John's son and heir, Thomas Livesey married Alice Marsden of Tockholes 7 May 1725. The following year the old house of the Livesey was replaced by a building of stone erected upon the foundations of what is thought to have been the base of a timber structure. The house is situated in a high position and overlooks the River Darwen. Inside are the letters "T. A. L." the date 1726. On a wall of the barn two stones bear the initials "T. L." for *Thomas* and "A. L." for *Alice Livesey* on one and "J. L." for *John Livesey* on the other. The date 1732.

In 1728 John Ainsworth married Dorothy, daughter of John Livesey, 29 October 1728 at Brindle Church. The two oldest families of Feniscowles in Pleasington were thus united. John Livesey died aged about 53 in 1730. Elizabeth, his widow, died aged 80 in 1756. According to the will of John Livesey proved in 1730, he owned two houses with a garden and the Cooper croft in Feniscowles, which he said were to belong to Thomas, his eldest son. To John and Peter, his sons, he left property in Great Harwood, known by the name of Royal Hey and Dewerden Tenement. Oliver, his youngest son, was left a house somewhere in Pleasington.

Thomas and Alice Livesey of Feniscowles had a son John baptized 30 December 1726, and a son Thomas baptized 3 February 1730-1. 5-664


