

- Cultural norms affect the ways people think, dress, talk, spend their leisure time, and other fundamental aspects of human behavior.


Autism as a Culture

- Autism is not truly a culture, it is a developmental disability caused by a neurological dysfunction.
- However, this dysfunction affects the ways that individuals with autism think, talk, eat, spend leisure time, and understand their world.

Wanted: Cross-Cultural Interpreter

 The role of a special needs ministry for a person with autism is like that of a cross-cultural interpreter: someone who understands both cultures and is able to translate the customs of the non-autistic environment to the person with autism.

 In effect, what we attempt to do for people with autism is what we ourselves might wish for when we travel in a foreign country.



Cross-Cultural Interpreter

 So to help develop spiritual growth in a person with autism, it is important to understand their culture and the strengths and deficits that are associated with it so that you can support them in learning about your culture, the Christian culture.

➤ One of the most fundamental needs of every human being is to belong.




A place of Caring

➤ Difficulty with abstract language concepts.




 Organizing and Sequencing

➤ Difficulty integrating multiple pieces of information.




Generalizing
