

A Word from the Pastor

This year's presidential election has frequently been described as one of the more unusual in American history. Many people are really grappling with how they will vote. Sometimes lost amidst all the political theater are the issues that are a part of this election cycle. It is not always easy for a Christian to decide how to apply their faith to the topics at hand. As I will do this year, I have often over the years developed an election year sermon series on some of the most talked about topics. I do it with some trepidation knowing that these issues generate a wide range of opinions and can be rather emotionally charged. My goal, however, is not to tell you for whom to vote or how to vote. My goal is not to provide a partisan angle on today's pressing issues. Rather, I intend for us to think about how our faith informs our positions. I want us to think. I will present material that is largely derived from the United Methodist Social Principles and the resolutions of our denomination. These are one take, the consensus or majority of those we collectively send to General Conference. These principles and resolutions are themselves intended to be persuasive and a significant part of the development of our own positions. Agreement with them are not, however, required to be a "good" Methodist. Indeed, I expect that people will be all over the political and theological spectrum. I expect that you might agree with some points and disagree with others. This is fine. People of upstanding faith can arrive at different conclusions from sound biblical and theological principles. I actually think it is a strength of our denomination that we have room for such a diversity of thought. What I do hope is that you will gain insight into how your faith informs your own positions. I would like the words we sing and pray and preach each week to inform more than belief in our heads but also the actions of our lives. Some people would argue that religion and politics don't belong together. Although I wouldn't want a state church or a theocratic government, I do expect that we can apply the principles of our faith to the conduct of our own lives. The evidence from scripture is that we are to live out our faith in the living of our lives. When faced with our choices each day we can ask, "What would Jesus do?" and seek to follow his example and the collected wisdom of our forebears.

I have listed the topics I will cover below. The adult Sunday School class each of those Sundays will be an opportunity for more in-depth study and conversation. Plan to come join us. Please feel free to ask to talk with me about any of these topics individually as well. One other topic, that of race, is one I will address but will do so in January on a Sunday close to Martin Luther King, Jr. day.

I know that many of you are giving a lot of thought to how you will vote this fall and you are weighing many factors. My prayer is that our faith will be a significant part of informing us in that process in whatever way you ultimately decide to vote and/or participate in this year's election.

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES 9-22-16

ATTENDEES: Diane McDonough (Chair), Claire Hodgkins, Susan White, Steve Cashman, Shirley Bowman, Debbie Barnes, David W. DeMerchant, Bobbi Pelletier and Rev. Tim Wilcox.

Diane McDonough called the meeting to order at 6:40 PM in the church library. Rev. Tim said a brief prayer, and the Council approved the minutes of the last meeting as published and printed, followed by the following committee reports:

CLUSTER:

Social Action Award - Please continue thinking about possible recipients for 2016. Applications are available from Leona Michaud if needed. Leona provided a list of past recipients – thank you, Leona!

District Lay Servants Committee - Advanced lay servant classes are available online at www.beadisciple.com. Pastor Stephen planned to offer the United Methodist Beliefs class but scheduling was an issue. He has postponed it until after harvest and will condense the class to 2 or 3 longer classes instead of 5 or 6 shorter sessions. The classes will be held at Mars Hill UMC so that it will be in a more central location to ease travel for participants.

There will be a welcoming service for the new D.S. on Oct. 15th at the Old Town UMC. Bishop's Day will be Oct. 27th at Hampton Highlands from 2pm to 4 pm with clergy and laity together.

John Defelice is serving Mapleton UMC as full-time pulpit supply. Chris Dare remains pastor of record.

Ella Stevens coordinated persons to provide pulpit supply to Portage for the summer of 2016. The church (a

Congregational Church) stayed open this summer and service was provided largely by United Methodists from various churches. Chris will be in touch with Rev. Tim Stohlberg (UCC pastor in PI) to discuss the future.

Upcoming classes at Gray Memorial – the "Twelve Women of the Bible" sessions start on Monday October 17th. This 12week study will run for 6 weeks from Oct 17th through Nov 21st and then resume in January. Classes are Monday 10am-11:30am and 6:00pm – 7:30pm. *NOTE: The "Twelve Women of the Bible" book study was replaced with a study of the book "From Eve to Esther", an 8 week study which will run for 6 weeks until November 21st.* 4-week "The Redemption of Scrooge" class on Sunday mornings 8:45am-9:45am and Tuesdays, 1pm-2pm beginning Nov 29th. <u>COMMUNITY SERVICE</u>: Diane announced that Memorials Committee would take over the needs of the Ecumenical Food Pantry while this committee rebuilds. The Caribou Craft Fair will be Oct. 22-23 and concern arose as to the viability of the Cookie Booth. The spot is paid for. Rev. Tim will touch base with Duska Franklin to see if she would coordinate that with volunteers. Hopefully Leland Frost would assist.

<u>EDUCATION AND FAMILY MINISTRIES</u>: Steve Cashman reports that Sunday school has gotten off to a good start but that it would be nice to get 5 to 10 more children and youth to come. The Committee has decided that there will only be 3 Sundays that Sunday school would not meet this year, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. The Sunday school needs substitute teachers. Also, long range plans for various items are being discussed.

EVANGELISM: No Report

<u>FINANCE & STEWADSHIP</u>: Shirley Bowman reported that Regular Offerings for August amounted to \$12,186.15 and other sources of \$53 for an Anniversary party, Upper Room Reimbursement of \$2, Special Funds for church use totaling \$3,217.07, plus Special Funds that were not for church use amounting to \$78.10 brought the total to \$15,536.32. Susan White noted the line titled "Youth Ministry" in Special Funds for Church Use totaling \$536.45 and plans to discuss how to best use this money with her Committee (SPRC). These funds were originally donated for a position of Youth Pastor which was not filled.

The Capital Account Seed Money Fund had a Beginning Balance of \$24,584.14. Deposits amounted to \$2,868.19 with no expenditures bringing the total to \$27,452.33.

We continue to be paid up until October 31st in Mission shares. Expenditures for the month of August totaled \$11,386.59 on programs, staff salaries, maintenance, and Pastor Compensation package.

The Dead River Fuel balances for the Church was \$3,597.62 and the Parsonage was \$879.75.

Debbie Barnes reported that the August Budget target was \$130,488.33. Tithes & Offerings were \$122,279.10, and total expenses amounted to \$123,302.95. There were no unpaid bills and the average attendance for August was 85 bringing the average attendance to date at 96. The 2016 Annual Budget is \$195,732.50 which requires a monthly offering of \$16,311.04 and a weekly offering of \$3,693.07. The Committee will be scheduling an audit.

The Council voted to approve the Pastor's Compensation Package as recommended by the Finance and Stewardship Committee.

<u>HISTORY & RECORDS</u>: The Committee discussed the future of the Committee as there are now only three members. The Committee will discuss how best to proceed with home projects when it meets in October.

<u>MEMORIALS</u>: Diane McDonough reported that the Committee has decided neither to continue the "Rags to Riches" clothing project nor to hold the fall yard sale. The Committee will sponsor Gray Memorial's responsibility to the Caribou Ecumenical Food Pantry while the Community Service Committee rebuilds. Diane attended the Caribou Ecumenical Food Pantry meeting and learned it needs donations of Hamburger Helper and all kinds of pasta. Also, it needs volunteers to show up on Thursday mornings to assist in unloading foodstuffs that arrive at various times during the week. Gray Memorial is responsible for volunteering to work on Tuesday and Thursday mornings in the months of November and May. Please contact Diane if you wish to be a volunteer representing Gray Memorial.

<u>SPRC</u>: Susan White reported her Committee welcomed new members Meagan Irving, Karen White, Beth Alden, Michelle Nichols, and Susan White. Goals were set for the year with focus on reviewing job descriptions and salary agreements. Susan Clark agreed to return to the position of organist. The Committee is preparing for the October 22nd Church Conference. The Pastor's Compensation package, which had been approved by SPRC and the Finance Committee, was approved tonight, by the Church Council. The Committee will be meeting with the District Superintendent to submit required paperwork.

The Pastor's Compensation Package calls for a \$2,000.00 raise in salary from \$46,000 to \$48,000. With the addition of Social Security payments, pension, and health insurance contributions, the total package comes to \$66,228.00. The SPRC respectfully requests that unauthorized persons not enter the office area during the official offering counting business on Sunday mornings to protect the privacy and anonymity of donors. The door will be locked. The Congregation will be informed.

TRUSTEES: No report

<u>UMM</u>: No report. David DeMerchant has taken the old electronics that was stored in the shed to a public drop off so the shed cleaning project is now completed.

<u>UMW</u>: Bobbi Pelletier reported that her Committee held a Pie Sale on July 1st with proceeds of \$351.00. It provided refreshments for Connie Harmon's Memorial service on July 28th and the recent Memorial service for Ward Silsbee on September 15th. UMW provided rhubarb cake for dessert at the August 6th Chicken BBQ.

The Cookbook Committee completed the project and received the cookbooks in late August. With pre-orders and subsequent sales we have covered the cost of the cookbooks. We still have quite a few to sell and plan to sell them at the Cookie Booth on October 22/23. Proceeds are earmarked for the Capital Account for floor replacement in the basement. UMW will be seeking new officers for 2017. The next UMW event will be a Soup & Sandwich luncheon on Saturday, Nov. 14th from 11 am to 1 pm. Jennie Lyon Circle will have a bake sale. UMW will be serving Thanksgiving dinner again this year.

Jennie Lyon Circle went out to lunch at the Par & Grill in July; potluck lunch in August followed by a slide show of Bobbi's trip to Alaska; potluck lunch in September with a presentation from Mena Irving on her trip to the Honeywell "Space Camp" Academy for Educators to experience some of what astronauts do to train for their missions, such as rock climb, jump out of a helicopter into the ocean, and get out of a sunken plane and get to the surface. She raised enough money to take 3 students on a second trip to "Space Camp".

The Prayer Shawl Ministry had its 4th annual brunch and meeting at Lidstone Memorial UMC on September 10th in Washburn. We will host the event next year. A prayer shawl dedication was held on Sept. 18th. There are an abundance of blessed shawls in the office; at October's meeting the group will discuss donating some to various worthy organizations or shelters.

<u>WORSHIP</u>: The summer events included the Summer Musicale in July; a new summer banner with a butterfly was purchased; an outdoor service on August 21st.

The biggest drawback in putting on the outdoor service is putting up the tent. We discussed paying S.W. Collins to do it, trying to find more volunteers which is a problem, or renting a tent that the company would put up and take down. We also considered not having the outdoor service. We tabled this until spring.

New Ushering Guidelines have been printed up with a few additional responsibilities added.

We are continually working on the Order of Worship to make it flow better. To cut down on Announcement Time we ask people to put their prayer concerns on the form in the Narthex. A new Flower Chart will be in the Narthex in the next couple of weeks.

Items to be discussed during the next meeting will include: Having the Laity participate in Children's Time, Laity Sunday in Oct., Special fall services, and Advent themes.

Donations have been given the choir in memory of Bob Sawyer and Ward Silsbee which will be used to purchase something in their memory at some point.

<u>PASTOR'S TIME</u>: Rev. Tim reported the highlights of his busy summer with 3 weddings, 3 funerals, camp counselor at Mechuwana, attending Annual Conference. Annual Conference generated a lot of questions about the ruling on hot button issues like same sex marriage and ordination of gay persons. He has started a new study using the Hamilton book. Rev. Tim was given a year to settle in before being given a District Committee assignment. He will now be on a Committee that mentors pastors. He and the District Finance Committee will be mentoring the new lay pastor for Mapleton. He has three people who will be doing the Disciple II study.

Rev. Tim reported that he and Diane McDonough had discussed what the next steps of church growth could be. Rev. Chris Dare of Grant Memorial has issued an invitation to participate in the next level of the Fruitful Congregation Journey. The Council would like to invite Chris to come and speak to the congregation in October about this project. It is scheduled to begin in November with three meetings this year and 4 meetings next year. Churches will establish a team to meet with teams from other churches at a central location for 7 monthly learning sessions. A team would consist of the Pastor and 6 to 12 laity. It would be imperative that the lead pastor and at least 6 of the laity from a given church show up to the 7 sessions. All sessions would be on Sundays from 2pm to 5 pm. Between sessions, of what will be known as Lay Leadership Development (PLD), there would be reading assignments in the book that is part of this journey. The group would use this to analyze and develop an action plan.

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned at 8:45 pm. The next meeting will be 10-20-16 at 6:30 pm in the church.
