April 2016



Every four years several significant events take place. In years like 2016, we can count on having Summer Olympic Games, a presidential election and a meeting of the General Conference of the United Methodist Church. The General Conference, a gathering of nearly 1000 delegates from over 60 countries, is the only body that can speak for the denomination as a whole and that can revise the church "law book," *The Book of Discipline*. The General Conference sets policies, develops ministry priorities of the denomination and approves a four year budget. As always, there are several significant issues before the assembly that will be held at the Oregon Convention Center on May 10-20, 2016. More about some of these in the May newsletter. One of the tasks will be to evaluate the goals set in 2012 for the quadrennium that ends this year. The 2012 General Conference adopted four areas of focus. They are...

Engaging in Ministry with the Poor by standing with those who are regarded as "the least of these," by addressing the causes of poverty and by responding in ways that lift up individuals and communities. United Methodists believe working side by side with those striving to improve their situation is more effective long term than top-down charity.

Improving Global Health

The United Methodist Church has become a key player in fighting diseases such as malaria and AIDS, knowing that health and poverty are linked. As the church nears its \$75 million goal, the death rate from malaria in Africa has been cut in half in only 5 years, thanks to international efforts such as the UMC's Imagine No Malaria campaign.

Developing Principled Christian Leaders

The church needs leaders rooted in Christ, who have a vision for changing the world. Today's young people have fearless hearts, vibrant ideas and a passion for ministry that should shape the church's future path. The church must recruit young people for ministry, equip them to be effective leaders and be open to where they want to lead us. We also must strengthen lay members, who are ministering at every level of the church.

Creating New and Renewed Congregations

United Methodists are continually innovating and adapting to changing circumstances as they plant new congregations and revitalize faith communities in every kind of setting. By being relevant and vital, United Methodists will touch more lives and draw more people to Christ through re-evangelizing the world.

Research during leading up to the adopting of the goals above has identified common factors in healthy, "vital" congregations. The research has shown that **vital congregations are:**

- Spirit-filled, forward-leaning communities of believers that welcome all people (Gal.3:28)
- Places where disciples of Jesus Christ are made through the power of the Holy Spirit (Matt. 28:18-20)
- Communities that serve like Christ through justice and mercy ministries (Micah 6:8, Luke 4:17-21)

and that vital congregations have:

- Inviting and inspiring worship
- Engaged disciples in mission and outreach
- Gifted, empowered and equipped lay leadership
- Effective, equipped and inspired clergy leadership
- Small Group ministries
- Strong children's & youth ministries

How are we doing at Gray Memorial? In what ways do you recognize us in these goals and descriptions? Where do you see opportunities to grow in our practice of faith and in the conduct of our congregation's ministries? How is God calling you and Gray Memorial UMC to be a vital witness in central Aroostook County in the early 20th Century? I would be interested in your thoughts and ideas.

Women's History Month - The Worship Committee selected four women from Gray Memorial UMC to honor during the month of March.

March 6 - Mary Lou Brown celebrated Jennie Lyon

Who is Jennie L. Lyon?

"On March 23, 1869, eight women gathered at Tremont Methodist Episcopal Church in Boston, Massachusetts, and organized the Women's Foreign Missionary Society, what would become United Methodist Women. Those women raised money to send a doctor, Clara Swain, and a teacher, Isabella Thoburn, to India as missionaries to serve the women of that nation.

What began as one mission project has now grown to over 200 mission projects around the world. What began as a 2 cents pledge is now over \$15 million in annual giving.

In 1880 Methodist Women in the United States organized the Women's Home Missionary Society to address national injustices.

In 1939 the Methodist Church's Women's Society of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guild and the Women's Division of Christian Service are formed. The merger of three Methodist denominations creates a segregated jurisdiction for African Americans.

In 1972 the Women's Organizations in the United Methodist Church combine to form one inclusive organization called <u>United</u> Methodist Women.

In 2012 United Methodist Women became an independent agency with the United Methodist Church and continued to put faith, hope, and love into action for women, children and youth." (Response, March 2016, p. 6 & 11)

It is in this spirit we raise the name of Jennie L. Lyon (John) of Gray Memorial Methodist Church. Jennie Lyon Circle was named in her memory and has been an active mission-minded group sinder her death in 1961.

Jennie Lyon Circle has been in existence for 55 years fulfilling many of the original goals that continued throughout the years of Women's Society of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guild now under the organizational structure of the United Methodist Women.

Besides the Executive Committee of the United Methodist Women and Jennie Lyon Circle, we currently have our Prayer Shawl Ministry. In past years, we have had the Ivah Chandler Circle, the Dr. Marvin Piburn Circle, and the Lydia Circle.

I'm sure that Jennie Lyon was as active and missional as any of our women through these transitions in names.

Jennie trusted the official Board of Trustees of this church, appointing Maynard Lombard, Lay Leader, as executor of her will, within which she left her home and land on York Street to our church with the original intention that we would provide a nursing home for Caribou. In studing this gift and examining the home, the Trustees felt that our church was not in a position to manage or fund a nursing home. In discussions with Mrs. Lyon, it was agreed that upon her death, the property would be disposed of, and the proceeds placed in a special building fund for the purpose of providing an educational facility for the church school.

The will stated that "The church will augment the fund from time to time until sufficient monies have been secured for this addition. The facility will be a memorial to Jennie Lyon and will be suitably inscribed. The offical Board letters stated, "As much as we would like to have found it possible to carry out the original intention of Jennie Lyon, we feel that this action still carried out the wishes of Mrs. Lyon, who was deeply concerned in the welfare of this Church." The statement was signed by: Robert Breedlove, Sec. Official Board; Maynard Lombard, Lay Leader, Executor; Reverend George Budd, Pastor.

The fund is managed by the New England Foundation of the United Methodist Church. Over the years of our existense requiring maintenance and care of the church property, interest on this fund combined with interest of other investments has made this work possible. As of 2015, the Trustees have directed that the interest on the Jennie Lyon Fund be added to the principal.

The forerunner of the Jennie Lyon Circle was then Women's Society of Christian Service. The following women were members of this group: Mary Roderick, Gretchen Fletcher, Gladys Ward, Jennie Anderson, Bertha Brown, Nettie Merrithew, Madeline Libby, Margaret Ashby, Hilda Espling, Edith Ames, Blanche Farrington, Lillian Kelley, Mildred McLaughlin, Vera Rogers, Marjorie Shaw, Lily Straight, Laura Reardon, May Mitchell, Elsie Hurley, Emily Milton, Lillian Borden, Louise Wilcox, Helen Farrington, Anne Smith, Margaret Norton, Maude Quimby, Gladys Harmon, Sibyl Parker, Katrina Clark.

Other family members named in the will were: Husband John Lyon, Brother Elbridge Campbell, Nieces Kathleen Lyon (Mrs. Gerald Lyon), Jane Lyon, Eva Shannon, Edna Whitney, and special friends Nettie Merrithew, (Perley), and Lillian Straight (Samuel M.).

Emily Grace Smith Milton

Born in Caribou, February 11th, 1903, the daughter of Leigh & Lena Smith, and died in Caribou, May 10th, 1996, at age 93.

My Mother was many things. A beloved daughter, a cherished sister, a loving wife, a mother of five, a grandmother of 12, and a great grandmother of 11. She was a farmer's wife, a schoolteacher, teaching all 8 grades in a 1 room schoolhouse, first at the Henderson School in Woodland, and later in the Snowman School in Woodland. She was a business woman, owning and operating, with my father, a grocery store on the New Sweden Road by the High School for many years. And most of all she was a woman of Faith.

One of her early memories, at age 10, was watching her father dig the hole for the basement of this church, with a team of horses and a metal scoop, and when it became too steep, he used a team of mules. When the foundation was finished, her father told her "This church will never fall because it is built on a solid foundation. Build your life, Emmy, on a firm foundation". She helped her mother to cook and take food to the men working on the building. Some of the lumber was harvested on her father's woodlot in Woodland. She attended worship with her family, arriving by horse and buggy in the summer, and horse and sleigh in the winter. There was a hitching post beside the new church for the horses during the service. She was a member of Mrs. Ebbett's Sunday School Class, who prepared them to join the church and they were the first new members in 1913.

She was a member of the Ladies Aid, and during the war they rolled bandages and knit mittens and socks for the soldiers. She was a long time member of Jennie Lyon Circle, cooking for bake sales, and working on public suppers. A group of ladies made patchwork quilts, which they tacked and sold at the Fall Bazaar. She was a willing and happy hostess of many Sunday evening Vesper services at their summer cottage at Madawaska Lake. And being a good Methodist, she was happy preparing and serving refreshments.

Although she was unable to attend worship services as often as she would have liked in her later years, she was always faithful to her promise to support the church with her time, her talents and her gifts. Indeed my mother lived her life on a" firm foundation."

One of her favorite psalms was the 23rd Psalm. I would like to read a version that was read at a memorial service at the Maine Veterans Home where she resided the last few months of her life.

"The Lord is my Shepherd; I have everything I need. He lets me rest in fields of green grass and leads me to quiet pools of fresh water. He gives me strength. He guides me in the right paths as he has promised. Even if I go through the deepest darkness, I will not be afraid, Lord, for you are with me. Your Shepherds rod and staff protect me. You prepare a banquet for me, where all my enemies can see me; you welcome me as an honored guest and fill my cup to the brim. I know that your goodness and love will be with me all my life; and your house will be my home as long as I live."

Today we are honoring the memory of another prominent woman in the history of our Church: **Jean M. Turner**. Through the efforts of Margaret Cyr, we have a beautiful floral arrangement on the altar this morning commenorating Jean's life. Jean has been gone from our midst only eight years, so there are many of us here today that knew her and remember her.

She was born Jean Morse in Charleston, New Hampshire, on October 9, 1921. She moved to Maine with her family at a young age; grew up in the Bangor/Brewer area, and graduated from Bangor High School in 1939. She was in her second year of college at the University of Maine at Orono when she fiirst met Philip B. Turner, and they married in 1944. They relocated many times while Phil was in the Army Air Corps and then while he continued his studies in Maine and in Michigan; and so through the years, they lived in many states. (Phil eagerly acknowledges that his success in achieving his doctorate degree is because of Jean's help, especially with those tough English courses!) Jean had her own degree in nursing, and as a Registered Nurse, she found work wherever Phil's career took them.

Jean and Phil had three sons: Peter, who died in his first year; and Scott, who they also lost when he was just a little boy. They they adopted Alex. Alex was a student at Caribou High School when he was killed in a tragic automobile accident.

Jean and Phil moved to Caribou in 1960, and soon after that became active and dedicated members of Bessie Gray Memorial United Methodist Church. Jean was an avid reader and over the years read at least 800 books! She also loved music and sang in her college Glee Club and sang in our Church choir for many years. She served on our Memorials Committee and was also an active member of the United Methodist Women. Ruth Ross recalls how very important the mission work of the ladies' circle was to Jean and how Jean encouraged and supported all their mission projects, in particular the Maine Sea Coast Mission.

In order to be true to the real essence of Jean Turner, we <u>must</u> mention her "no-nonsense" personality! Phil mentions that teaching was a big part of her nursing career and that she demanded that her students keep their work to a high standard. When they failed to perform their duties correctly, she quickly pointed out to them that they must "do things the right way" every day. Ruth says that that same earnestness and directness was also apparent when she attended meetings of UMW circles. Jean reminded the ladies often that the emphasis of their meetings and activities should stay focused on the UMW mission projects.

Jean and Phil have found very innovative ways to help our Church financially. I'd like to share just one: A few years back, they had assisted a local family who needed financial help. In return, the family gave Jean and Phil a promissory note and a mortgage on their residence. Then, Jean and Phil assigned both documents to Bessie Gray Memorial. So, when the family sold their house years later, there was enough equity in the property so that our Church received a generous amount of funds for Church use. The Board of Trustees set aside a portion of the funds to establish "The Philip B. and Jean M. Turner Fund". Interest from their Fund is paid to the Church and continues to perpetually help Bessie Gray Memorial. The engraved nameplate for their Fund is included on the Board of Trustees' plague which hangs in our sancturary.

Jean Turner was 86 when she passed away January 2008.

I want to thank Phil for allowing me to visit recently and talk about Jean and Alex. He has provided us with a wonderful collage of photos of family and travels and even pictures of some of their homes through the years. Won't you all please take a few minutes to come down to the fellowship hall after worship to say hello to Phil and see the pictures. We also have a cake with Jean's name on it that we'll be serving.

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES 3-17-16

<u>ATTENDEES</u>: Diane McDonough (Chair), Rev. Tim Wilcox, Debbie Barnes, Bill Thomas, Betty Branscom, Mary Lou Brown, Margaret Cyr, Bobbi Pelletier, and Shirley Bowman

Diane McDonough called the meeting to order at 6:30 PM in the chapel. Rev. Tim began with a scripture reading, Philippians 4:4 followed by a brief prayer. The Council approved the minutes of the last meeting and then the following Committee reports were given:

COMMUNITY SERVICE: No Report.

<u>CLUSTER</u>: Bill Thomas reported on the ongoing attempt to staff the charge at Portage for the coming summer season and also about the Cluster Lenten Service that was held at Limestone United Methodist Church on March 4th.

EDUCATION: The Sunday School (S.S.) continues to do well. Art supplies have been ordered for the "Paint and Sip" activity. Will Barnum will be doing a presentation with the Terrific Tuesday children teaching them what to do if they get lost in the woods, from parents, etc. Michele plans to look for S. S. supplies when she goes to annual Conference. The theme for this year's Vacation Bible School (VBS) is "SunQuest Rainforest". It will be co-directed by Michele and Denise and is scheduled for 7-11-16 to 7-15-16. A list of volunteers needed will be posted in the bulletin. S.S. recognition will be held June 5th. The children will be given signed certificates. Neal will take care of Teachers Appreciation gifts. Graduation Sunday is June 12th and the children will be participating in some way. Rev. Tim reported that Confirmation classes are at the midpoint and are going well. There are three students who will each receive an adult Bible upon completion of the class. Also, Membership classes will begin April 1st. Another Membership Class will be offered in the fall.

EVANGELISM AND PUBLICITY: Betty Branscom reported that her Committee had a long discussion about how the Prayer Chain was working. Betty will look into it. Also, updated Historical booklets will be placed in visitor bags soon. Ruth will try to find the resources to update Welcome Book Marks for the pews with the new church e-mail address. After discussing new church phone number stickers, further discussion was tabled. Magnetic ones are very expensive. The Committee encourages people to continue to wear their name tags at all worship services. Rev. Tim plans to order new business cards. The Committee encourages anyone who wishes to help with this committee do not need to come to meetings and also we need Sunday morning Greeters. It is only once a month. Betty will schedule April Greeters. If you want to volunteer you can call Betty at 999-1052 or Ruth Ross.

<u>FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP</u>: Shirley Bowmen reported that regular offerings for February amounted to \$13,682.30 with an additional \$78 for birthdays bringing that amount to \$13,760.30. We had \$4 in reimbursements and \$962.32 in special funds for church use. Special funds not for church use were \$35 for Lenten books and \$10 for the Ecumenical Food Pantry bringing the total offering to \$14,771.62.

Bobbi Pelletier reported the following check book figures for February:

Beginning Balance \$3,075.22 2016 Operating Income 13,760.30 Interest .42 Less EFT fee (18.00) Less Expenses (13,523.85) Ending Balance 3,294.09

Capital Account Seed Money had a previous balance of \$18,215.89. It had deposits of \$460.74 and no expenditures. The current balance for February is \$18,676.63. We are 2 months ahead in Mission shares as of February. Dead River Balance for the church is \$3,737.44 and for the Parsonage, \$908.03. The weekly tithe average need is \$2,016.00.

Debbie Barnes reviewed the Annual Budget as of February 29th. The Target is \$32,622.08. Tithes and Offerings were \$29,322.19 and total expenses amounted to \$34,684.69. There were no unpaid bills due to a surplus at the end of December. The average attendance in February was 92 making the average YTD 96. Debbie announced a possible church audit and the Committee is working on plans for the annual Italian dinner.

HISTORY & RECORDS: Mary Lou Brown asked her Committee to look at the circa 1887 framed photo of the Methodist Episcopal church because the frame is a bit worn and the back brown paper is loose. It was decided that the frame matches the photo so they will not replace it. They will re-glue the back paper. Mary Lou has enlarged and framed a photo of Jennie C. Lyon and Margaret Lyon that Bobbi found in the church desk. Wendy found Jennie Campbell Lyon's obituary. The photo will be displayed in the library. The Committee will display the laminated 1913

Aroostook Republican on the library wall after the scholarship plaques have been moved. Jeanette Belyea is donating her surplus of hanging file folders for the file drawers. The H & R goals for 2016 are: to research and find missing birth and death dates in the Memorial Book; see if Keaton, the locksmith, can open two locked file drawers without damage to the cabinet; to make this an archival library rather than a lending library; to have the church officially renamed Bessie Gray Memorial United Methodist Church as it was in 1920 when the church was renamed from its original name, The People's Methodist Episcopal Church; to see if the church will undertake the expense of a new evaluation by Stained Glass Express of Waterville ME. The windows were insured for \$225,000.00 in

1981. This company also does repairs. Our stained glass windows have areas of slipping lead frames in some places which need to be repaired. Mary Lou presented an archival letter from Frank Poland from 1920 as well as an official state document changing the name of the church as mentioned above. She also has a thank you letter from a mission in Angola, Africa, dated 1954, thanking the kindergarten Sunday school class for pictures they sent.

<u>MEMORIALS</u>: Diane McDonough announced that the church has three scholarships available to high school seniors and/or current college students who are active members of our church. These scholarships have been established in the memory of the following families: Rev. George Budd, Jack and Juanita Lancaster, and Herbert and Elizabeth Brown. Scholarship packets including applications will be available in the church office on April 1st during regular office hours (MWF, 9 to 2 PM until April 14th, and then Monday thru Friday, 9-12) by calling the office number at 498-2103 or, a request can be sent to <u>graymemorial@outlook.com</u>. Completed applications must be returned to the office by May 20th. Scholarships will be presented on Graduation Sunday, June 12th.

<u>SPRC</u>: Bill Thomas reported that SPRC reviewed with Rev. Tim on how he allocates his time in a normal week. Circumstances can come up to warrant changes in routine but we agreed his time was well spent. We also looked at Child Care. A new Child Care provider has not been found yet. SPRC is looking at finding child care volunteers who would pair up to do this service. We would hope to get enough volunteers so as to only have the same pair doing this once a month.

<u>UMM</u>: Neal reported that the guest speakers for the February UMM breakfast and meeting were Evan Graves and P.J. Gorneault who gave a power point presentation on the upcoming Caribou Marathon which included the course route and the different classes of runners. They expect to have 150 runners and are looking for volunteers to help out. Also, they are doing several fund raisers and soliciting corporate sponsorships. People are invited to come out and support the runners. Ken Peters reported that 55 people attended the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. They discussed but then tabled until next month a proposal to host a Ladies Social/Supper. Neal shared that the UMM

Commission communicated that Life Membership would cost \$250. Neal reminded everyone that our Annual Meeting is in June. Anyone considering one of the elected offices should contact any member of the Nominating Committee. Committee members are Conrad Walton, Bob Thompson, Bill Thomas, and Dave Belyea. The UMM will not meet in March as members will be hosting an Easter Sunrise Breakfast after the Sunrise service at the Country Club. Breakfast will be served in the church Fellowship Hall. Neal shared a 1948 UMM program that Mary Lou Brown had found in the archives.

TRUSTEES: The Trustees have not met but Mary Lou reported that there had been water leaks in the church basement. Foundation leaks were on west wall under the stairs leading to the altar. We were able to clean up the water before it worked its way to the choir room. The sprinkler system alarm sounded and no one knew why or how long it had been ringing. Is the alarm system connected to the fire department? Shirley Bowman came in to so some work in the church office, heard the alarm and called Rev. Tim. He in turn called the service man who instructed Rev. Tim and Tamara to adjust two valves before service man arrived. This averted the sprinklers from going off due to pressure, otherwise we might have had a fully wet church. Service man changed two gauges and a belt and advised that the five year full service maintenance time should be scheduled. The church furnaces have been serviced and there are problems with the furnace in the Parsonage. The parsonage furnace cover bolts to access the combustion chamber for cleaning are badly rusted. Service person did what he could be opening the side of the furnace. When the heating season is over, Trustees will go forward with a new heating unit.

<u>UMW</u>: Bobbi wishes to thank all the volunteers and food donators who helped to make the Boiled Ham Dinner a success. The Youth helped and UMW will donate \$50 toward their account to help pay for Camp Mechuwana camp trips. After the remaining food was sold at Coffee Fellowship Sunday, the total proceeds came to \$818. UMW will be serving three soups on Friday for the Holy Week luncheon. They will have fish chowder, chicken soup, and pea soup. The UMW voted to designate a new committee to take charge of the new church cookbook project since receiving the planning kit. Shirley Bowman volunteered to Chair the committee which includes Mary Lou, Gwen, Ruth, Bobbi, Diane, and Tamara. The next UMW project will be the Rummage Sale on Saturday, May 14th.

The Jennie Lyon Circle met for a noon luncheon on March 9, 2016 with sixteen members present including Rev. Tim. We welcomed back Debbie Nichols and Marilyn Langley following recent surgeries. All members present read the <u>Purpose of the United Methodist Women</u>. Mary Ouellette furnished dessert and led the group in devotions. A time of intercessory prayer was led by Rev. Tim for 14 persons as well as GMUMC worshipping community. Treasurer Ruth Ross reported a \$428.00 balance after distributions to the Memorial Committee in memory of Juanita Lancaster, Eva Theriault and Connie Harmon. Secretary's report for December meeting was included in the agenda. Bobbi Pelletier reported 16 paid members of UMW. Mary Lou read an article from Response magazine about the Legacy Fund Day of Giving, March 23, 2016 in honor of the beginning of UMW in March 1869. Our Reading Program continues with Cathy Griffeth in charge. The sign-up sheet for dessert and devotions for 2016 was circulated. Bobbi Pelletier explained the needs for the Boiled Ham Dinner on March 12th, requesting help with preparation of vegetables, hall set-up, serving and clean-up. Jennie Lyon voted to have a bake sale along with the Rummage Sale on May 14th, as well as on November 12th for the Soup Luncheon. Our UMW Pie Sale is scheduled for July 1st. A *Northern Maine District UMW Spring Retreat* will be held at the Alton UMC, April 15 & 16, 2016. Subject for the retreat is "Who I Am is How I Pray". Registration forms are available in the church office. The Prayer Shawl Ministry has received funds and will be purchasing new yarn soon.

<u>WORSHIP</u>: Margaret Cyr reported that the Ash Wednesday vigil went well and all slots were filled. The noon service attendance was 35. The Committee decided to have both a noon and evening service next year to accommodate more people. There will be a Maundy Thursday service at 7 pm, March 24th. Holy Communion and a Tenebrae service will be celebrated.
