John Carr (1737-1818) was the third son of Robert Carr and Mary Williams. John married Louvisa Isbell (1743-1806), daughter of Zachariah Isbell and Elizabeth Taylor. John Carr served in the Revolution in So. Carolina, enlisting in 1777, 8th Company of Rangers, Capt. Thomas Woodward's Company. He also served in the Third Regiment of So. Carolina under Colonel William Thompson. He came to Washington County area and bought the 132 acre land grant (NC) from William McBee in 1789. He bought another 100 acres on Knob Creek in 1796.

Their first home was the McBee home which was built over a spring to give the family access to water during Indian attacks. The second home was built sometime prior to 1852. It was later remodeled and is not occupied by a descendant. John and Louvisa were buried on their own land under a tall pine tree which the home got it's name, "Lone Pine."

The property passed to their son, William Carr, later was sold to a Krouse and in 1853 to James Crumley.

State of Tennessee } In the name of God Amen.
Washington County }

I John Carr Sen. of the County and State aforesaid, being in perfect health and of Sound and disposing mind & memory, thanks be given to Almighty God. Calling to mind the uncertainty of this mortal life, Do make and ordain this piece of paper to be my 1st will and Testament. That is first of all I give and recommend my Soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a Christian like manner at the discretion of my Executors. And as touching Such of my worldly Estate, I give and devise and dispose of the Same in the following manner and form. First: that whereas I have heretofore given to my Children, that is my Sons John, James, **Richard** and William and my Daughters Hannah, Louisa, Sarah, Mary, Elizabeth and Isbell, what out of my estate I then thought I could Spare, therefore I now give and bequeath to each of them respectively and Severally, all that I have heretofore given them, to be theirs Severally forever. Secondly, that whatsoever may remain on hand of my Estate at the time of my death, let it be negroes, Stock of any Kind, farming utensils, household furniture, monies or obligators to collect on or anything whatsoever, let it be sold and the product arising therefrom, to be equally divided with any money that may be on hand or thereafter collected if any, Between each and every One of my Children, that is Boys and girls Share and Share alike, After settling all my Just debts and funeral Expenses That Should any of my Sd. Children die before me, the lawful issue of Such deceased Child to have the Share that would have fallen to the Sd Deceased, if they had been living or Should die after me before the distribution can take place, the Sd lawful issue to inherit also as th^o. the decease had taken place before me, lastly I do nominate, constitute, make and ordain my two sons Richard and William Carr, to be Executors of this my last will and Testament. Acknowledging this and none other Revoking all other will or wills heretofore by me made. In witness whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and affixed my Seal this twenty fourth day of July One thousand Eight hundred and eleven.

I then thought I should spend, therefore I now give and bequeath to each of
them respectively and severally, all that I have heretofore given them, to be
thine, severally, for ever. Secondly, that whatsoever my Executors or I have
of my estate at the time of my death, be it be Major part of any kind
forming my personal household furniture, Money or Obligations to collect on or
any thing whatsoever, let it be sold and the proceeds arising therefrom, to
be equally divided with any Money that may be on hand at the time of my death
of any part between each and every one of my children, that is Boys and girls
I have and shall have, after settling all my just debts and funeral expences
That should any of my children die before me, the largest share of such share
shall to him or her that should have fallen to the said deceased, if they had been
living or should as after me before the distribution can take place, but I charge
you to submit also as to the same has taken place before me, lastly, I do
devise and bequeath, make and ordain, my two Sons Richard and William, to be
Executors of this my last will and Testament. Acknowledging the said will to be
written all this will or will hereof by me made. In witness whereof I have
written at my hand and affixed my seal the twenty fourth day of July
one thousand eight hundred and eleven
