Independence Day Celebration, Benson, July 4

Assembly for the parade is 8:00 -8:30. To unload, take Ocotillo south until it intersects with Union, then take Union west to its end. Then you will travel east on Union to the assembly point which is a triangular lot near Cholla. The parade begins at 9 a.m.


Annual Meeting Highlights, May 5, 2018

down by steering into the bank, but the tractor had its own mind. At some point he was thrown off the tractor and the tractor went on but soon turned down a steep embankment where it came to a resting place, about a hundred feet from the road. Miraculously, Larry laid on the road until some members came to his rescue. He was placed against the bank and then placed in the back seat of Lance & Liz's truck. An undercover deputy called for help and an ambulance (manned by Fry and Palominas fire fighters) met them near the bottom of the mountain. The ambulance took him to Valley View Elementary where he was transported in a helicopter to UMC Trauma Center in Tucson. (The last that I remember was trying to slow the tractor by turning towards the bank.) I am grateful to all who helped me. All the other participants made it back to Ash Canyon without any difficulties.

A special thanks is extended to Joe Mooney and Buster Brown in working out the details with the cleanup with the Coronado National Memorial. Power from the Past has and continues to be a positive light in my life and well as my family. I thank the members who have extended prayers on our behalf, as well as phone and actual visits at the various medical facilities and at home and get well wishes.
