite.

Mindat.org says it was named in 1797 by Carlo Antonio Galeani Napione from the Latin word *fluere*, meaning *to flow* for its use as a flux. The element fluorine also derives its name from fluorite, a major source of the element.

This month's biography is by Jim Showen. Jim lives in Tyler.

I was born in Monahans in 1937. My father was an engineer for Gulf Oil and was called to active duty in the Pacific before World War II. After Dad came home, we returned to West Texas. When I was in high school, my first job away from home was working on a gravity meter crew around Lubbock. Later I got to rough neck on a rig near Crane that made a good well at 11,000 feet. My next summer job was for a core lab in Midland while I was a geology student at Oklahoma University (OU). I have a nice core collection from the Permian basin buried in the front yard of my parent's former house in Midland.

While I was at OU, I took a lot of field trips over the state. On one, we were down in a lead and zinc mine in northeastern Oklahoma in the Oklahoma-Kansas-Missouri



lead district. I also found zircon crystals from pegmatites near Lawton, Oklahoma. I went to the OU field camp in Colorado and collected specimens from pegmatites there. After graduation from OU, I did graduate work at the University of Texas at Austin for one semester. I was then drafted into the Army and spent two years in the Corps of Engineers at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. I hunted minerals in North Carolina and Virginia.

When I was discharged from active duty, I worked as a mudlogger on the Texas coast and off-shore Louisiana. Then, I got my Law Degree from the University of Houston. I met my wife while in school there. After graduation, I went to work for the Texas Water Pollution Control Board and lived in Austin for 13 years. We had three children. We moved to Tyler in late 1977 where I practiced law and worked for the City of Tyler for 20 years.

I have traveled to every state except Hawaii and Alaska and extensively in Mexico, Canada, and Turkey. I have visited museums in London, New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Dallas, Houston, and Austin. I hunt for minerals, fossils, and agates.

This is the last biography that I have to share. I hope that my new year will be made happy by the receipt of yours. Let's be friends, not just acquaintances.

### **SHOP TIME**

After all that cold weather, we had the week before Thanksgiving, I decided to do some cabbing in my workshop. I've wanted to work on some cabs that I've had lying next to my cabbing machine for several months that are new to me or show some interesting features.

Pictured to the right are two Island Agates from Indonesia in the top row. These agates are new to me and came from a friend about a year ago. Also, in the picture is a plume agate at the left bottom, that I collected on the Stillwell Ranch in West Texas last year. The cab at the right bottom of the picture is a nice Chrysocolla I bought several years ago.

The second picture shows two unknown Mexican agates in the top row, an unknown agate with a beautiful red interior surrounded by clear quartz, and a plume agate that I found on the Stillwell Ranch and the only plume agate that I've found in West Texas that has some yellow plumes in it. Unfortunately, most of the yellow plumes were on the surface and were lost during the cabbing process. As seen in the photos to the right, both of these are also shown in transmitted light. The first Mexican agate also shows chromatography at the top of the cab, which is why I showed it with transmitted light, for greater visibility. The second Mexican agate shows some nice colors, as well as a parallax effect in the picture taken with transmitted light.

Before wrapping it, I had to try to polish the back of the cab, but did not do as good a job on it as the dealer did on the front. This is the problem that I had when I had tried to polish a cab of this material about a year ago. At least the back looks better now than when it was unpolished. Pictured are the front and the side of the pendant, which shows the 14k gold-filled and twisted Sterling Silver wires I used to wrap the cab. I will give the pendant to him when he and his wife visit us in about two weeks.

Kinney's Bench Tips By Kinney Polve

A common dreaded problem when making a cabochon is that it comes loose from the dop stick. There are many things that could be the culprit, but the one that is often overlooked is the dop wax. After heating it time after time, even though you may add a little extra when it gets low, the wax will begin to break down. This will cause it to lose its ability to make a good bond to the cabbing material. Don't dump it out. Oldtimers would add some shellac flakes to the mix, but there's an easier way. Just adding a little bee's wax to the mix will rejuvenate the mixture and solve the problem.
