The Story of the League® Patch

On a warm March day during MLB Spring Training in Scottsdale, Ariz., more than 2,250 miles away from Williamsport, Pa., former Longview (Wash.) Little Leaguer® andyour parents took you out of it to take a current Colorado Rockies manager Bud Black came across a Little League® Patch and could barely contain his excitement.

"I love that! It throws me back to my time in Longview and great memories," said Mr. Black. "It's iconic, it really is. Whoever came Conforto. "It just feels like the beginning of up with that did a great job and that lives on the path [to the majors]. That's kind of the forever."

The white, eight-sided keystone shape complete with a diamond field and banners depicting text of each Little League division now represents the world's largest youth sports organization. Carl Stotz, who founded The Little League patch is now a mandatory Little League in Williamsport, came up with this patch after first creating it as a logo in the late 1940s. Mr. Stotz pitched the idea to Little Leaguer is playing for a legitimate Little his family and decided on the keystone shape. Although it has undergone some minor updates in its lifetime, the original intent for the patch has lived on.

League Vice President and Executive Director of the World of Little League® Museum. "Pennsylvania is the Keystone State, but you have to understand what a keystone is. It's the part above a door that helps to keep the house together. And to

me, Little League is one of those things that helps keep a community together."

While the Keystone State is well represented on the patch, some Little Leaguers who have gone on to the big leagues find the patch represents much more.

"It represents sportsmanship, trying your best," said 2017 National League Manager Little of the Year, Arizona Diamondbacks manager Torey Lovullo. "It represents putting on your uniform at six o'clock in the morning on a Saturday and waiting until your parents got up so they could run you to the ballpark, so you could play in a game. And then never coming out of that uniform until shower on Saturday night."

These best practices can assist anyone interested in learning on their own, or as a group with the support of local leadership. The role coaches play in whether Little Leaguers enjoy their experiences is vital, and coaches training is essential for a successful program.

Coaching Coordinator Organizing Curriculum

The typical local league Board of Directors has an individual (Coaching Coordinator) or committee of volunteers (Division Vice Presidents) that is responsible for educating approved coaches. Commonly, a single inservice type of meeting is scheduled prior to oversight and support to coaches, the start of a league's preseason to provide specific materials to coaches, review new playing rules and regulations, outline effective practice plans, answer general questions, and establish the line of communication from the teams to the Board. In a well-run league, the Coaching Coordinator and/or Division Vice Presidents The Coaching Coordinator and/or plan a training curriculum that is executed A local league, and specifically the members during the weeks that include player tryouts to collect feedback from the players and and draft, and preseason practices; and features weekly meetings.

Communication

It is imperative that coaches and managers do not feel isolated from the league. The best practice for any new coach or manager

is to speak with someone with experience. Regular communication, which can come in the form of simple weekly check-ins via inperson meeting, email, text, social media messaging, video call, etc., are of great value to newer coaches and managers.

Mentor Program

If a league does have coaches with multiple years of experience, establish a mentoring program to allow the less-seasoned volunteers to be introduced to, and become familiar with, coaching nuances such as how and a successful rapport with their players. If not, reach out to the local high school, college, or university baseball and softball program, and inquire if a member

of one of those programs would be willing to visit the league to conduct a clinic or seminar.

Regular Season Review

Local leagues have an individual(s) that is/are responsible for the operation of each division during the regular season. This person/staff serves as the training liaison and is in place to provide answer questions, and assess how well the manager and coaches of the teams in that division are fulfilling the goals of the league and the Little League mission.

Manager and Coach Survey

Division Vice Presidents are encouraged their families. Provide the parents/legal quardians with access to a survey (printed or electronic) where the manager and coaches are reviewed. These opinions and their perception of the experiences during the regular season often provide substantial direction for the league when it comes time to consider



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volunteers for selection as tournament coaches, or potential Board members. As important, these responses often help to identify what areas of education need to be enhanced or added for the coming season.

Positive Coaching Alliance

In partnership with Little League International, Positive Coaching Alliance (positivecoach.org) has many resources geared toward youth sports coaches and managers. Free and available online and on Little League University, many of the materials, lessons, and educational messages are adaptable, regardless of what sport is featured. A few minutes searching the PCA website or reviewing the PCA content on Little League University is time well spent.
