During the past two years neighbors, volunteers, and friends have helped beautify the green space and, as a community, we have transformed the garden into a neighborhood meeting place.

This year the garden is home to 8 raised flower and vegetable beds and 2 composters. A lot of the hard work was completed over the last 2 years and this year we hope and encourage neighbors to get involved in the growing process. There are 4 vegetable beds that are open for Martin Drive Neighborhood residents to adopt for the summer. A History of Washington Park, Part Three of a Three Part Series — Present Day Washington Park

Since it opened to the public in the 1800s, live music has been a constant in Washington Park. After the Milwaukee County Zoo relocated from Washington Park to its current location in 1958, the weekly live music series have continued throughout the 1970s, 80s and 90s. Currently, the Washington Park Concert Series• continues the tradition of local, live music during the summer under the cover of the Blatz Bandshell.

Some of the Washington Park Zoo buildings were reused and relaunched as new, neighborhood meeting places. The Washington Park Senior Center is located in a building that previously housed the zoo's buffalo and was known as the buffalo pen.• The senior center, on the south side of the park (at 4420 West Vliet Street), has provided neighbors of age 50 and over with a place to meet, eat and pursue hobbies such as woodworking, gardening and tinkering with computers.

In 2007, the park welcomed the opening of Milwaukee's second Urban Ecology Center (UEC) a satellite center• - in the Community Building, alongside the park's large lagoon (at 1859 North. 40th Street). In four short years, the employees, members and volunteers at the UEC have totally transformed the north end of Washington Park. In addition to creating a well-kept, beautiful green space, vegetable gardens and a welcoming environment, the UEC also rents equipment to neighbors such as snowshoes and canoes. The UEC also offers interesting classes in gardening and more

From its unveiling as West Park in 1895 until today, Washington Park remains an enormous, tranquil space with diverse expanses to enjoy. As the weather warms up this spring, make sure you explore Washington Park and find your favorite part of the park.



WHAT IS SUSPICIOUS?

Many times, we have that voice in our head, that some event or activity is out of the ordinary. The voice that keeps us and 'everyone' safe. Don't worry about bothering the police. Don't worry about being embarrassed if your suspicious activity proves unfounded. The following are a list of specific events that the police want to hear from you:

Going Door to Door In a Residential Area

Especially suspicious if after a few houses are visited, and one or more of the persons goes to a back or side yard. This is even more suspicious if another person remains out front. This could mean that the person is casing for a house to burglarize, or there is a burglary in progress, trespassing, or soliciting. Solicitors must register with police before conducting door-to-door sales.

Waiting In Front of a House or Business.

This is particularly suspicious if owners are away, or the establishment is closed. This could mean that a burglary in progress.

Forcing Entrance To or Tampering with a Residence or Vehicle This is suspicious and sould many that burglary that damage t

This is suspicious and could mean that burglary, theft, damage to property, or trespassing is in progress.

Non-Resident Going Into the Back or Side Yard of a House

This is suspicious under most circumstances. It could mean that burglary or trespassing is in progress.

Carrying Property

This is suspicious depending upon the circumstances -- if it occurs at an unusual hour or in an unusual location or if the property is packaged as if just purchased. It could mean that the person is leaving the scene of a burglary, robbery, or theft.

Heavy Human Traffic To and From a Certain Residence

This is suspicious if it occurs on daily or regular basis, especially during the late or unusual hours. It could mean vice, drug, or fencing operations.

Parked, Occupied Vehicles

These vehicles may be considered suspicious when seen at unusual times and places. Be alert for occupied vehicles that may be the look out for burglaries and robberies in progress.

Vehicles Being Loaded with Valuables

Suspicious if parked in front of a closed business or unattended residence. Even if the vehicle is a legitimate looking commercial unit, bearing signs identifying it as a repair vehicle or moving van. This might be a burglary or theft in progress.

Abandoned Vehicles

Report vehicles that have been parked in the same spot for long periods of time. They may be stolen.

Open or Broken Doors or Windows

At a closed business or a residence whose owners may be away. It might mean a burglary in progress or a completed burglary. You don't have to be the owner to call.

If it's suspicious, call the police. It could save a life, prevent an injury, or stop a criminal act and help affect an arrest.

Don't worry about bothering the police. That's why they exist.

On Saturday, June 4th, MDNA will be taking advantage of huge discounts on annual and perennial plants. All nine Milwaukee Healthy Neighborhoods will participate in the event. The buying power of the Healthy Neighborhoods Group makes it possible to offers astounding savings and is sure to put flower power on the Martin Drive map.

Just like last year's Blooming Blocks, we are encouraging neighbors to plant "front and center" (in the tree lawns – the area between the curb and sidewalk) where everyone can enjoy the plants.

Come to the annual meeting on May 9^{th} and sign up to purchase the plants. Plants can be picked up on June 4^{th} between 10:00 a.m. and noon at 3700 W. Vliet Street, a new pop-up park designed to add curb appeal to Vliet Street.

The plants are discounted more than 50% off what you would pay in a store. You can purchase quart containers of perennials for \$1 and large gallon size perennial plants for \$2. There will also be an assortment of annual flowers available for \$4 per flat or \$2 per half flat.

You can host a planting party on your block, or host a healthy competition

between blocks to see who can achieve the most curb appeal. We can also provide tools if needed. Advice and instructions are free. Later on June 4th, there will be grilled food and beverage for those who want to share stories of the curb appeal and new friendships
