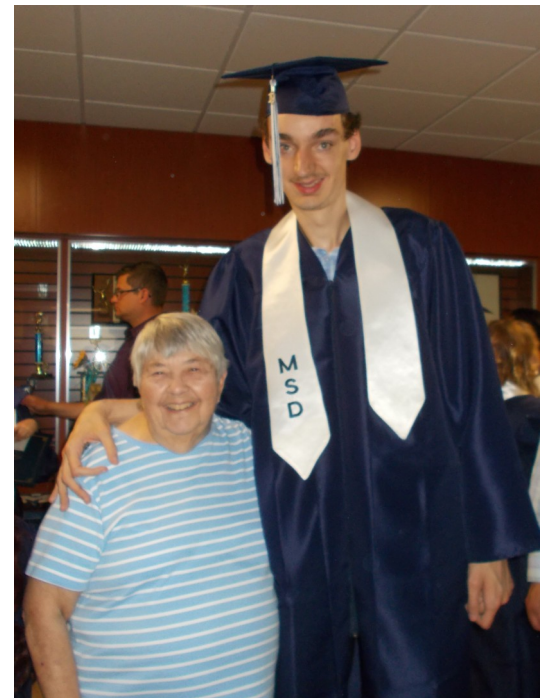

I was hoping that similar to years past I would be able to get into Sen. Stabenows office for a visit with her staff. That did not happen, I was however, able to get an appointment with Congressman John Moolenaar. I had a 10:30 appointment that was to last 15 minutes, however I finally walked out of his office shortly after 11. Some people in his waiting room did not look happy. We had a lot of good discussion about issues concerning the National Grange as well as the Michigan State Grange and the people of Michigan. While at the National Grange office for the weekend we had many visitors come to talk with those of us there for the Fly In. Many dealt with rural broadband and the relativity of those in rural community being able to benefit from faster internet service and being able to operate businesses at a more productive rate than they currently are able to. Some discussion was held about urging congress to pass the disaster relief bill that would help many farmers and ranchers in the Great Plains dealing with the over abundance of rain and flooding they had earlier this year.

State Grange Session

As many of you are well aware the annual session is quickly approaching. In the next issue of the Michigan Grange news you will find more information in regards to places for lodging in the Adrian area. Region 4 will be hosting the convention at the Lenawee County Fairgrounds in the community building. Last year, we did the Mitten Tree for Kalamazoo, and we are expanding a little on that. My sources in Adrian tells me that they can use mittens, gloves, scarves, hats or socks. We had super support in 2018 and I am sure we can do just as well or even better in 2019. An questions, just call me.



I wanted to remind you again of the Family Activities report form that will be coming your way soon, if not already. Please take the time to fill it out, and send it in. I'm awarding a special gift to the Grange with the most outstanding report. I have out-of-state judges lined up so they have no knowledge or bias our Grange. There's still time to do a couple more things before sending the report in, so please push and prod to see that your Grange could be the winner. All Granges submitting reports will be recognized with a certificate. Report forms are due by **September 10th**.

Spring, Summer and Fall! That means all that good fresh Michigan produce to choose from and enjoy. Here are some tips I gleaned from a pamphlet from the USDA which should interest all of us:

They recommend washing fruits and veggies before eating, we all know that, but here's the tips that can help prevent an illness or worse.

- ◆ Begin with clean hands. Wash your hands for 20 seconds with warm water and soap before and after preparing fresh produce.
- ◆ Cut away any damaged or bruised areas. Produce that looks rotten should be discarded.
- ◆ All produce should be thoroughly washed before eating. Wash under running water just before eating, cutting or cooking.
- ◆ Many pre-cut bagged produce items are pre washed. If the package says that the contests have been prewashed, we can use it without further washing, just be sure to look it over for bruising or damage.
- ◆ Even if you plan to peel the produce before eating, it is still important to wash it first.
- ◆ Washing fruits and veggies with a soap or detergent is not recommended.
- ◆ Scrub firm produce such as melons and cucumbers with a clean produce brush.
- ◆ Drying produce with a clean cloth towel or paper towel may further reduce bacteria that might be present.
- ◆ On a separate note, with highly perishable berries, one method for helping them to stay fresh longer is to soak them in a vinegar bath. And don't worry, they won't taste like vinegar. This reportedly helps destroy bacteria and mold spores. Cared for this way, strawberries can last up to two weeks and raspberries a good week.



Here's what you need to do:

Make a solution of 3 cups water to 1 cup white vinegar. Place the berries in a bowl and cover with the water/vinegar solution. Let sit for 5 minutes, then drain and rinse the berries. Place on paper towel to dry. To store, line a container with paper towel and place the berries in the container. This will absorb any more moisture.

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Summer Is Fun!

Instead of the “usual” method of going through photos the week or two before State Grange to see what photos you might have that match the categories, you might consider planning photos that you take during your various summer outings and events around the contest categories.



The photography categories are Animals; People in Action; American the Beautiful; Michigan, my Michigan; and County Fair. These categories have been made general to provide opportunities for all ages and considering the kinds of events that Grange families might participate in.

A few of the rules – any size up to 8” X 10”; no glass covering, but instead a firm backing for display (at least poster board weight), one entry per class – but may enter a different photo in all 5 classes.

The contests are also for junior age kids aged 5-14. Even if your Grange does not have a Junior Grange, children and grandchildren of Subordinate members may enter the contests. Juniors receive small cash prizes for 1st through 3rd places.

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What is Community Service?

One of the graduating seniors from the Battle Creek area had to write an essay on his involvement and ideas of what Community Service is. He has worked many hours for the Grange and I thought you would like to see what one of our Youth Members thinks about Community Service...

During all of the hours that I did for this project I didn't necessarily deal with fix or face any huge problems or any major complications, I mostly just helped the community through the Fredonia Grange. One of the things that I believe dealt with a problem would be when we made quilts for the homeless and the elderly along with making dog pads for the local animal shelter. Over the summer, including the school holidays, snow days, or weekends my grandma would come to our house pick my brother and me up and take us to the Fredonia Grange. We would go make pet pads out of donated fabric for the local animal shelter and make quilts for the elderly, people in need and the disabled. I remember piecing together all the different fabrics into patterns that I thought looked well. I would help sew the quilts and once we made enough quilts we would bring them to the retirement home or to a shelter and hand them out to people.

Other than making and giving out quilts we also served food at the Marshall fair and weekend pancake breakfasts in the Fredonia kitchen. This helped raise money for the Fredonia Grange expenses including the money to make the quilts.

Along with that, I helped out our local zoo a lot and helped teach younger kids new soccer skills. I enjoyed teaching kids different skills for my favorite sport. One of the biggest things that motivated me to become involved in these community projects would probably have to be my grandma and great grandma they both have always been super involved in community service. I've always looked up to them and how they have been able to dedicate all of that time to a greater cause. I've learned so much from my grandma, great grandma, and the Grange that it is almost impossible for me to pick one specific thing that stands out above the rest but if I had to choose it would probably have to be that you can always help someone whether it's directly or indirectly.
