Course Title: English Composition II

Catalog Description:

This course continues to study the basic elements of writing the 500-word composition with emphasis on organization and development. The primary focus of this course is writing the research paper. Instruction concentrates on topic selection, problem development, thesis formation, and resource documentation.

□ To write a 15 page research paper in APA format.

□ To utilize technology and other available resources in completing research.

□ To present, orally, in class, ideas related to the topic selected, data gathered, and plans for completion of the research paper.
