He worked for MSU for 50 years in the Dairy Science Dept. and the Michigan Dairy Herd Improvement Services. He served in the Army and was an active volunteer in the Grange and his community.

Alvin served as Overseer for the Michigan State Grange from 1980-1996; Assistant Steward from 1964-1978 and again 2005

-2006; Executive Committee 1978-1979 and 1997-2002. He held many offices in his own Subordinate Granges, Olive and Capitol as well as the Pomona Grange. Alvin was always a very dedicated member of the Grange and a friend to all.

He is survived by his wife of 61 years, Marie, children, Steven (Nancy) Thelen, Vickie (Mike) Thompson, Debra (Gary) Serrino, Douglas (Kim) Thelen, James Thelen, Sandra (Jim) Osowski, and many grandchildren. He was also survived by eight brothers and sisters. He was preceded in death by three brothers.

Awards:

1st, 2nd, 3rd place winners in each division will be recognized with ribbons and certificates and the Junior Grange members will also be awarded with prize money — 1st place—\$3.00, 2nd place -\$2.00 and 3rd place — \$1.00.

Junior Grange Deaf Awareness Poster Contest is open to Junior Grange members or children or grandchildren of Grange members. There are 4 age groups — 5 and under, 6-9, 10-11, 12-14. The poster is to be made on poster board (max. size 18 x 24 inches). Crayons, markers, pencils, pens, cut out pictures and/or photos can be used. Place the entrants name on the back of the poster along with age, Junior Grange name and number and county. The judging will be on the correctness of the message and educational value of poster and neatness. The awards will be ribbons along with money awards — 1st place -\$3.00, 2nd place — \$2.00 3rd place-\$1.00. The poster is to be at the State Grange Convention by Thursday morning at 9:00 a.m. Bring it or send it with delegates to where the posters will be judged.



See you in October if not sooner!


