



From the Parish Records on Bermuda John Rivers in 1686 married ann venman who was elive in 1696. All as shown above we was probably the Lieutenant John Rivers who with Lieutenant Miles Rivers were amound the Earliest Services on Bermuda.

Unuasual names which appeared in the Pointly on Bermuda appear also on James Island. The name mallory in Capt. Roberts Family must have spring from his ount Elizabeth wife of his unale william. Nehemiah with his wife and five children, also eighard rivers with his wife and wife and two children were given as passengers aboard the sloop elimbeth & Roberts according to the records of Sept. 3, 1708 to Bouth caroling. The master was capt green. Way Mallory, this is an outhentic record and he probably a brother of Elizabeth.

Every community has key families that have a profound influence in its development and history. The South Carolina Sea Islands (James, Johns, Wadmalaw, Kiawah, Seabrook and Edisto Islands) share many of the same first families as generations spread from Charles Towne to Beaufort. One such family for James Island is the Rivers family, which has extended out to twelve generations of South Carolinians. Through the marriages of their sons and daughters, the Rivers family also traces through most of the other historic families for James Island including Ellis, Croskeys, Royall, McLeod, Hinson, Seabrook, Peronneau, Hext, Freer, Dill, Greatbach, Stanyarne and Bee just to name a few. Prior to 1636, **John Rivers** (P-522) moved to Bermuda from England. He settled in the Parish of South Hampton on two islands named Rivers Islands*. Later these islands connected with the mainland to form a peninsula now part of a US Naval Base. John's son William was the first Rivers to settle on James Island with a grant in 1681. His first home was at the mouth of Wappoo Creek in the footprint of today's Country Club of Charleston clubhouse. He also owned 300 acres near Mill Point (Fort Johnson), 145 acres on the James Island side of Charles Towne harbor and 700 acres on Folly Island. Having no surviving sons, all this property was left to his grandsons; Rivers and Joseph Stanyarne in his will dated October 3, 1717. William was followed to James Island by his brother **Robert Rivers** (P-514) who arrived with his second wife and two sons, Robert, born to his first wife, and George (P-510), born to his second. The entire line of the Rivers family on James Island and in the Charleston area descends from these two half-brothers later referred to as Captain Robert Rivers, master mariner, and George Rivers, Sr.
