

A Word from the Pastor June 2018

For most of the last 15 years, I have organized a "Mission Sunday" presentation or speaker on a ministry in the local community or a ministry in the wider church that the local church sponsors in some fashion. Last year, for example, Norman Thombs, director of Camp Mechuwana preached here at Gray Memorial. This year I wanted to offer worship that addressed the prevalence of sexual harassment and assault in our culture and what a Christian response might be. According to recent research over 80% of women in the United States have been victims of sexual harassment or assault as have a little more than 2 in 5 men. One in six women have experienced attempted or completed rape (statistics are from the RAINN organization and the Stop Street Harassment poll). The odds are that the majority of the people in worship on any given Sunday have experienced harassment or assault in some form. Almost certainly, everyone has multiple family members, friends, colleagues and neighbors whose lives have been affected by this reality. If we were considering cancer or fire victims, we would have had those affected on our prayer lists and we would have taken steps to assist affected people. When it comes to any form of sexual harassment the church, as has much of our culture, too often been silent. What is different now, is that over recent months we have witnessed an ongoing stream of powerful people being called to account for their destructive behavior. The #MeToo movement has represented the growing voice of those who previously could not speak or feared the results of doing so. Still, many people—including many of us in the church—are still trying to find our voices.

I have invited Pastor Cheryl Stratton from the Limestone UMC to preach on Sunday, June 3 about the reality of sexual harassment in our world. I know this is not an easy topic for many, but I encourage you to attend as we grapple both with the reality of this part of our human condition in our world and with how we can constructively respond as Christians who seek to bring the fruits of the spirit (like joy, love, peace and faithfulness) into reality in our community. Cheryl and I will both participate in this Mission Sunday opportunity which will include the invitation to come to the Lord's table. It is during communion that we are reminded that we are indeed beloved children of God and that we can be agents of healing, wholeness and justice in our community. I encourage you to join us for worship on June 3. Let's move toward finding an authentic and life-giving voice for that which is too often forced into the shadows where suffering happens in silence. If you have any questions or wish to speak with me before or after June 3, please contact me.






Debbie Nichols was the guest speaker at the UMM Breakfast Saturday, April 28th. She talked about the Nylander Museum.





WHAT DOES A FATHER DO?

I received a letter from a single mother who had raised a son who was about to become a dad. Since he had no recollection of his own father, her question to me was "What do I tell him a father does?"



When my dad died in my ninth year, I, too, was raised by my mother, giving rise to the same question, "What do fathers do?" As far as I could observe, they brought around the car when it rained so everyone else could stay dry.

They always took the family pictures, which is why they were never in them. They carved turkeys on Thanksgiving, kept the car gassed up, weren't afraid to go into the basement, mowed the lawn, and tightened the clothesline to keep it from sagging.

It wasn't until my husband and I had children that I was able to observe firsthand what a father contributed to a child's life. What did he do to deserve his children's respect? He rarely fed them, did anything about their sagging diapers, wiped their noses or fannies, played ball, or bonded with them under the hoods of their cars.

What did he do?

He threw them higher than his head until they were weak from laughter. He cast the deciding vote on the puppy debate. He listened more than he talked. He let them make mistakes. He allowed them to fall from their first two-wheeler without having a heart attack. He read a newspaper while they were trying to parallel park a car for the first time in preparation for their driving test.

If I had to tell someone's son what a father really does that is important, it would be that he shows up for the job in good times and bad times. He's a man who is constantly being observed by his children. They learn from him how to handle adversity, anger, disappointment and success.

He won't laugh at their dreams no matter how impossible they might seem. He will dig out at 1 a.m. when one of his children runs out of gas. He will make unpopular decisions and stand by them. When he is wrong and makes a mistake, he will admit it. He sets the tone for how family members treat one another, members of the opposite sex and people who are different than they are. By example, he can instill a desire to give something back to the community when its needs are greater than theirs.

But mostly, a good father involves himself in his kids' lives. The more responsibility he has for a child, the harder it is to walk out of his life. A father has the potential to be a powerful force in the life of a child. Grab it! Maybe you'll get a greeting card for your efforts. Maybe not. But it's steady work.

MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING 4-29-18

<u>ATTENDEES</u>: Judi Greenier (standing in for Diane McDonough), Claire Hodgkins, Kathie Forbes, Bobbi Pelletier, Susan White, Debbie Barnes, Colleen Harmon, Lee Frost, Bob Thompson, and Rev. Tim Wilcox.

A special meeting of the Church Council met in the church library at 11:15 am after the Sunday service for a presentation by Bob Thompson of the current and future hopes for the technology piece of the church. Bob explained that there were areas in the technology area that needed upgrades and expanding. One thing that is much needed is a secondary WIFI service specifically for phones as the existing service is negatively affected by too many users. The Committee did do some work to correct the feedback and other computer related problems last December, but the computer is old and needs to be replaced. There needs to be access point expansion around the church. New mics have been installed on the pulpit and lectern.

Kathie volunteered that after watching a segment on church security, she thought another component that should be considered in the future would be a camera system to bolster safety concerns.

Bob shared that the upgrades would cost an estimated \$1,367.00 plus labor of about \$500 more. With left over money from the Chicken BBQ (\$460) and the fall Harvest Supper (\$2,000), there should be enough money to cover those costs. Members of the Finance & Stewardship Committee did not feel using money from the Budget line would be appropriate due to the ongoing need to pay for internet and phone service which costs about \$64 a month now.

The Council voted to use the BBQ and Harvest supper moneys to upgrade the technology issues addressed in Bob's presentation. There being no other business the meeting adjourned at 11:28 am.

CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES

5-17-18

<u>ATTENDEES</u>: Judi Greenier (standing in for Diane McDonough), Claire Hodgkins, Tamara Wilcox, Rev. Tim Wilcox, Bill Thomas, Susan White, Colleen Harmon, Debbie Barnes, Mary Lou Brown, Stephen Cashman and Bobbi Pelletier.

The meeting was called to order by Judi Greenier at 6:45 PM with a prayer by Rev. Tim which included prayers for members, relatives and friends who are ill. A brief discussion of one correction in last month's minutes of the Trustee report. The Local Organ Fund was amended to read \$2,532.92. The minutes of last month's meeting were amended then passed as printed and published. Bobbi requested that Chairs read over the draft minutes she sends out to make sure these corrections are made before the minutes go into the Newsletter.

<u>CLUSTER</u>: Bill Thomas reported that the Cluster is working on a grant to raise money to get guest speakers up to our area. Also, the Cluster is looking for nominations for its Social Action Award which it hopes can be in by August.

EDUCATION AND FAMILY MINISTRIES: No Report

<u>FINANCE AND STEWARDSHIP</u>: Tamara Wilcox reported on the Offerings for April. The Regular Offerings for Church use amounted to \$15,254.51 with additional offerings for birthdays (\$145) and Easter (\$496) for a total of \$15,895.51. Reimbursements were \$12 for Education. Special Funds for Church Use amounted to \$2,010.29 which included the following:

Bobbi Pelletier reported the following Checkbook figures for April as follows:

2018 Operating Income 15,895.51
Interest 1.88
Less EFT fee (26.28)
Less Expenses (13,059.63)
Ending Balance 4,851.43

Bobbi explained that she plans to combine related line items in Special Funds for Church Use to simplify the reported. All lines will be identified as to which Committee they belong. We should begin to see these changes next month.

The \$25,000 invested with Thompson/Hamel LLC for the Memorial Garden on June 29, 2017 at an investment cost of \$1,073.778, as of April 30, 2018, on-line report shows and ending value of \$24,377.92.

The Beginning Balance on April 1 for the Capital Account Seed Money was \$20,080.17. There were deposits of \$416.41, no expenditures, with an ending Balance of \$20,496.58.

Mission Shares were paid up through April. Dead River Balances as of 4-30-18 were Church (615.65) and Parsonage (\$595.97). While there is no bill in May, Bobbi was able to pay off the balances to Dead River from the Fuel Fund.

Debbie Barnes reported on the Budget year to date as follows:

April Target was \$69,146.83. Tithes and Offerings were \$66,848.55. Total Expenses were \$64,243.00. There were no unpaid bills. Average attendance in April was 105 bringing the average attendance for the YTD to 88 up from 83 in March.

Debbie askes that Treasurers hand in Audit materials to Bobbi as soon as possible as the Audit Committee has been assembled to do our annual Audit. The Committee has begun work on the coming year's campaign. She also announced that Carol Norsworthy will be stepping down from this Committee.

MEMORIALS: The Memorial Committee will award one Scholarship on Graduation Sunday, June 3rd.

SPRC: SPRC met on Thursday, May 10, 2018. Guests in attendance were Trustees Chairperson, Mary Lou Brown and Interim Church Custodian, Judson Drake. Mr. Drake shared with the committee some of the work he has been doing in his role as the interim Church Custodian. He discussed ideas for the position moving forward for the committee to consider. After Mr. Drake's presentation he and Mary Lou left and the committee discussed the options presented to them. The committee agreed that the work that Mr. Drake has done up to this point has been excellent. It was decided that the committee would ask the Finance Committee if there was any additional funding available that would support increased hours for the position of Church Custodian for June – December 2018. Pending the outcome of this request the committee will have further conversations with Mr. Drake.

In discussion with the Council it was agreed that Sue would present a proposal to Mr. Drake as a compromise to his proposal which would include 15 hours a week at \$19 an hour. It is hoped that more funds could be raised in the future to increase hours. It was decided to transfer \$4,100.00 from one Trustee line (Church Utilities) to the "Custodian" line in SPRC budget for this purpose.

Reverend Tim shared his tentative summer schedule with the committee. He also updated the committee on recent visitations and his plans to use other church members to assist in visitations.

MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM: No report.

<u>TRUSTEES</u>: The Trustees have approved Tamara's request to paint the kitchen cupboards, and for Friedrich to paint his bedroom. Judi Greenier reported the local funds figures for 5-15-18 as follows:

<u>UMM</u>: The men will be working on moving the patio out from the Parsonage because right now it is a cause for water getting into the basement.

<u>UMW</u>: No Report. Jennie Lyon Circle meeting opened with the pledge of the "Purpose of United Methodist Women", welcoming of members and guests. Cindy Haron introduced <u>Healing Foods from the Bible</u> by Bernard Ward pointing out different foods mentioned in the Bible such as mint as an antispasmodic. Her talk was followed by a great luncheon. Speaker for the day was Red Cross representative Mary Green explaining many of the services provided and opportunities for donating time and funds in support of their work. Mary has done hands on work in Georgia and St. Croix Island and impressed upon us the vast devastation she had encountered as well as her thankfulness to be able to help. Out of donations given to Red Cross ninety-one cents of every dollar goes directly to help disaster persons. Mary urged us to attend the Real Heroes breakfast May 19th to help celebrate the work of our own Bill Thomas.

Mary Lou gave a brief devotion following reading of the minutes of our April meeting. Ruth Ross gave the treasurer's report with bank balance of \$215.45. Several members will be attending a tea at Grant Memorial on May 19, 2018 at 10:30AM. Jennie Lyon members will

be helping with refreshments following the memorial service for Dr. Phil Turner on May 26th. We will be hosting Coffee Fellowship on June 3 (note – this has changed to June 10th). Our annual "Ladies Out" luncheon will be June 13, 2018 at 11:30AM at Caribou Inn and Convention Center.
