Milk Proteins Show Promise Against Cancer

A team of Australian researchers found that milk proteins are potential candidates for the development of anticancer agents. These anticancer agents can be generated by enzymatic action in digestion or food processing.

The institute of Food Technologist said these proteins may destroy cancer cells without harming healthy cells thus have fewer side effects. Fewer side effect better quality of life.

Cancer is the leading cause of human death. While more research need to be done this look promising for a new type of medication for cancer.

Changes in Antibiotic Rules will Change Livestock and Dairy Industry

New rules take effect end of March. The new rules will band commonly uses antibiotics in feed and water on live-stock farms. FDA alarmed over antibiotic resistant bugs want to cut use of antibiotics in animals while not looking at human and environmental factors.

Pound for pound humans and pets use 10 times more than the livestock industry. We need to look at all sides of this issue. Center for Disease Control says this is one of the world's largest health issues. Federal agencies are focused in livestock use—but that will not solve the issue.

We need to cut down the over use of antibiotics. Fewer and fewer drugs are being developed to fight infectious diseases. It is expensive and takes to long for the approval process. The process needs to be streamlined and develop new drugs. The bugs will survive.

Questions to Ask Before Hiring a Health Aide

- 1. Do a background check. Do a drug screening.
- 2. Is your health aid CPR certified and do they have any health-related training.
- 3. What is expected lifting, transfers, and personal care skills.
- 4. Assess what the aid is capable of doing.
- 5. What happens if they aid can't come one day—Have a plan B.
- 6. Are you using an agency or finding someone yourself.

I live in a small community. We found someone in the nursing program at the community college. They could use both the experience and the money.

THE LINCOLN MEMORIAL

Commission by President William H. Taft (who was then, Chief Justice of the United States) dedicated the Memorial on May 30, 1922. It was presented to President Warren G Harding, who accepted it on behalf of the American People. Lincoln's only surviving son, 78 year old Robert Todd Lincoln, was in attendance. The structure measures 189.7 by 118.5 feet and is 99 feet tall. It is surrounded by 36 fluted Doric columns, one for each of the states in the Union at the time of Lincolns death. The north and south side's of the chamber contain carved inscriptions of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address and his second inaugural address. The girders are panels of Alabama marble, saturated with paraffin to increase their translucency. Needing more light Congress appropriated funds to pay for this expensive system. In 1929 the statue was properly lighted. Only one major alteration has taken place in the Memorial's design. The addition of an elevator with in the structure to aid handicapped visitors, was installed in the mid-1970's.

The statue was carved by the Piccirilli Brothers under the supervision of sculptor, Daniel Chester French and took 4 years to complete. The extreme width and height of the statue are the same. Some have claimed that the face of General Robert E. Lee was carved onto the back of Lincoln's head. Another popular legend is that Lincoln is shown using sign language to represent his initials. With his left hand shaped to form an "A" and his right hand to form and "L" the President's initials. Both legends have been denied. BUT, the French sculptor was familiar with American Sign Language, and he would have had a reason to do so, to pay tribute to Lincoln for having signed the federal legislation giving Gallaudet University, a university for the deaf, the authority to grant college degrees. French also had a son who was deaf.

The Memorial has become a symbolically sacred venue especially for the Civil Rights movement. August 28, 1963, the memorial grounds were the site of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. It is estimated that approximately

250,000 people came to the event, where they heard Martin Luther King, Jr. deliver his historic speech, "I Have A Dream"

From 1959 to 2008, the Lincoln Memorial was shown on the reverse of the United States one cent coin, which bears Lincoln's portrait bust on the front. The statue of Lincoln can be seen in the monument. This was done to mark the 150th anniversary of Lincoln's birth. The memorial also appears on the back of the U.S. five dollar bill, the front of which bears Lincoln's portrait.

The Lincoln Memorial has appeared in many movies.



VANDALISM:

In 1962, vandals painted the words "n- - - - lover" in foot-high pink letters on the rear wall. In 2013 the memorial was shut down after the base and leg were splashed with green paint. It reopened later that day.

We are using this issue of the Grange News as a reminder to Community Service Chairman, both new and old, on how to organize the notebook.

- Simplify the Notebook!
 Select the photos that best represent the project
 - If 30 pictures are taken of a project, does not mean all 30 need to be used!
- Organize the Notebook
 You want your notebook to read like a book
 Keep projects grouped together
 Keep supporting evidence, such as thank you
 letters and newspaper articles, with the
 photo and text of the project
- Examples of Organizing

Organize the book in 2 separate sections:

New Projects & Continuing Projects
Organize each section in chronological order
from beginning of Grange year to the end

OR – Organize each section in order from largest project in terms of hours involved to smallest project

Keep the pages clean & concise

List all projects at the beginning of the book Try to keep 2 pages of a project as a 2 page spread, so the judge can see they go together

May have to go to 3 or 4 pages, depending on the project

Do not use tabs with paper inserts – they fall out!

If a donation was made to a project, make sure it is listed somewhere

Just a reminder that the Community Service program period is September 1, 2014 to August 31, 2015. Notebooks/reports will be due September 10. More information to come in the next Grange News. Please contact us if you have any questions.

But Spring is here finally as all the baby animals are being born or have been born. I took delivery of my niece and nephews' pigs and goats for their fair projects. Hard to believe it is already that time to start raising and working animals. 4 pigs and 3 market goats will live here at my mini farm until mid August now.

Something new for my family is the raising of chickens! I am not sure I am ready for this as the chicken coop will be in my backyard. With that in the backyard, that means I will be having chores to do in the middle of winter. I am not looking forward to that but will be happy when the hens lay the eggs. We haven't gotten any chickens yet but will be in a few weeks once the coop (8'x8' shed) is erected.
