1850 Census Wiley Stallings, wife Susan, son Timothy

Harrells Store N C 31st Decr
Mr. Francis Brice Thomas county Georgia Thomasville Ga.
Duplin county No Carolina December 28th 1841

Dear Brother. I write you a few lines to inform you that I have sold my land this day for seven hundred dollars and drawed writings The next thing I have to do; is settle my business and start to the promised land I am going to do my best to reach your settlement by the first of April if possible I am a good deal in debt but I hope if I can get what is due me to be able to move in credit My design is to hire out my negroes two women and one man and teach school myself I wish you to rent me a house and small piece of land in your neighborhood and convenient to your school house as possible and speak for provisions for my white family from som of the persons that will send to school. If you do not wish a full school to commence til fall; Susan can and will keep a school of small children if you are willing and I will make corn and deal out pills until the fall season comes on I wish you to show this letter to your neighbors and if any of them will hire my negroes in the settlement commencing their work about the first of April until Christmas at what ever is customary the two women are free from children and are first rate hands in the fields the man is an exception for smartness and strength I wish them to have good homes as they are good negroes; if anything should turn up that would to prevent my getting away this spring I will know it in a few weeks and will write to you immediately You look in the office two or three weeks after you get this letter if there is no letter there from me you may take it for granted that I am coming this spring Susan and the children are up in high spirits for Thomas county I must inform you something about what a caper your mother cut up early the next morning after you left with your negroes She rise from her bed took her text on the law and the prophets and the like never was heard on the head of rockfish before but all in vain You will receive a letter from her in my hand writing; I believe every person in this country is glad that you got your negroes I'll tell you all

about it when I see you I have nothing more at present
to write I was exceeding glad to receive my son William
home safe and sound We have had a very sickle fall here
in this settlement I was obliged to turn out and practice
medicin from the first of August til some little time
back I visited about one hundred sick persons and Three
of that number died I hope to never to see such a thing
again
