

I have been asked how people can help both with the church's capital campaign and the regular operating budget...more about that in a moment. First, though, I have to say that we humans have a curious relationship with money. Next to water, air, the sun, and human relationships, there is likely nothing more indispensable to our existence, at least when it comes to modern Western society, than money. We use it to pay rent and mortgages, to buy food and clothing, to obtain transportation, to compensate people for medical care and a wide range of services, to make repairs to buildings, to enjoy a movie – almost everything we do has a cost that requires money. Yet, we are a sensitive lot when it comes to money.

We don't like talking about it, especially if It is about our own practices. Privacy and freedom are among the reasons for this reluctance nor do we like being unfairly compared to the proverbial Jones's in our lives. Our life situations are so varied when it comes to our financial situations—how can the church helpfully address such variety? On top of that, too many of us have found ourselves in crisis because of money. And, it doesn't help that most of us have experiences of being taken advantage of on account of money, including people whose primary interest in us was financial. For Christians, though, it has been my experience that being reminded of what our faith teaches us about money often creates discomfort. Paul reminds us that, "the love of money is the root of all evil" (1 Timothy 6:10, KJV) and we have experienced and witnessed this reality. We could tell stories where our love—or someone else's of money caused a problem in our life. My beginning point for turning this reality around is in affirming, "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world, and everyone who lives in it." (Psalm 24:1, NIV) Everything we have, then, is not really ours. Instead, as we learn in the creation story in Genesis, God has entrusted to us everything in our lives. This includes our money. Scripture teaches us that God should be a priority with what already belongs to God, yet this often proves difficult to do in practice. We tell ourselves, "I'm on a fixed income" or "I haven't had a raise in years" or "my expenses keep going up and up." I have been impressed with the "out of the box" thinking that I have heard from people working on our combined capital and stewardship campaign. I have listed below some of the ideas people are considering along with a couple that have worked for me as ways to be better stewards of their money so they can direct more funds to the operations of the church and to the capital campaign (it is worth noting here that the bulk of church maintenance and capital costs are by previous investments, memorial gifts and capital campaigns; church operations and capital expenditures are largely two different sources of funding). My challenge to you....which of these or another idea it generates would you use to grow in your own stewardship of what God has entrusted to you? How might doing several of these make it possible to not only contribute to our church's campaigns but also enable you to address other priorities in your life?

- to forego a daily coffee and donut out (or make coffee at home) one person estimated over \$2600 savings in one year!
- & use a lesser cable package—I admit I do miss ESPN and cable news, though I have found many great resources online, on broadcast television and public news media
- & redirect donations for political candidates
- eat out fewer times each week, choose a less expensive option for lunch or pack your own lunch
- instead of buying new clothes online, check out places like the Cubby, Catholic Charities and Affordable Finds; increasingly, people shop online for clothes. Instead of returning items that do not fit, they have been taking them to local thrift stores instead.
- Review memberships, print subscriptions and online subscriptions...cancel those you don't use
- when buying a house or car, the little things add up...I thought about a larger car when I had to replace my old car last summer. My family reminded me how the compact car we ultimately bought was both less expensive to buy and cheaper to operate—my gas mileage is around 25-30% better than my previous car (around 40 mpg on the highway), an annual savings of a few hundred dollars in fuel alone

What seemingly small adjustment in your life could end up making a significant difference for you and your church through growing in your stewardship?

Notes: The "Growing in Faith" campaign leadership emphasizes that gifts for the capital campaign portion should be so-called second mile giving. That is, they should be above and beyond gifts to the church's regular operating budget and not shifting money from church operations to the campaign. As our financials presently stand, we are not on track to be able to pay all of our mission shares this year. As a result we are invited to prayerfully consider growth in both parts of the campaign. Also keep in mind a little understood reality that people often give to capital projects and campaigns from different assets and resources than they do for regular church operations. For many people, they are different kinds of gifts. This is in fact reflected in the fact that the largest share of Gray Memorial's capital expenditures are funded from past memorial gifts, bequests and one-time gifts to the permanent fund. Plan to attend the "Growing in Faith" campaign presentation following worship on November 3. This will be an opportunity to hear the rationale for having a capital campaign and to answer your questions.

Growing in Faith

The beginning stages of the Growing in Faith campaign have begun. This is the campaign for both the 2020 operating budget and the 2020-2022 capital campaign. You have probably seen the campaign logo popping up in various places: the banner in the sanctuary, on letters you have received in the mail, and on buttons passed out in church. The theme "Growing in Faith" is drawn from Ephesians 4:15-16.

In the coming weeks, you will have the opportunity to learn more about the campaign and start to participate in some of the spiritual aspects of it. On Sunday, November 3, an informational presentation focusing on the capital campaign will be held after the service downstairs in the fellowship hall. All are encouraged to attend (and since it will be the first Sunday of the month, there will be food and with the time change everyone will be well rested!). You will also be receiving more mailings with important information relating to the overall Growing in Faith campaign, a brochure, will have the opportunity to hear testimonies from laity speakers, and will be guided through seeing what the church means to you.

Throughout this time, a prayer team member will be praying for you. Before commitment Sunday, on November 24, we ask that you have prayerfully considered what God is asking you to do.

As the campaign leadership manual says, "Faith opens the way to generosity in the heart and life of the believer. Once we understand that everything we are, everything we have, and everything we have the potential to be are gifts given us by an abundant God, then our faith leads us to use what God has given in ways that honor the Giver. Any stewardship effort which does not begin with that principle can never reach its full potential. So you will find, in this campaign process, deliberate efforts to help persons discover the joy in giving—the joy in giving that flows from hearts which are 'Growing in Faith.'"

Please sign your correspondence, and also know that anonymous correspondence will not be considered.

Roy called the meeting to order at 6:40 pm and said a brief prayer. Roy encouraged everyone to see an uplifting movie of forgiveness and hope he had seen. It was called "Overcomer". He asked for members to relate any thoughts of celebration or concern. Melonie Carson said she joined our church because it reminded her of the one she grew up in and she wanted that experience for her daughter, Ericka. Next Roy called for the Finance report.

<u>FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP</u>: Tamara Wilcox reported that the August Tithes and Offerings were normal. She reported that the total August offering was \$13,543.31. She pointed out that the church had received \$1,050.00 toward paying back the Turner Funds. We have received year to date, \$125,213.95 as of August 31st.

Bobbi reported the following for the operating budget:

Beginning Balance \$746.98 2019 Operating Income 11,520.00 Interest 4.53

Less EFT fee (27.37) VANCO fees (EFT deposits)

Less Expenses (13,206.10) Ending Balance (961.96)

Bobbi reported that the \$25,000.00 invested with Thompson/Hamel LLC for the Memorial Garden on June 29, 2017 at an investment cost of \$1,073.78, as of August 30, 2019 had an on-line value of \$26,837.95.

The Capital Account Seed Money had a beginning Balance of \$44,642.20; there were deposits amounting to \$359.51; there was a payment to the Foundation of \$4,400.00 for the services of Bradley Call to benefit the "Growing the Faith" Capital Campaign. The ending Balance on August 31st was \$40,601.71.

Debbie Barnes reported that we are behind \$14,713.95 in Mission Shares as of 8/31/19. (If we had these paid our total would have been \$137,559.08) The total spent YTD is \$122,845.10.

The weekly average needed for 2019: \$4,246.45

Dead River monthly cost as of June, 2019: C= \$1,085; P = \$276 Mission Shares = 2,452.33/mo. (as of August, six months behind)

The August Budget Target was \$147,210.17; Tithes and Offerings were \$111,708.37; Total Expenses were \$137,559.08; Unpaid Expenses were \$14,713.98. Average attendance for August was 73. Average YTD was 75 as of August 31st.

Melonie Carson reported we collected approximately \$244 on Sunday, September 15th for the leftover food items to help the City offset the cost of the meal put on for the Caribou Kids' Marathon event on Saturday, September 14th and the city will pay us \$500. Due to rain there was a low turn-out and a lot of food was left over. We will keep the supplies. Melonie and Debbie will be getting together to work on the Budget for the new year in early October.

Items discussed at August 30th meeting:

Old Business:

- A new hand held microphone has been installed. The sound system needed some tweaking.
- The feedback on the outdoor service was good good weather and good attendance.
- The Mission Project is going well. Items for the school children are coming in.
- Sept. 8 Dan Schall in concert here. We haven't heard anything from him yet so we'll "wait and see".
- October 20 Laity Sunday representatives from our various mission areas will be asked to speak (lay speakers, prayer shawl ministry, home communion, congregational care team, UMW, UMM, handbells). Rev. Tim suggested that they could each speak on how they have experienced God through the ministry area they are involved in.

- Coffee Fellowship change goes into effect on Sept. 8th. It was suggested that where Dan and Linda Schall are going to be our guests on that day, we should offer refreshments to go with coffee. SPRC: Has not met.

<u>Trustees</u>: Minutes from September 17, 2019 meeting (provided after the Church Council Meeting):

Present: Wendy Bossie, Richard Clark, Judson Drake, Judi Greenier, Louis Greenier, Del Ramey, Tamara Wilcox, Rev. Tim Wilcox. Absent: Samuela Manages Albert

Meeting opened with prayer by Rev. Tim.

Secretary's report: For July 16, 2019. (Report for June 18, 2019 still not read and approved.) Read silently. Motion made by Del, Louis seconded, to accept the secretary's report. Passed.

Treasurer's report: Judi wanted it noted that the trustees' printed contribution to the Annual conference report was nine pages. Judson did a good job. She read a letter from Fidelity Charitable accompanying Debbie Nichols' gift of \$50,000 to the church. Debbie wanted Judson

Drake and Colleen Harmon to share some of that money for all the time they have given to the church. There will be a note attached that Judson and Colleen will not take any of the money. Judi explained the last page of the treasurer's report in detail.

Total spent for roofs – church, parsonage and garage - \$157,420. The extra money paid beyond the \$127,000 Turner Trust Fund came from Debbie Nichols' gift.

Total spent for sprinkler system - \$25,099.03. Debbie's gift will pay for extra spent for sprinkler system.

Motion by Judson, seconded by Louis, to accept the treasurer's report. Passed.

OLD BUSINESS

<u>Fire exits</u>. Right now there is only one good exit out of the sanctuary, the doors in the narthex. The back door from the choir loft is blocked by snow in winter. Judson proposes two other exits. One by Rev. Tim's office and one on the north wall. Plus a rope ladder from the balcony. Cost \$6500. The lack of exits is a dangerous situation should there be a fire in the narthex. Louis questioned why this unsafe situation was never noticed by authorities. Judson said that the fire marshal generally doesn't hassle churches.

<u>Capital Campaign</u>. There was much discussion throughout the evening about the campaign mention at Sunday's Annual Conference and just how we should go about raising of money for needed repairs - if the campaign should falter.

Rev. Tim and Judson had a conference call with Brad Call to inquire about funds already spent should the campaign be delayed or canceled. We would have to pay for his travel expenses that would not be refunded. He had several thoughts to convey:

- 1. He understands the anxiety but a delay could raise anxiety levels.
- 2. There is a mission component/spiritual component to the training and campaign.
- 3. If repairs are critical, this is the time for the trustees to show leadership.

Rev. Tim: We are having to conduct this campaign at this time because we did not know about all the maintenance problems. Some of them are hidden i.e. the dangling electrical wires.

Judson presented a CAPITAL CAMPAIGN 2019 GROWING IN FAITH list of physical problems in the church that should be remedied: sprinkler, electrical, safety (exits), structural (support beams and foundation), exterior, driveway, interior trip hazards, interior remodeling. He feels that the first four items NEED to be done.

Poll of trustee members regarding the 2020 Capital Campaign:

Richard – yes, partially

Louis – yes

Judi – yes

Del – undecided but leaning toward yes

Rev. Tim - yes

Tamara – yes, but . . . with explanation

Wendy – no, however

There will be an informal meeting tomorrow night with Roy Alden who spoke at the conference about his misgivings regarding the campaign. Wendy felt that many of the people there agreed with Roy. It would be advantageous to have a "courageous conversation" with the church members (and perhaps poll them?).

Richard felt that the church should sponsor a forum, to come together not only to speak about the immediate problems but to address national wrongs and the hostility that seems to be prevalent in today's society.

Del noted that in the previous capital campaign the trustees were not in charge of the campaign although this time the idea has been presented to the Finance and Church Council. But who decides what?

We discussed the possible reasons that people might not be in favor of the campaign. Ultimately they do not have to give.

Should the trustees present the present church's physical problems to the people orally? Judson offered to explain.

Judson pointed out that the trustees/church members are saving much money. He has expertise in many areas of construction and is doing the work himself without charging. There have been no incidental repairmen called in, except the elevator service men.

<u>Sprinkler System</u>. This system is almost complete.

<u>Electrical</u>. The electrical work will be done by the first of November. (The electricians chosen are on another job.) Judson told of the various electrical problems and how each one will be fixed. He also noted that if the electrical system in a facility is not up to par, electricians won't "touch it." The church electrical system as it is now is not acceptable and, in fact, is dangerous. The original job was to cost \$23,000. Judson has designed some components and will help with the work. The end total is down to \$9,940. He has budgeted this money but there is no buffer if the job costs more.

As part of the electrical discussion, Judson mentioned that the public address system will be moved from Rev. Tim's office up to the balcony. The future plans are to put in a state- of-the-art system that would allow the church services to go out to the elderly and shut-ins.

NEW BUSINESS

Glass in doors. The Education Committee has asked that safety glass be installed in the two doors in the Sunday school room.

Andover Organ Co. Margaret Cyr has asked that the rest of the repairs to be done on the organ be completed. At present there are no chimes. The piano in the choir room/chapel needs to be tuned. Motion made by Judi, seconded by Wendy, that these tasks be done. Passed.

Annual fire inspection checklist. Judson passed out a copy of the list and explained the few items that still need to be done. These will be done.

Annual parsonage inspection. This has been done. Through the Red Cross Detector program, new fire detectors have been installed. Snow removal and lawn care. We have received bids from Pelletier Property Maintenance, Bernaiche Professional Property Management and Theriault's. One stipulation is that they do not use rock salt in winter maintenance. Alden Wilcox has expressed interest in mowing the lawns. The matter is tabled for two weeks.

2020 Budget Team. Judson asked Tamara to be on the budget team and asked for other volunteers. Richard closed the meeting at 9:00 with prayer.

Other Business Discussed:

Judson Drake has been gravely concerned about the faulty wiring in the Sanctuary and the Council feels we must address this problem. We need to upgrade to become more efficient and for safety reasons. Roy thinks we can come up with the funds to do this.

A request was made to move the TV in the Sunday school due to safety concerns and there was a discussion of getting a flat screen TV for the Sunday school that could be mounted on the wall.

Bobbi and Roy were part of the Lay Visitation Team established with a goal of getting people back to church. Bobbi has an address for Eloise Penny.

The Council discussed whether to go ahead with the Capital Campaign and decided to go ahead. Debbie Barnes added that no one would be forced to join in. Rev. Tim had a phone discussion with the Foundation to see what delaying the start of the Campaign might mean in costs. He learned that we would be responsible for any money that had already been spent, such as plane tickets, supplies, etc. The Council hopes that the campaign can heal and bring us together as a church family as it did in our last one. If we have to decide to wait, we could not start the campaign until after the holidays.

Melonie brought up the topic of offering envelopes for 2020 and adding a line for the capital campaign. The new line will be "Growing in Faith Capital Campaign".

Rev. Tim gave out a handout explaining what a Possibilities Study is. We could have a workshop on this topic, possibly in the spring. It is a two part workshop focusing on cherishing the past, celebrating the present and creating the future. The first part focuses on the life and practices of the congregation with table groups looking at information about the congregation and using data to be able to say with confidence, "This is who we are." The second part focuses on community surrounding the church. Members would explore demographics and talk to community leaders to gain information and a deeper understanding of our community and who lives here. The Council voted to go ahead with this project when Tamara moved and Bill Thomas seconded a motion to do this workshop.

<u>OTHER</u>: Bill reported he had heard about a mysterious backpack left at an altar in one of the Catholic churches. This sparked a conversation about safety in our church. We lock the side door and keep an usher in the Narthex during our services.

Michele and Josselyn need office space so they can work together on projects. The Council suggested the room behind the altar. Tim will look into that.

In closing Roy asked everyone to focus on the positive and not condone negativity.

There being no other business the Council adjourned at 7:55 pm.

The Annual Church Conference of Gray Memorial United Methodist Church came to order at 2:30 pm on Sunday, September 15, 2019 in the Fellowship Hall. The Reverend Jackie Brannen presided over a short service, Gathering Reflection for Holy Justice. Then she declared that this Church Conference was in session.

Mary Lou Brown praised Bobbi Pelletier for the Conference booklet.

The first order of business was to elect a secretary – Claire Hodgkins was nominated and approved. Next, we had to review, discuss and approve the minutes of last year's Conference as well as other Special Conferences held on Feb. 10, 2019 (accepting the Turner bequest), on May 26,2019 (vote to use Turner funds for the roofing of the church and parsonage) and on June 23, 2019 (approve the Leadership Nominations). Bobbi Pelletier moved we accept the minutes of all four conferences, Roy Alden seconded, and it was voted unanimously to accept as written and published.

Judson Drake stated that the Trustees had researched the Permanent Fund to see options and to develop a list of projects by priority. They have a goal of \$200,000.00 with a "stretch goal" of \$300,000.00 to complete these projects by getting going on a Capital Campaign. The sprinkler system has a few more components to be replaced in the Sanctuary. We are in need of a wiring project because of numerous deficiencies including some wiring is overheating if overhead lights are kept on too long in the Sanctuary. Judson reported he had \$60,000.00 to start.

A discussion followed continuing with our Special Church Conference in February: Taken from the Feb. 10, 2019 Minutes - "Asking the congregation to accept the moneys from the Philip B. and Jean M. Turner Trust and put the funds under the management of the Board of Trustees. The Trustees will spend the interest as they see fit, but any spending of the principal would need the approval by a vote in a Special Conference."

The Church congregation met on May 26 to see if the congregation would approve using the Turner Trust for the roofing project as there was a very tight window for getting a contractor to do it this summer. Judson had presented a compelling presentation to the congregation.

Taken from the May 26, 2019 Special Church Conference - "The Trustees of Gray Memorial United Methodist Church move that the congregation use the proceeds of the Philip and Jean Turner Trust to finance the replacement of the church and parsonage roofs with the intention of replenishing the Turner Funds with future fund raising." Roy Alden stated that this was non-binding but hopefully executed. The Trustees reported that they were planning a Capital Campaign to replace the Turner money and had contracted with Bradley Call, who had helped the last Campaign succeed. As the discussion continued it become clear there were reservations about the Campaign's success since we have lost many of those people who had so well supported the last Campaign and there was division among our congregation. Rev. Jackie Brannen said our congregation needed to pray and people needed to try and heal our wounds by reaching out to those who have been missed in Church and sincerely work out differences. We needed to grow the Spirit before we could attempt a more successful outcome. The Trustees said they would go back to Bradley Call to see if we needed to postpone beginning our campaign while working on unity of spirit in the congregation, including additional costs this would incur.

Mary Lou asked for clarification on why we needed to pay back the Turner Trust money. We referred to the May 26th conference demonstrating our wish to do so.

Judson reported on the projects the Trustees had accomplished, especially in the Parsonage for which the Wilcox family was very grateful. He also told the story of the Thanksgiving smoke event in the boiler last year that, but for if not holding the Thanksgiving dinner for members and friends, we might have lost the church in a fire.

Next, Jackie focused on the 2020 Pastor's Compensation package which includes an increase of 2% to base salary (\$50,000 to \$51,000), Social Security (paid directly to Pastor by law) of \$1,000 and \$2,000 to his Pension, bringing the total compensation to \$54,000. Jackie asked about the Social Security and Pension contributions as she had not seen these items before. They were explained. The \$5,000 Housing Exclusion was included in this report. The total compensation package was then adopted.

The next item discussed were the Finance/Stewardship July 2019 reports provided in the booklet.

A discussion of the Mission Share deficit was of much concern as the D.S. turned to the Finance and Stewardship Committee for further discussion. Jackie wondered if this was a mere "blip" or a trend. We are presently \$15,000 in arrears on the Mission Shares which could lead to an even bigger deficit in the new year. Jackie felt that with declining membership the church might have to consider going to a part time minister. In the past we have been able to make things up by the end of the year, but this is a much larger amount of money. This is another reason to reconsider whether a Capital Campaign is right for the present time. The D.S. asked all to pray and she had the members practice telling a neighbor how sorry we were if we had done anything to offend or hurt in any way. She went first by apologizing for wanting to make our conference as short as possible because she was tired and wanted to go home.

We then shifted to the Communion Ceremony in which each member in turn held the bread and dipped it in the juice before taking it and then handing it off to the next person to the left. Mary Lou led us in a couple of hymns, "Break Bread Together" and "Spirit of The Living God", before getting back to the business of the Conference.

After Communion, Jackie Brannen went back to discussing our financial situation. She offered to come back at any time to work through any issues that are keeping the church family from thriving. She clarified that it must be after Thanksgiving. She thought it would be a good idea if Rev. Tim got in touch with Bradley Call to discuss what came out in our discussions today around our concerns. She cautioned us not to back slide.

Next, we lifted up our Lay Servants: Richard Clark praised the Companions in Christ class. Diane McDonough said she was really looking forward to getting back to classes after battling ill health. Bobbi Pelletier said she has enjoyed classes as the participants did remain close during and afterwards. Kathleen Forbes was unable to submit her report due to illness but she is lifted up as well. All Lay Servants were approved to continue.

<u>REPORT OF PASTOR</u>: Rev. Tim reported a total of 297 professing members at last report; six additions including 4 on profession of faith or restored, one from another United Methodist church, and one from another denomination. There have been a total of nine deductions; 2 by transfer to other denominations, and 7 by death. Our membership has a total of 294 (182 females and 112 males). There are 65 Baptized members who have not become professing members according to the last membership audit.

Rev. Tim also reported on his sermon topics and that he is probably the unofficial Chaplain of the Caribou Rotary. He has been making visits to those in hospital.

Rev. Jackie Brannen praised Rev. Tim and called him a very humble man who cares deeply about his people.

<u>REMEMBRANCE of SAINTS</u>: A candle was lit for each of the 9 saints as their names were read who died since our last Conference of which two were not members.

Andover Organ Co. Coming on October 22 to make chimes (already installed for \$10,000) useable.

<u>Sprinkler System</u>. They are back to finish the work. This will cost \$8,900, maybe less because Judson is doing some of the work. What would have taken two days has been cut down to four hours.

Snow plowing contracts. Approximately a dozen businesses were asked to bid. The following businesses replied:

Bernaiche Property Maintenance – bid \$6,000, Judson talked them down to \$3,900

North End Landscaping (Joey Cowett) \$3,500. He had our contract last year, 2018-19, and the work was not satisfactory.

Pelletier Property Services. Bid \$5,820

Reno and Son. No bid but they will push back banks if needed.

Theriault Lawn Care. Bid complicated included trip fee plus plow fee. Around \$3,500

Louis made a motion that we accept Bernaiche Property Maintenance. Richard seconded. Passed.

Furnaces will be cleaned this month.

Heat pump at the parsonage has not been serviced for some time. Will be serviced in November.

Other items discussed – perhaps limit the number of hymn verses

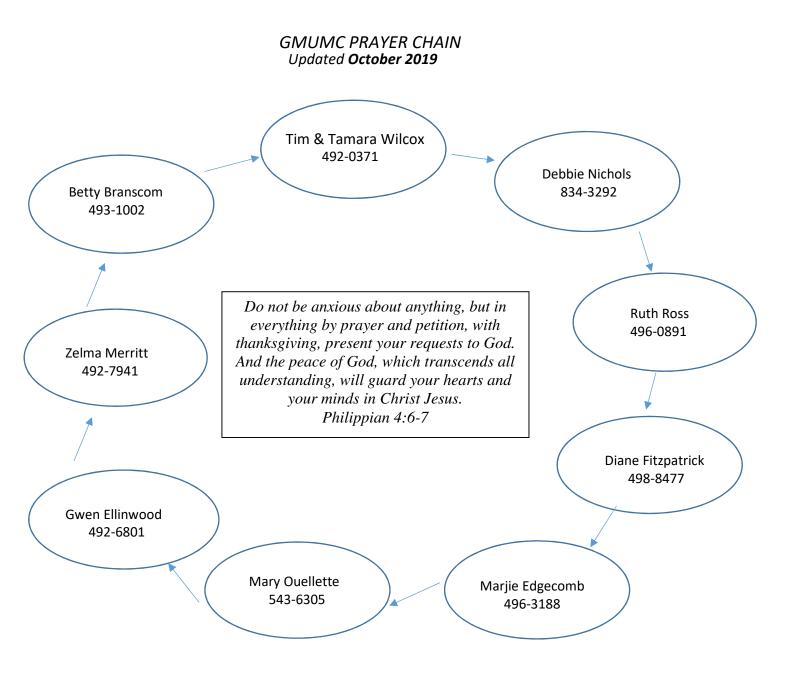

Early Churches of Caribou – The Methodist-Episcopal/Methodist Church

The earliest meeting of members of the Methodist-Episcopal Church in Caribou began in 1860. They met in the Lyndon Center School with Rev. William Truwin serving as a Methodist circuit rider. In 1964 the meetings were moved to the village school house. In 1867 the Union Meeting House was built and served as a meeting place for several churches and town events. In 1886 a new lot and lumber for a church were acquired and under the leadership of Rev. C. H. Leverton, 1886, the church was completed. The building was located on the south side of Sweden St. A new parsonage was built.

In 1910 Rev. James Gray became the church's next minister. On October 2, 1911, the church board voted to search for a new parcel of land and make plans for a new building. An acre lot on the corner of Sweden and Prospect Streets was purchased from A. V. Goud for \$8000. In 1912 the parsonage was sold for \$3500 and the church was sold for \$6000. The Goud house was moved from the corner of the lot to a place near the northern boundary to serve as a parsonage. Construction began on the church immediately. Astle & Page were the architects and builders. The church was celebrated the dedication of the new building with a week-long event in November, 1913. The church was officially dedicated as the Peoples Methodist Episcopal Church. (At that time the membership numbered over 300.)

Rev. Philip Lush became pastor in 1941. Membership had increased to 501 with 355 active in 1945. A divided chancel was installed in 1946 along with choir stalls and a new altar and rail, pulpit and lectern. In 1956 Rev. George Budd became pastor. A new sprinkler system was installed in 1961. Membership had risen to 670. Rev. Daniel Harlan took over in 1964. Rev. Richard Hamilton became the new minister in 1967. A new sound system was installed in 1968. A new office was built in the church in 1969. Rev. William Chamberlain became pastor. Roof repairs and a new heating system were projects taken on in 1975. Rev. Everett Wiswell took over in 1977. In early December 1977, a fire heavily damaged the pulpit area. A year later the altar area had been repaired and was rededicated. The following were pastors: Rev. Walter Webb, 1984; Richard Hopkins, 1987; Rev. Maurice Nason, 1989; Rev. Richard Hopkins, 1992; Rev. Lynne Josselyn, 1992; Anna Beach, 2005 and Rev. Tom Bentum, 2009.

The church celebrated its 100th birthday in 2013. For this special occasion, the building received a much-needed facelift. Rev. Tim Wilcox became the new pastor in 2015.
