
Plow Day, March 18 by Marilyn Hawley

Pima County Fair Show, 2017

We had 49 tractors, 4 crawlers, 8 garden tractors, 35 gas engines, 6 trucks, and 3 cars, all vintage. Ford was the predominant vehicle along with two Chevrolets, one Dodge, and one White.

The public silent auction went well with much of the merchandise sold. Jeff Eppley



managed his crew of Len Becwar and Frank Bessler. Candi Eppley, Ruth Senkbeil, and Jamie Davenport picked up the tags, collected the money, and distributed cash, as needed, to the sellers. Zane Parker ran Ernie Oertle's fork lift and moved anything that needed to be moved.

JoBeth Hayes headed up the ice cream production with Lance Amatulli, along with John Davenport, Zane Parker, Jerry Hayes, Frank Bessler, Hunter Davenport, and Rex Patten, running the six horsepower Fairbanks throttler. Ice Cream distributors and washing staff consisted of Sandy Patten, Tracy Parker, Liz Amatulli, Teri Bessler, Phyllis Stevens, Ruth Senkbeil, Tammy Christie, Jamie Bishop, Ruth Perkins, Marcie Severson, Gail Clark, Candi Eppley, Joan St. Clair, Cheri Rasmussen, and Linda Kahle.



Wayne Stevens reported that we collected 130 pounds of aluminum tabs for the Ronald McDonald House. Our friends in Woodland, Washington and Buckeye, AZ provided large amounts.

Getting Roped by Mel Perkins

The rope machine required a number of assistants as we were scheduled each day until 8 p.m. Our assistants helped the children make 1,577 ropes! We offered three colors of twine, so for some the most difficult task was to choose a color.

The comments from our assistants relay the underlining motive for volunteering, which is to educate and serve our community. The expression on the faces of the preschoolers to be able to crank in the correct direction while standing on a box is priceless. The patience of the teachers and sponsors of the special needs children, puts us to shame in our feeble attempts to help with special challenges, such as the teenage girl with a prosthetic leg who expressed no fear making a rope, while hanging out with her peers. Then there was the young lady with her husband who asked to make a rope in remembrance of her mother who succumbed to breast cancer at 43 years of age. (She chose the pink twine so she could hang the rope next to her

mother's picture.) Parents who made ropes as children were now bringing their children to make ropes. We are certain the rope will be the longest lasting tangible item taken from the fairgrounds. And to think that if each child brought only one parent, we interacted with at least 3,000 individuals during the show.


Mattson, Warren McKay, Joe Mooney, and Zack Shore gathered at the Pima Fairgrounds on May 6 to dis-
